Some of the children who benefit from the activities/experiences being on offer to all children is that some of the children who are two years old will be entitled to Free school meals hence EYPP, in the future, when they are three.

Evaluation

This plan was cut short by the Covid-19 Pandemic. We had employed the social Communication worker, who started in September and was also able to work remotely. We had sent two teachers on the CLPE training which finished remotely. However, they had already had a positive impact on the activities that were happening in the school. Links with the CLPE enabled us to commission them as a keynote speaker for the STEEP conference which enabled more staff to access to the information and strategies.

Evaluation

- We were able to take the children on a visit to the Tate modern, they went using the 'Ubber taxi clipper boats', which enhanced the feeling that this was an adventure. More children had been planned to go, however we were unable to follow through due to the 'Lockdown'.
- A visit was made to the scrap scheme by staff, however again any further visits were unable to go ahead.
- Children and staff had initial participation in the GCSP Art project, again it was cut short.

The Global pandemic limited many of the activities that we had planned for the year. However, as can be seen from the evaluations some elements of this plan had been able to take place. We did not assess children for exit data as very few of them had, had any consistent attendance due to the lockdowns
