To ensure full transparency, Governors must declare all business/financial interests as well as the details of any other educational establishments they govern. The register must also set out any relationships between governors and members of the school's staff including spouses, partners and relatives. It is important to address any perception of a conflict of interests by making clear where such potential personal or pecuniary interests might apply.

Generally, Governors should not participate in any discussions in which they may directly or indirectly benefit from a pecuniary interest. A direct benefit refers to any personal financial benefit and an indirect benefit refers to any financial benefit you may have by virtue of a relationship to someone who stands to gain from a decision of the governing board.

There may be a non-pecuniary interest whereby the Governor does not stand to gain any benefit but a declaration should still be made. For example, this might be where a governor has a family member working in the Federation. While the Governor might not benefit personally, their judgment could be impaired if something was brought up that would affect the family member.

Please Note, it is the responsibility of each individual Governor or staff member present at any meeting to declare their interest; the register is not a substitute for declaring an interest at meetings.
