


Aldryngton Primary School Knowledge Organiser: How did the Vikings put Reading in the history books?

A topic looking at the Viking invasion of Britain and how Reading was a part of that.

Word	Definition	Word	Definition
Vikings	A group of Scandinavian, seafaring warriors who raided coastal sites and villages in the British Isles.	Lindisfarne	A monastery on the North-East Coast of England where the first group of Vikings arrived.
Saxons	German-Dutch tribes who settled in Britain from around 450CE.	monarch	A sovereign head of state, especially a king, queen, or emperor.
Norsemen	The name given to Viking raiders by The Anglo-Saxons	Hastings	The site of a famous battle that ended the Saxon and Viking rule.
pillage	To rob a place using violence during a period of invasion or war	Danelaw	The part of England in which the laws of the Danes held sway after making a deal with Alfred the Great.
longhouse	A large communal house in Viking settlements	longboats	a long sail and oar ship used by the Vikings

We will be visiting the replica in Reading Museum later this term!




Lindisfarne was the monastery that the first group of Viking invaders attacked on British shores.

Battle of Reading

In 871AD, the Vikings attacked Reading as part of their goal to conquer the remaining Saxon kingdom of Wessex. Ethelred and Alfred (later to become Alfred the Great) attempted to defend the town from the Vikings but did not succeed.

<p>King Alfred the Great (AD 849-899): Alfred was born in Berkshire and did a lot of great things for England including defeating the Vikings in several battles and keeping part of England under Anglo-Saxon rule.</p> <p>Athelstan (AD 927 -939) – First King to unite English kingdoms</p> <p>Guthrum (AD 879-890) – King of the Vikings in Danelaw at the time of the treaty with the Saxons</p> <p>King Canute (AD 995-1035): Viking King of England, Denmark and Norway.</p> <p>Edward the Confessor (AD 1042-1055) – penultimate Saxon King of England (before Harold II who lost at Hastings)</p> <p>William the Conqueror (AD 1028-1087): Became King of England in 1066 after winning in the Battle of Hastings.</p>	<p>Anglo Saxon Boy & Viking Boy by Tony Bradman</p> <p>Beowulf – Michael Morpurgo retelling</p> <p>Viking Voyagers by Jack Tite</p> <p>Odd and the Frost Giants by Neil Gaiman</p> <p>1000 Year Old Boy by Ross Welford</p> <p>Arthur and the Golden Rope by Joe Todd Stanton</p> <p>The Vikings: Raiders, Traders and Adventurers by Marcia Williams</p>
