GLOSSARY OF TERMS

EET (Education, Employment and Training) includes full-time education, full-time training and full-time employment with or without training.

Full-time education includes sixth forms, six form colleges and colleges of further education

Full-time training covers government- supported training without employed status

Full-time employment with training includes apprenticeships, jobs leading to NVQ training and other jobs with locally recognised training

Full-time employment without training is employment where no formal training is provided

In Learning includes full-time education; apprenticeship; full-time training; and full-time employment with training

NEET (Not in Education, Employment or Training)

NEET Available - currently not engaged in EET and actively seeking opportunities

NEET Not available - currently not engaged in EET and not seeking opportunities for a variety of reasons including asylum seeker, caring for child, cultural restrictions, custody, illness, and pregnancy.

Moved Away - Those who have left the area and where definitive information about their destination pathway is not available

Unable to contact Those who appear to have remained in the local area but there is no means of contacting them: not at known address; phone number missing or unobtainable; have not responded to emails or SMS messages

DIRECTOR'S OVERVIEW



Welcome to this years Moving On Report, a vital overview of young people in Tameside's progress in Education, Training and Employment.

Although we are gladly moving out of the direct effects of COVID 19, the impact on education leaves a challenging legacy. Young people who left in 2022 have had significant disruption not only to their academic experience but also the range of supporting arrangements that enrich their journey to independence, improved self confidence and fulfilled aspirations. 

We are also moving on with our plans for digital engagement, building on learning since 2019 and improving our website, adding value for all stakeholders. HEADLINES:

The participation rate has decreased slightly from 95.6% to 95.1%, however it is worth bearing in mind that the cohort size has risen by 120. We are continuing to see some young people struggle to engage in learning post covid and we are building links with local communities to address this issue.

FE figures have risen which is pleasing, however Sixth Form College figures have reduced slightly. The introduction of T level provision and close collaboration of Tameside and Clarendon colleges may have contributed to this.

7 young people are on re-engagement programmes such as Connect to your Future which has supported young people with barriers to learning.

7 young people have declined our support, despite our hard work. This is another indication of young people struggling to re-engage and feel they don't want any support.








DESTINATIONS BY GENDER













DESTINATIONS BY ETHNICITY






COURSE CHOICE BME COMPARISON





ATTENDANCE OF FE OUT OF BOROUGH





DESTINATIONS OF 'CHILDREN LOOKED AFTER'






Comparisons for those Electively Home Educated are very difficult due to small numbers, however, it is pleasing that participation in FE has increased on last year.
