Spring	1	Forces and Magnets National Curriculum coverage to be taught at differentiated Developmental steps. - Explain that unsupported objects fall towards the Earth because of the force of gravity acting between the Earth and the falling object. - Identify the effects of air resistance, water resistance and friction, that act between moving surfaces. - compare how things move on different surfaces. - Recognise that some mechanisms, including levers, pulleys and gears, allow a smaller force to have a greater effect.	Electricity National Curriculum coverage to be taught at differentiated Developmental steps. - Identify common appliances that run on electricity. - Construct a simple series electrical circuit, identifying and naming its basic parts, including cells, wires, bulbs, switches and buzzers. - Identify whether or not a lamp will light in a simple series circuit, based on whether or not the lamp is part of a complete loop with a battery. - Recognise that a switch opens and closes a circuit and associate this with whether or not a lamp lights in a simple series circuit.	Forces and Magnets National Curriculum coverage to be taught at differentiated Developmental steps. - notice that some forces need contact between two objects, but magnetic forces can act at a distance - observe how magnets attract or repel each other and attract some materials and not others - compare and group together a variety of everyday materials on the basis of whether they are attracted to a magnet, and identify some magnetic materials - describe magnets as having two poles - predict whether two magnets will attract or repel each other, depending on which poles are facing.
