Jesus Presented in the Temple

²² When the time came for the purification rites required by the Law of Moses, Joseph and Mary took him to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord ²³ (as it is written in the Law of the Lord, “Every firstborn male is to be consecrated to the Lord”), ²⁴ and to offer a sacrifice in keeping with what is said in the Law of the Lord: “a pair of doves or two young pigeons.” ²⁵ Now there was a man in Jerusalem called Simeon, who was righteous and devout. He was waiting for the consolation of Israel, and the Holy Spirit was on him. ²⁶ It had been revealed to him by the Holy Spirit that he would not die before he had seen the Lord’s Messiah. ²⁷ Moved by the Spirit, he went into the temple courts. When the parents brought in the child Jesus to do for him what the custom of the Law required, ²⁸ Simeon took him in his arms and praised God, saying:

²⁹ “Sovereign Lord, as you have promised, you may now dismiss your servant in peace.
³⁰ For my eyes have seen your salvation,³¹ which you have prepared in the sight of all nations:
³² a light for revelation to the Gentiles, and the glory of your people Israel.”
³³ The child’s father and mother marveled at what was said about him. ³⁴ Then Simeon blessed them and said to Mary, his mother: “This child is destined to cause the falling and rising of many in Israel, and to be a sign that will be spoken against, ³⁵ so that the thoughts of many hearts will be revealed. And a sword will pierce your own soul too.”³⁶ There was also a prophet, Anna, the daughter of Penuel, of the tribe of Asher. She was very old; she had lived with her husband seven years after her marriage, ³⁷ and then was a widow until she was eighty-four. She never left the temple but worshiped night and day, fasting and praying. ³⁸ Coming up to them at that very moment, she gave thanks to God and spoke about the child to all who were looking forward to the redemption of Jerusalem.³⁹ When Joseph and Mary had done everything required by the Law of the Lord, they returned to Galilee to their own town of Nazareth. ⁴⁰ And the child grew and became strong; he was filled with wisdom, and the grace of God was on him.

Message from Mr Catlow

This week, Parentkind, the national parent body, published two new pieces of government-approved guidance to help schools and families navigate concerns and complaints in a constructive and respectful way. The guidance is national, independent of our school, and designed to support positive relationships between parents and schools.

The documents are:

- A Parent Guide to School Complaints
- A School Guide to Parent Complaints

They set out clear expectations about how concerns should be raised, what parents can expect from schools, and how issues are best resolved. A key message throughout the guidance is the importance of raising concerns directly with the school, rather than discussing them on social media or in public forums. Doing so allows issues to be understood properly, handled fairly, and resolved more quickly in the best interests of young people.

We welcome this guidance and strongly encourage parents and carers to take a few minutes to read it. We are always committed to listening carefully, responding professionally, and working in partnership with families when concerns arise. Equally, following an agreed process helps ensure conversations remain respectful, balanced and solution-focused.

The guidance is available via our website, and we hope it provides reassurance and clarity for parents about how concerns can be raised and addressed effectively.

Supporting Families with Smartphone Use

In recent weeks, the government has published updated guidance for schools on mobile phone use, alongside changes to legislation around children's access to social media. These developments reflect growing national concern about the impact of smartphones and online platforms on children's wellbeing, behaviour and development.

In response to this, I am considering signing the school up to the Smartphone Free Childhood movement. This is a parent-led initiative that aims to support families in making informed, confident decisions about smartphone use — particularly around delaying access where possible and setting healthy boundaries.

This is not about blame or judgement. I know that parenting in the digital age is complex, and families face real pressures. My aim is simply to work alongside parents, share evidence and guidance, and create space for open, respectful conversations about what best supports our children's wellbeing, focus and social development.

As part of this, parents may be interested in an upcoming Smartphone Free Childhood discussion event taking place locally, that I will be attending at Hutton Village Hall on the 25th February 6-7pm.

This event is open to parents and carers and provides an opportunity to hear more about the movement, ask questions, and discuss practical approaches to smartphone and social media use with other families.

I will continue to keep parents informed as we consider our next steps and welcome thoughtful, constructive dialogue on this important issue. As always, our focus is on working in partnership to support our young people to thrive — both in school and beyond.



Additional Careers Activities in School Next Week:


