Dear Parents and Carers,

Just before half term I wrote to you about Ms Timmons' promotion, and her secondment to another school during this half term. As a result of losing Ms Timmons, I have made some changes to our team, which I hope will give all the schools capacity to continue to develop a great teaching and support offer for your child.

Mrs Bainbridge is now our Federation deputy

headteacher, and she will be working in both primary schools, as well as supporting the children in all three schools as our safeguarding leader. Miss Hill, is our new early years leader; again working in both primary schools.

In SKS we have appointed two new pastoral leaders. Mrs Watson will be your link if your child is in years 7-9, and Mrs Allinson will look after our young people in years 10 and 11. Please contact your child's form tutor or their pastoral leader if you have concerns you'd like to discuss.

Academically, we are also looking to develop teams at SKS for teachers to work collaboratively and share good ideas across different, but linked, subject areas. School will be open as normal on Monday 29th November, closing for Christmas at the end of the day on Thursday 16th December.

Remembrance



Alston Moor Federation pays our respects

The students from Samuel King's School, and the pupils from Flinty Fell at Alston Primary School took part in a service of Remembrance at St Augustine's Church on 12th November. Members of staff took time to explain each stage of the service to our young people, so that the traditional parts of this special service could be fully understood, and their significance appreciated.

Mr Hagerup shared the importance of holding a time of remembrance. Mr Fletcher explained that the poppy is the symbol of remembrance, because these were the first flowers to bloom on the battlefields after World War 1, as poppies grow on disturbed earth. Mrs Jackson told the story of her great uncle who died in the Battle of the Somme and her visit to his grave in Northern France. She explained that most families at the time would have had a similar story of loss and bereavement.





Mr Gordon led the two minute silence and Mrs Hinkley talked about the importance of prayer to people during wartime. Students from SKS read our prayers, laid our wreath at the memorial in church and shared the traditional and poignant readings that are part of a remembrance service.

Our sincere thanks to Rev. Mark Nash-Williams for his warm welcome to Church, and his leading of our service.

If you have a concern about bullying in school, please talk to your class teacher or form teacher.


Focus on Mathematics

This term in Maths most classes have had the opportunity to work on triangles. Students have been developing their knowledge on one of our Maths departments favourite shapes.

In KS3 we have looked at constructing accurate triangles using our mathematical equipment; compass and protractor. Our students can now construct a Mathematically accurate triangle when only given three side lengths.

Still on the theme of triangles, in KS4 students have extended their knowledge of Pythagoras applying the theorem to calculate missing lengths in right-angled triangles. They have explored the relationship between the square of each side length and found some of our Pythagorean triples.

At the top end of the school students have been developing an understanding of the relationship between the lengths and angles within right-angled triangles. They have spent time exploring and finding the three trigonometric ratios and can now apply these to calculate missing measurements.

Focus on Science

Our students are making good progress in Physics this week investigating "States of matter". A state of matter is one of the distinct forms in which matter can exist. Matter is observable in everyday life as solid, liquid, gas.


Something is usually described as a solid if it can hold its own shape and is hard to compress (squash). The molecules in a solid are closely packed together – they have a high density.

In liquids the molecules have the ability to move around and slide past each other. A liquid will take on the shape of the container it is being held in. While a liquid is easier to compress than a solid, it is still quite difficult – imagine trying to compress water in a confined container!

In gases, the atoms are much more spread out than in solids or liquids, and the atoms collide randomly with one another. A gas will fill any container, but if the container is not sealed, the gas will escape. Gas can be compressed much more easily than a liquid or solid.

To discover this a practical was conducted to inspect different substance. Plasticine,

wood blocks, balloons and washing liquid were used. Our students were able to identify the three states of matter from these objects. They were then able to describe their different properties and draw diagrams to represent their different particles



Focus on Religion, Philosophy and Ethics

This half term Year 7 have been focussing on 'Big Questions' - these are philosophical questions we have about the world, life, creation and God which we can never fully answer.

We have been thinking about the questions we have and have started to explore how different religions answer these questions.

Throughout Key Stage 3 students will study a variety of different religious and non religious viewpoints; exploring what they believe and why. They will also study how these viewpoints affect the decisions people choose to make.

Focus on English

During the COP26 conference in Glasgow, year 8 paused to write some poetry about climate change. Using Benjamin Zephaniah's poem 'Future Visions' as inspiration, the class wrote about what climate change means to them. They engaged really well with this activity.

Aaron produced this poignant poem:

Society is changing every day, So many phones, I can't remember the make. All the kids living in joy, As the older generation barely had a teddy or toy.

Kids playing on games for hours and days, Landing 'Loot Lake' and winning games. By 2050 petrol and diesel cars are being made. If you go on your television these days, All that's on adverts are electric cars and the model and make.

Focus on Geography




At the moment year 9 students in Geography lessons are examining extreme environments and asking what makes an environment extreme. In order to do this successfully we first need to understand why different environments occur where they are and what the climatic conditions are like around the globe.

To make this difficult concept more visual we are completing a 3D global atmospheric circulation model in their

books. This highlights and explains the movement of air within our atmosphere and links it to the formation of different biomes such as tropical rain forests, boreal forests and polar tundra. We then went on to look at adaptations both animals and plants have to make in these extreme environments.

The year 9 students were fully engaged and found the activity fascinating as each step in the completion of the model made their knowledge and

understanding of the concept clearer. Some first rate cutting, sticking and colouring skills were in evidence from all members of the class and everyone managed to construct a decent model of atmospheric circulation.



Art and Design trip to Glasgow

The GCSE art and design technology group have had a fantastic trip to Glasgow this November. Pupils had the opportunity to travel by train and tube to visit museums and galleries.



We visited the Charles Rennie Macintosh house at the Hunterian, one of the most important collections of work of the



Scottish architect, designer and artist. The 'house' is a meticulous reassemblage of the interior from the Mackintoshes' Glasgow home in the early 1900s.

A short walk away the group spent time exploring the Kelvingrove Museum. From Van Gogh, Picasso paintings to 15th century armour.

An inspiring day for us all.


Every week the children of Nenthead have a 'What's in the News' session to learn about values and how we can have active discussions in a group.

This week our question was 'Should we be allowed to swim with dolphins?'. The children had different opinions but were able to agree or disagree with each other using the conventions of discussion we have been learning in our Oracy sessions.

The school uses a variety of teaching and learning approaches to teach oracy skills across the curriculum, including:

- Providing opportunities for drama and role-play.
- Providing opportunities for children to develop their listening skills through conversation.
- Promoting small group and class discussions on specific topics/areas of the curriculum.
- Providing opportunities to speak in front of a larger audience, for example during an assembly.
- Providing opportunities for the children to become a storyteller for an authentic audience.
- Providing opportunities for the children to present to an audience, chair a discussion and hold class meetings.
- Encouraging the children to talk for a specific purpose, e.g. to persuade or to entertain.
- Encouraging children to work in groups to collaboratively solve a problem.




Mini Mathematicians!

Middle Fell Highlights



In October we had our Ofsted inspection, we are so pleased to say we have been rated as 'Good'.






For the youngest children, why not read them **Whatever Next**, by Jill Murphy or **Owl Babies** by Martin Waddell.






