This is the collective data for Tameside and is critical in informing future decision-making and ensuring we provide the right offer for young people's future needs.

We also provide each academy, school or other educational establishment with a detailed report about the young people from their establishment that can be viewed alongside this boroughwide summary report.

This information is an important measure of progress linked to the Raising of the Participation Age (RPA). Responsibility for the followup of young people leaving school rests with the Local Authority, who sub-contract this activity to Positive Steps.

Finally, thank you to all of our partners in schools, colleges, training providers and other agencies who have supported us in gathering this information to ensure that it is as accurate as possible.

GLOSSARY OF TERMS

EET (Education, Employment and Training) includes full-time education, full-time training and full-time employment with or without training.

Full-time education includes sixth forms, six form colleges and colleges of further education

Full-time training covers government- supported training without employed status

Full-time employment with training includes apprenticeships, jobs leading to NVQ training and other jobs with locally recognised training

Full-time employment without training is employment where no formal training is provided

In Learning includes full-time education; apprenticeship; full-time training; and full-time employment with training

NEET (Not in Education, Employment or Training)

NEET Available - currently not engaged in EET and actively seeking opportunities

NEET Not available - currently not engaged in EET and not seeking opportunities for a variety of reasons including asylum seeker, caring for child, cultural restrictions, custody, illness, and pregnancy.

Moved Away - Those who have left the area and where definitive information about their destination pathway is not available

Unable to contact Those who appear to have remained in the local area but there is no means of contacting them: not at known address; phone number missing or unobtainable; have not responded to emails or SMS messages

DIRECTOR'S OVERVIEW



Welcome to this year's Moving On Report. It is an essential overview of the progress of Tameside's young people moving into education, training, and employment.

This year we have witnessed, yet again, how the needs of our young people have changed, and we have enjoyed adapting our services to better support them. Our skilled team of Career Advisers, Career Coaches, and Youth Engagement Workers have spent time speaking to young people about their aspirations, their barriers, and how they want us to work with them.

Last year we experienced a key challenge for young people, with a noticeable reduction in local provision for post-16 young people who do not want full-time education but are not yet work-ready. We worked with the local authority and key learning providers on behalf of young people, which brought about an increase

in provision. The introduction of the Tameside Futures programme and increased provision from The King's Trust has contributed. This has helped us to support more NEET young people into suitable destinations, but there is still work to do to ensure that there is enough provision for all within the Borough.

It is pleasing to report that the NEET rate for school leavers in Tameside has reduced this year, with a slight increase in FE College and School 6th Form entry also. The rate of those progressing into apprenticeships is similar to last year. The number of individuals where their destination is 'Not Known' remains very low this year, with just 17 young people being uncontactable, despite the cohort growing by 100 young people. This improvement is due to more intensive and varied methods of tracking, and an increase in follow up activity by our teams over the Summer.

We have some exciting plans for the next year, including gaining a good understanding of the qualification reforms and the post-16 landscape, so that we can offer the most up to date information on progression routes and opportunities to our young people within schools.



It is pleasing to report that the NEET rate for school leavers in Tameside has reduced to 3.22% this year from 3.50% last year.

There has been a small increase in progression to Further Education (FE) College and School sixth forms and a small reduction in sixth form college enrollers from 45.4% to 41.2%.

There has been a rise in the young people accessing re-engagement provision, from 0.1% to 0.6%. This is because we have the addition of the Tameside Futures programme, and the Kings Trust offer in both Ashton and Hyde.

The rate of those progressing into apprenticeships is comparable to last year, 2.4% this year and 2.3% last year. Similarly, those we have been unable to contact this year is 0.6% compared to 0.5% last year, so remaining very low.

It is important to note that the cohort numbers have risen by 100 young people this year, making the reduction in NEET rates an even greater achievement.

Main Destination Types for Year 11 Leavers 2024





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Those young people progressing straight into employment has reduced again this year to 3.4% compared with 5.1% in 2022.

The NEET and not known rate for school leavers has been improving year on year since 2022, when it was 4.3%, 4% in 2023 and 3.8% this year.


A significantly higher percentage of males than females progressed into a Further Education college – 51.9%, compared with 39.6% female.

There were, however, more females than males moving on to a sixth form college – 50.5% female compared to 32.7% male.

When looking at apprenticeships, there were more male school leavers progressing into this field – 3.5% male compared to 1.2% female. Looking at the NEET available rates, there were almost double the number of male than female - 2.9% male NEET compared to 1.5% female.


When we look at those who progressed onto A levels, there were a higher number of females, 38.5% compared to 27.7% of males.

A similar number of males and females progressed onto a GCSE programme and similarly on the BTEC courses. A significantly higher number of females than males enrolled onto a T level programme – 3.6% female and 1.1% male.








17.5% progressed onto a school sixth form and 4.8% to a sixth form college.
