This information is an important measure of progress linked to the Raising of the Participation Age (RPA). Responsibility for the followup of young people leaving school rests with the Local Authority, who sub-contract this activity to Positive Steps.

Finally, thank you to all of our partners in schools, colleges, training providers and other agencies who have supported us in gathering this information to ensure that it is as accurate as possible.

GLOSSARY OF TERMS

EET (Education, Employment and Training) includes full-time education, full-time training and full-time employment with or without training.

Full-time education includes sixth forms, six form colleges and colleges of further education

Full-time training covers government- supported training without employed status

Full-time employment with training includes apprenticeships, jobs leading to NVQ training and other jobs with locally recognised training

Full-time employment without training is employment where no formal training is provided

In Learning includes full-time education; apprenticeship; full-time training; and full-time employment with training

NEET (Not in Education, Employment or Training)

NEET Available - currently not engaged in EET and actively seeking opportunities

NEET Not available - currently not engaged in EET and not seeking opportunities for a variety of reasons including asylum seeker, caring for child, cultural restrictions, custody, illness, and pregnancy.

Moved Away - Those who have left the area and where definitive information about their destination pathway is not available

Unable to contact Those who appear to have remained in the local area but there is no means of contacting them: not at known address; phone number missing or unobtainable; have not responded to emails or SMS messages

DIRECTOR'S OVERVIEW



Welcome to this year's Moving On Report. It is an essential overview of the progress of Tameside's young people in education, training, and employment. This is the first report since I became the Director of Education and Guidance in February 2023 and it's been a really productive period working alongside my new team. The landscape of opportunities changes every year, as do the needs of our young people. Our skilled team of Career Advisers, Career Coaches, and Youth Engagement Workers are adept at working flexibly and thinking creatively to meet new challenges and demands.

Our cohort of young people increased by 126 this year, and so it is good to see that the participation rate has increased. We have worked hard this period to reduce the number of young people who we have previously been unable to contact. This is resulted in a reduction of more than half in the 'unable to contact' group, with SEND/EHCP 'unable to contact' also reducing by more than 50% this year.

We have seen a decrease in young people in Apprenticeships this year, and we are keen to work to increase this over the next year. We are committed to working with Greater Manchester leaders to get a good understanding of post-16 technical skills and pathways to ensure the best possible IAG is provided to the young people we work with and to achieve parity between academic and technical pathways.

While I am confident that we are making good progress on addressing the impacts left by the pandemic, this year has brought its own challenges. There has been a reduction in local provision for those who do not want full-time education but are not yet ready for work, and an increase in withdrawals due to attendance and behaviour not meeting expected standards. We are working hard alongside our commissioners, partners, schools, and families, and we are confident that we can rise to meet these challenges and offer appropriate support for our young people.

We recently ended delivery on our ESF funded 'Connect To Your Future' programme. The programme brought a more intensive level of support to the young people who need it most. The offer perfectly complemented our Local Authority NEET provision and meant that our young people had more than one option for support, depending on their challenges, needs, and aspirations. Thanks to the hard work and dedication of our team and their clients, I am delighted that the project met, and in some areas exceeded its targets.

We are pleased to have recently relaunched our website. Our website now has a more user-friendly interface, richer information, and offers an interactive 'digital front door' for young people and those who work to support them to thrive.

I am sure that you will find the report informative and useful. However, comments and questions are always welcome. Thank you for your ongoing support. We have some exciting plans for the next year, and we look forward to working with you on them.


The participation rate has risen slightly this year from 95.1% to 95.5 %, which is pleasing to see, given that the cohort numbers have increased again this year by over 100.

There has been a significant rise in the number of those progressing to Sixth Form colleges as well as School Sixth Forms, however a decrease in FE progressions.

The NEET rate has risen very slightly this year, However, this is not surprising when cohort numbers have risen and there is a lack of alternative provision in the borough.

This year the Unable to Contact number has reduced from 1.2% to 0.5%. This is testament to the staff who have worked tirelessly and innovatively to engage the young people in the borough.

MAIN DESTINATION TYPES FOR YEAR 11 LEAVERS 2013 TO 2023





FE Course Choice by Gender












