




1. Be Kind


by Pat Zietlow Miller

2. If All the World Were


by Joseph Coelho

3. The Proudest Blue


by Ibtihaj Muhammad and S.K. Ali

4. The Day You Begin


by Jacqueline Woodson

5. Where Are You From?


by Yamile Saied Méndez

6. Strictly No Elephants



7. Ruby's Worry


by Tom Percival

8. There's a Tiger in the Garden


by Lizzy Stewart

9. The Mega Magic Hair Swap


