Subject curriculum intent statement

DEPARTMENT CURRICULUM INTENT:

- We provide a broad and balanced curriculum to all students regardless of their gender, race or creed.
 As well as providing opportunities for all to succeed and therefore for all ability levels to fulfil their maximum potential.
- At KS3, lessons are sequenced so that pupils are expected to be able to talk and write knowledgably about religions and belief, specifically Christianity, Islam, Sikhi and Buddhism, using subject specific language accurately and confidently. At GCSE, lessons are sequenced where the aim of the syllabus is to ensure that students will gain an appreciation of how religion, philosophy and ethics form the basis of our culture. They will develop analytical and critical thinking skills, the ability to work with abstract ideas, as well as leadership and research skills. All these skills will help prepare them for further study.
- We aim to enable students to enhance their knowledge and vocabulary through the study of a variety of topics and units of work, which in turn will enable students to develop their own personalities and a sense of self, whilst taking into account the thoughts, beliefs and practices of others.
- Our aims and vision for RE also reflect the intent of the Tameside Local Agreed Syllabus which is, 'to
 engage pupils in a systematic enquiry into significant human questions which religions and
 worldviews address, so that they can develop the understanding and skills needed to appreciate and
 appraise varied responses to these questions, as well as develop responses of their own'.
- We want to enable students to work both independently and as part of a team through activities such as role-play, project work and ICT.
