We define 'homework' as any work or activities which pupils are asked to do at home, without the guidance of teachers. It is usually done with the support of parents or carers and is an opportunity for adults, other than teachers and TAs, to become active partners in supporting learning.
Homework should either reinforce what is taught in the classroom or give pupils an opportunity to research current and new topics. Children generally enjoy continuing activities, sharing their experiences and bringing work started at home back into school.

Homework also provides a means for children to:

- Become independent and curious learners
- Develop good study habits
- Build up basic skills in maths and English
- Prepare for the next stage of education
- Share with their parents what they are doing at school


## Roles and responsibilities

## School

- The school, through its Curriculum, Community and Safeguarding Committee, is responsible for the content and regular reviewing of this policy document and for its communication to teaching staff
- Informs parents (for example via a newsletter item indicating a web address)
- Ensures that this policy is followed by teaching staff


## Teaching staff

- Set appropriate homework taking into account the ability of the pupils
- Provide prompt feedback to the pupils on returning the work

Pupil

- Ensures that they have what they need to do the work
- Puts in as much care as if they were doing the work in class
- Hands in work on time
- Responds to feedback given by their teacher


## Parent/carer

- Makes time to hear their child read (see homework guidance)
- Supports the child and makes sure that appropriate conditions are available for the work to be done
- Keeps the school informed (via the class teacher in the first instance) of any changes that might influence the child's ability to learn


## Amount of Homework

Guidelines for the amount of homework are as follows:

| Library - weekly Draw a picture; write a comment | Half termly topic related tasks | Reading <br> Writing a book review once a week. | Annual presentation on a given theme |

Some intervention groups give small pieces of additional homework.
