### Ofsted at SKS

Every school in England is inspected every four or five years. SKS welcomed the inspection team in early July, and were able to distribute the published report at the end of September.

When you have read the report, I'm sure you will be joining me in celebrating what this school achieves, and the accolades from the inspector. The report emphasises the many strengths of the school and comments that this school is "small and welcoming...like a family". The inspector also comments on the range of activities we offer which "broaden pupils' horizons and deepen their understanding of the world." Quite rightly, the inspector praises the pupils at Samuel King's School and recognises their contribution to the local community, as well as commenting very positively on their behaviour and ability to "conduct themselves well".

As is usual in all inspection reports there are areas for improvement identified. In this report there is only one, which is to provide pupils with opportunities to revisit and practise their learning in some subjects. I am confident that we will be able to make the changes needed to meet this target very quickly.

I am delighted with this report, which reflects the school's many strengths. My thanks to the staff across the Federation, whose high expectations of our pupils are specifically praised. Such a good inspection report only happens when there is an excellent staff team working together.



# News at APS and \$K\$ Asbestos in school

If you have been near to the school site in Alston in the past few months, you will have seen that we are hosting builders, who are doing some major work on our school roof.

The work to remove all the asbestos was completed in early September, and the replacement of the roof is now being done.

Unfortunately, this work is overrunning by approximately three weeks. The builders tell me, that this is due to supply issues. They are experiencing problems getting the new roofing panels into the country and onto site. The project will be further delayed by work to repair and refurbish the main school hall. This will add an additional two weeks onto the project.

None of these delays are unusual in any large building project, but are frustrating, none the less. We will continue the current arrangement around lunch times and PE lessons until the end of the autumn term.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the pupils in both Alston Primary School and Samuel King's School. They have taken this disruption in their stride, and just continued to get on with their school life, as if everything was normal. They really are a credit to their families and their schools.

GCSE Art and Design technology trip to Glasgow

The GCSE Art and Design technology students had a really full and busy day whilst visiting Glasgow this term.

The purpose of the trip was to allow students to have an exciting day out in a busy city, whilst providing the opportunity to visit the Charles Rennie Mackintosh house, part of the Hunterian Museum and art gallery. The Mackintosh house is a meticulous reassemblage of the principal interiors from the Mackintosh's Glasgow home.

Students arrived in Glasgow by train, had an early lunch and made their way to the museums via the underground train. The weather was kind with only a little rain as we made our way to the Hunterian and nearby Kelvingrove Museum and art gallery, which houses a huge variety of exhibits from taxidermy, to artwork by artists such as Van Gogh, Salvador Dali and Renoir.

Students had the tangible experience of seeing work first hand, opposed to internet research whilst visiting the museums.

As expected Samuel King's students were model pupils and a credit to the school and parents/carers. A great day out was had by us all













# Learning news at \$K\$ Focus on Science

In science it has been a very busy start to the year with GCSE classes going full steam ahead to introducing the new 7s to the science lab and staying safe in this environment.

The year 9s, 10s and 11s were taken on the Aira Force trip to look at the ecology. The pupils completed 2 main activities during the trip which were looking at






patterns of plant growth, counting types of flora and a river flow test and looking at the types of flora along the river. All the pupils really enjoyed the outdoor classroom experience in comparison to the traditional classroom.


During lessons we have been looking at cells and specialised cell functions. The year 9s are being introduced to the GCSE curriculum.

The pupils spent time working in groups to learn the main different types of specialised cells and their individual functions. They were fully engaged with this activity and saw it as a competition to see who could complete the task the quickest and to the highest standard.

The GCSE Chemistry pupils have been discovering the different techniques of chemical analysis. Making observations for positive and negative ions, pure and impure substances and tests for different types of gases. You can see here that they are completing the chemical

- the pupils are mixing








# Learning news at \$K\$ Focus on English



This story is about a young, curious boy called Harry. He's a shy kid who is in trouble at school, and at home.




I recommend this book for family and friends to know that anyone can be your friend."

# Learning news at \$K\$ Focus on MFL

With the new term well underway, students in KS3 are seeing some great progress in Languages. The new Year 7 class have settled well and are getting to grips with our weekly learning homework tests. Those in Year 8 are also doing these tests for the first time, but the Year 9 students are used to learning these words at home.

Here's a little information about why we do our languages homework like this at SKS, and also some tips for learning the words each week.



# Learning Words and Phrases in a Foreign Language



#### What's the point?

Learning words and phrases at home will help you in your lessons. It means we will have more time to focus on **skills** such as listening, speaking, reading and writing. If you choose a language in your options, it will train you to be able to learn French words and phrases in the same way you would when revising for your exams. Looking at this vocabulary outside of lessons will help it stay in your memory for much longer.

#### How often?

Little and often is the absolute key to doing your homework successfully. 10-15 minutes a day is enough. Trying to learn the words the night before will not be enough to embed them into your long term memory. Remember, we're not just learning them to be used that week then you can forget them – if you decide to do a GCSE in French or German, you will need these words then too!

#### **KEY POINTS TO REMEMBER**

- Language learning happens over time, and although there are some tips on the other side of this to help you, you must remember there is no quick fix.
- > Be prepared to put in a little effort each day you will soon see the benefits of this.
- ➤ Make it part of your daily routine 10 minutes in the morning, or on the school bus, or before bed. It'll become habit rather than a chore.
- If you find a particular set of words difficult, then you will need to work harder on them. Saying they're too hard is no excuse!

I've asked students to do their best with this as I understand some find learning new words harder than others. Those who consistently do well with this type of homework have told me they use the 'little and often' approach and getting someone at home to test them really helps! I appreciate any support at home, so thank you to those parents and carers who take the time to do this.

In terms of topic areas we are currently covering, you can always see on their half termly vocabulary sheets (stuck in the student planners) what we are studying.

# Learning news at \$K\$ Focus on MFL

Year 7 have been looking at the topic of *School* in French. We have looked at school subjects, giving opinions about them and describing their school. We have done tasks in all four skill areas – listening, reading, writing and speaking, and even had a go at playing Battleships in French!

Year 8 have been looking at *Healthy Living* in German – so far we've covered basic food items, drinks, fruit and vegetables. We've also worked on giving



simple opinions about foods and drinks and done a short speaking task on this in the form of a class survey. We have also made use of the computers to do a research task about Traditional German Foods where students presented information about the ingredients and

origin of some German dishes, and gave their verdict on whether they would like to try it themselves. I think we all agreed the cakes looked the tastiest!

Meanwhile in Year 9 our topic this half term in German has been *Hobbies & Interests* – we've looked at a wide variety of sports and hobbies and done a lot of work on giving opinions, as well as justifying them. I've been pushing the Year 9 group with some tricky grammar points and challenging translation tasks to prepare them for the kind of level they will be working at should they choose a language at GCSE. Considering this is their first term learning German, I've been really pleased to see how many of them have risen to this challenge.

Unfortunately, there's not much to report in relation to the Berlin Trip planned for July 2023. As I previously explained, at the moment I am unable to give out accurate prices, as flights for July won't be released until November. In the meantime, I will keep checking the website with anticipation!

# Learning news at \$K\$ Focus on Maths

#### What's being taught?

**Year 7 and 8** have got off to a flying start solving problems with addition and subtraction. This has included developing formal methods and using in context such as perimeter and everyday life financial problems. Students are now developing their understanding of formal methods of multiplication and division and using in context of both area of a variety of shapes and the mean of a set of data.

**Our year 9s** have been able to finish off work started in the summer term on straight line graphs. This focused on the understanding that y = mx + c and interpret gradients and intercepts from real life graphs. They have developed a good understanding of substitution through code breaking activities. This finished with rearranging 1-step and 2-step formulae.

**Year 10** started the year with congruency, similarity and enlargement. The main focus started with completing work on positive, fractional and negative enlargement of shapes putting the previous knowledge of coordinates to good

use! Students also have a good understanding of the difference between congruence and similarity and are able to solve related problems. We have just finished a unit of work on Pythagoras and trigonometry! Both groups have been very successful with these activities, understanding the tangent, sine and cosine rules when finding lengths and angles of right-angled triangles.

Our Year 11s have focussed on solving problems with linear graphs at the beginning of term. They have then further developed their understanding of simultaneous and quadratic simultaneous equations and being able to solve linear simultaneous equations graphically!


# Learning news at \$K\$ Focus on Pastoral Care—Overcoming Period Poverty

Period poverty is a real issue with "around 11% of girls in England missing school days due to a lack of affordability of period products".

We continue to make free sanitary products available in school for all students. Sanitary products can be found in the girl's toilets and in the pastoral office for students to help themselves to as many as they require.



It is worrying that "35% of girls aged 13-18 have taken time off school or college because of their period. We would like to support our female students to not be part of this statistic and encourage our students and/or parents to contact the pastoral team if this is causing an issue so we can work on solutions to support students to be in school and able to access their learning comfortably.




# Learning news at \$K\$ Focus on Pastoral Care—Good mental health

On Monday, 10th October Samuel King's students and staff joined in to raise awareness of the importance of our own mental health and sharing ways to support us in looking after ourselves. The staff marked the occasion by wearing yellow as part of the HelloYellow mental health campaign with YoungMinds to show our young people that they are not alone. Throughout the day the conversations focused on recognising we all have mental health and can take positive action to look after ourselves. We encouraged students to reflect on what makes a difference to them and raised awareness of support that is available.

A key message was thinking about, What's in your circle of control?

When thinking about how to look after Number 1, a great place to start is visualising what's in your 'circle of control'. What aspects of your life can you make a priority? What brings meaning and comfort in your life? Are they within your control?



You're sure to find something that's within your circle of control that can bring about a positive impact on your mental health.

The day started with a welcome from two visiting dogs, Jessica and Cinders who spent the day socialising with our students. Animals can provide a wealth of

support to students that are struggling and can give them a non-judgmental partner with whom to share their worries. One of our year 11 students commented "If every day was a dog day, I would never be sad". We were thrilled to see how positive our students interacted with our visitors both in and out of the class.

All students were invited to start the day well with a free breakfast of fresh fruit and pastries. Having the right start to the day can make a real difference to concentration and emotional wellbeing. Our students enjoyed the selection with a year 7 commenting "I loved the pineapple, it's my favourite".

At the end of the day all students reflected on the day and class conversations to make a personal promise to tie to our promise tree for a change that will help to make a difference to their own Mental Health. Small changes can make a big difference.

#### Focus on RPE

At the beginning of term all our Year 7 students took part in an Outdoor Exploration day as an introduction to their Religion Philosophy and Ethics lessons. The day was led by Paul Rose from the Diocese of Carlisle and consisted of a walk round Lacey's Caves, Long Meg and the surrounding Eden valley; stopping at various points to consider the history of the area and the questions which it poses for us today. Students were encouraged to consider questions such as who or what has influenced the person they are today and what

they would like to be remembered for.

The students represented the school fantastically and were a credit to themselves and the school.




# Learning news at \$K\$ Focus on PE

# Learning news at \$K\$ Focus on Geography

On the 20<sup>th</sup> September a joint trip with the Geography, Business Studies, Science and Art departments went out to National Trust Aira Force in the Lake District.

We, somehow, managed to land upon one of the few dry days in September which made the visit much more pleasant for everyone.

The focus for the Geographical aspect of the visit was to examine river characteristics at a number of different locations in the vicinity. We measured the width and depth across at various locations, whilst measuring the depth there were some more adventurous students who balanced on rocks in the middle of the stream. We also calculated the discharge by measuring flow velocity, some of the students became very adept at throwing dog biscuits into the fastest flow of water.

With respect to the Business Studies, we visited the tourist centre and café to look at how visitors are catered for, the impact seasonality has on the running of the business and how local businesses and enterprises were represented in the produce being sold. It was fascinating to see how a national organisation operates on a small scale in local establishments.

#### Focus on Catering

#### Year 7

Year 7 began their SKS Catering by considering kitchen safety rules and routines for their practical lessons. In recent weeks they have started some practical sessions, most recently their 'chopping challenge'. After half term they will be let loose in the kitchen and will begin



making some practical dishes! I can't wait to see how they do.

#### Year 8



In Year 8 we have been focussing on food labels using cheesecake as our focus food. We have made our own cheesecake as one of our practical sessions. We have also considered what the food traffic light label would be for it and any allergens it might contain. We will then consider how our cheesecake could be modified to make it healthier or to suit a certain dietary requirement.

#### Year 9

Year 9s have been learning about the food science of raising agents; looking at the function of a raising agent and the different types we might use in cookery. We have begun performing a series of food science experiments to see the

effect of a raising agent as well as using them in our practicals to see first hand how they work within food. This links into the content of the GCSE Food Preparation and Nutrition course, giving students an idea of the type of things they might cover if they choose it for their options next year.




### House news at AMF


We have been looking at non-fiction texts so we read 'The Street Beneath Our Feet'. We made dioramas and wrote information about what you would find underneath the ground.

We have also enjoyed Action Ants day with APS and testing our skills on new challenges and having lots of fun.









Well done to EYFS who have settled into school life with enthusiasm.


#### **Trips and Visitors**




We've also been reading The Wild Way Home.

children are developing their listening skills as well as their gross and fine motor skills. The parachute and ribbons are a highlight of the Music and Movement sessions!









#### Cross Fell Highlights




#### Middle Fell Highlights

This half-term has flown by in Middle Fell! We have all been working very hard across all of our subjects to develop our listening skills and independence, taking collective responsibility for our learning and each other's wellbeing.

We have been exploring the topic of the Stone Age throughout our curriculum, but perhaps most in depth during our History lessons. We have: established when the Stone Age took place; enquired about what remaining evidence tells us about life back then;

considered what food was available to humans at that time; compared homes now to homes back then and designed our own Stone Age style tools.



In Literacy, we have been practising our writing across a range of genres, but most recently we have focussed on creating non-fictional presentations using PowerPoint and Canva in preparation of sharing our research surrounding our favourite inventor or invention with Cross Fell and Park Fell. We are all very excited to share what we have learnt with our friends! Our SPAG has focussed mainly on the use of suffixes and prefixes and how these change the meaning of root words.

During our Guided Reading sessions, we have begun to develop our comprehension skills by reading Stig of the Dump together and by discussing this text in more depth. We read either independently, to a partner or with an adult every day and enjoy spending time in our two cosy reading caves.

Claire from Cogito Books has also stoked Middle Fell's passion for reading by curating a selection of books tailored to this class' interests. We often discuss

#### Middle Fell Highlights

Place value has been the focus of this half-term's Numeracy lessons. This has



involved learning how to partition up to 4-digit numbers, working out patterns on number lines using our times tables and estimating values on number lines. Our Year 3s have been such super stars that they've even been covering the Year 4 topic of roman numerals... and have been relishing the challenge!

As part of our promotion of STEM education for all, we have used our Science lessons to become practising Petrologists and Geologists by investigating the properties of rocks to determine what they are classified as and how they were formed. We have also begun to explore how fossils and soil are made, getting our hands dirty and our curiosity fired up in the process.







For our Computing lessons, we have: learned the part names of different devices; practised how to log into different applications; begun to search simple but safe terms on a browser; created original digital art; generated animation videos; and organised our research into digital presentations using professional software.

For our RE lessons, we have been learning

about Hindu worship, beliefs, festivals and symbols. Middle Fell have been especially enthralled with the religious story of Rama and

Sita, which underpins the Hindu festival of Diwali.

In our Music and Performing Arts lessons, we have developed our dance and movement skills with Miss Alison as well as our ukulele skills with Miss Tuffin. # Learning news at AP\$ Flinty Fell Highlights

Our topic for this term is the magnificent and eclectic world of Ancient Greece! This topic is already turning out to be one of our all-time favourites, as we delve into the magical myths and legends that have inspired storytelling and compelling characters for over two thousand years! Additionally, we have been exploring what is meant by the terms 'trade', 'civilisation' and 'empire' and discovering how, towards the end of the ancient Greek period, Alexander the Great grew an empire resulting in the Greek civilisation spreading even further.



When learning about daily life in ancient Greece, we have studied what life was like for different people who were enslaved during ancient Greek times, as well as exploring the differences between life in ancient Athens and ancient Sparta. This led us to the concept of early democracy in Athens, and how many of the ideologies that were developed during this era, helped influence politics in the modern age. In our Art and DT sessions, we have used ancient Greek pottery as a primary source to help us gather evidence about the ancient

Greek Olympics and make comparisons between the ancient Games and the modern Olympics. In addition to this, we have learned about the beliefs of the

ancient Greeks, and produced fact files and posters about the Greek gods. The Greek gods have truly captured our imagination, and we can't wait to write our own myths inspired by these fascinating characters!

Our Maths topics this term have seen us work on Place Value, and begin our studies on the Four Operations. I have been highly impressed with all the children's dedication and enthusiasm during our sessions in Maths this term. This work ethic will no doubt help us achieve new and exciting levels.

In Literacy, we have written some truly


affect their bodies, specifically in relation to the circulatory system.

### School Attendance Matters


Attendance is a high priority across Alston Moor Federation; we aim to have all students attending at 96% or above. We are working hard to address any issues that arise with individual students and believe that our students can do amazing things if they have the opportunity to be where the learning takes place. We continue to recognise good attendance with rewards and incentives in school and appreciate the support from home to encourage high levels of attendance across all year groups.

#### Why is it important for children to attend school?

Most parents want their children to get on well in life. Nowadays, it is more important than ever to have a good education behind you if you want opportunities in adult life. Children only get one chance at school, and your child's chances of a successful future may be affected by not attending school regularly.

If children do not attend school regularly, they may:

- Struggle to keep up with schoolwork. In a busy school day, it is difficult for schools to find the extra time to help a child catch up on the lessons that they have missed.
- Miss out on the social side of school life. Poor attendance can affect children's ability to make and keep friendships: a vital part of growing up. Be unable to take part in trips and extra activities.



#### The world is run by those who turn up

- Attending school every day = 100% attendance.
- Attending 4 ½ days a week = 90% attendance = 20 days missed a year.
- Attending 4 days a week = 80% attendance = missing over half a term.
- An average attendance of 90% or less across a child's school career adds up to missing over a whole year from school.








Cross Fell love the Claude books by **Alex T Smith**, and have been really enjoying **Claude in the City**. Mrs Brown recommends these fun books.


