Dear Parents and Carers

Wider reopening arrangements – Monday 8th March

You'll find attached to this letter, our updated parent information sheet about the wider reopening next Monday. Please read this carefully and get in touch if you have any further questions.

A few key points:-

- All children are expected to return to school on Monday with very few exemptions. If you are not intending for your child to return, please do get in touch with us to discuss any concerns. Thank you.
- We are asking all adults dropping off and picking up children to wear masks on the school site.
- We understand the difficulties caused by children's feet growing over the lockdown period! Hopefully, we will all be able to get our children's feet measured and fitted with shoes before the Summer Term when full uniform expectations will be back in place. If you do have a shoe crisis, we ask that children wear safe and sensible dark coloured shoes or trainers instead for the remainder of this term.

We can't wait to see all the children back on site again and know how much they are looking forward to seeing their friends too.

Covid testing - did you know?

One of the difficulties with preventing the spread of Covid 19 has been the number of people who don't have any symptoms but are carrying the disease and could pass it on to others without realising the risk. School staff have been testing twice weekly since 25th January to guard against this type of transmission. It's another helpful measure we can take to ensure that our school community is as safe as possible.

The government has now extended the availability of Covid 19 testing. As a member of a household which includes school age children, you can also have regular Covid 19 tests.


Aldermaston School Book Week 2021

West Berkshire Museum short story competition 2021

Calling all young budding writers to get ready and get your #WriteOn!

This Spring West Berkshire Museum are running an exciting short story competition for young people. It's a chance for young writers to create their own story inspired by **eight** very different museum objects (pictured below).

We have included some basic information about each object, but you can have fun finding out more about them. Your story can be a maximum of 500 words in length and of any genre, such as science fiction, mystery and detective, or fairy tale and myth, to name but a few. Whatever the genre, **the challenge is to include every object in the narrative** – let your imagination run wild! If you're not certain how to start your story, please see the 'top tips for short story writing' factsheet. **The competition is open to young people aged 7 to 12 years old.**

Please submit your entry by email to clare.bromley@westberks.gov.uk including your name, age, title of your story, word count, and a contact email and/or telephone number of a parent/carer. One entry per writer.

The winning entries will be showcased in a special exhibition at the end of July. All winners will receive a 50% discount on one item in the museum gift shop and a prize.

The deadline for all entries is 4pm on Sunday 18th April.

Terms and conditions:

The judges' decision is final. The unrestricted rights to publish, print and display any of the competition entries will be held and retained by West Berkshire Heritage.

First row from left to right:

A copper flower-like **buckle** from the Tudor period which was used for fastening clothes as well as belts and shoes. What else could it be used for in your story?

A Stone Age (Neolithic) **scraper** used for preparing animal skins to use for clothing and shelter. Is this tool useful to your story? A **candle snuffer** from the 19th century used to extinguish a burning candle and to trim the wick. Do you use it this way or in another? An almost complete **Roman pot** found west of Kintbury. What is stored or hidden in this pot, or do you use it to store or hide something in? A **Roman brooch** (missing pin), dating from 1st century, which was used to fasten clothes. Do you need to fasten something in your story?

Second row from left to right:

A heraldic pendant used on a horse harness, dating from the late 13th or early 14th century, and found in Sandleford Priory, Greenham. It was enamelled and shows a lion or gryphon, fleur-de-lys and four diamond shapes. Does this object provide a clue to your characters? A square brass plate (dial) of a sundial, dating from late 16th century, which tells the time using the sun. A gnomon (part of the sundial, missing here) casts a shadow on the dial so giving the time. Engraved on this dial: 1575 Robert Heythe. Does this solve a mystery? Sixteenth century long-shanked spur which was worn on the heel of each boot, in pairs, and used when riding to direct a horse. Do you ride a horse in your story?
