Dear Parent/Carer

It has been a real joy seeing the new pupils get involved in many things for the first time and listening to how much they have enjoyed. Our new staff have also made a very quick and significant impact on school life and the departments they are working in. It is a privilege to not only plan a stretching and ambitious curriculum but to now have a full team who can deliver this to all pupils.



JEANS FOR GENES DAY

It was fantastic to see so many pupils and staff sporting their jeans on Friday 30th September 2022, in support of Jeans for Genes Day.

Thank you for your cake and biscuit donations for the Jeans for Genes bake sale. It raised a super £75! As well as wearing their jeans, pupils in key stage 3 had the opportunity to take part in special science activities linked to Jeans for Genes Day.


"The key stage 3 science sessions were designed around showing pupils the real-life application of topics that they are currently studying," said Miss Keel, Head of Year 9, Teacher of Science and organiser of the event. "The Year 7's learnt about a child living with sickle cell anaemia and were able to apply their understanding of red blood cells to understand the difficulties these individuals would face, before using their new practical skills to extract DNA from a kiwi."

"Year 8 considered ethical issues surrounding genetic modification and genetic testing, and Year 9 used their understanding of inheritance of characteristics to create marshmallow Reebops, and used their knowledge of the respiratory system to consider the difficulties faced by individuals with cystic fibrosis."

Altogether pupils and staff raised £390.74 for the charity, which makes the running total for 8 years £3722.65. The money raised on Jeans for Genes Day funds the work of the Jeans for Genes campaign.



The campaign raises awareness of the daily challenges faced by those living with a genetic condition and raises money to fund projects that make a tangible difference to the lives of those affected.

THE RUGBY LEAGUE WORLD CUPS STOP OFF AT ARCHBISHOP TEMPLE CHURCH OF ENGLAND HIGH SCHOOL

We were delighted to welcome The Rugby League World Cup trophies into school on Monday 3rd October 2022. The Men's Cup trophy, Women's Cup trophy and Wheelchair Cup trophy took centre stage in our main school hall.

Our school rugby teams had the opportunity to see the Rugby League World Cup trophies and find out a bit more about the Rugby League World Cup 2021 (RLWC2021).

"This is very important for our pupils as it allows them to witness first hand three prestigious trophies," said Mr Gray, Teacher of PE. "The Men's Rugby League World Cup Trophy is the second oldest world cup trophy in the world."

Over the past year, the trophies have crisscrossed the country on tour, even visiting Buckingham Palace! They have completed over 200 visits, stopping off at the seventeen host towns and cities of which Preston is one. Preston is hosting the Men's Welsh Rugby Team for the Rugby League World Cup 2021.

The Rugby League World Cup 2021 is one of the most inclusive and diverse sporting events ever hosted in England, promoting the men's, women's and wheelchair competitions.

"It is a privilege for pupils from Archbishop Temple Church of England High School to be involved in promoting the Rugby League World Cup," said Mr Gray. "We are hoping to be



able to watch the Men's Welsh Rugby Team train at UCLan Sports Arena."

"I love playing rugby," said Charlotte, in year 7. "Seeing the trophies in school is really exciting, it makes me want to go and watch a rugby match." "I really enjoy playing rugby at Archbishop Temple," said Rose, in year 7. "It is really inspirational to see the Women's World Cup and to see women play rugby."

Ryan Allen, Rugby League Development Officer from Preston North End Community and Education Trust, has been working with pupils, promoting rugby league in school and giving pupils opportunities to play in rugby league teams and assist with training. Preston North End Community and Education Trust has supported the formation of a new rugby

league club in the city, the Preston and South Ribble Rabbitohs, which now has an under 13's team.

Preston North End Community and Education Trust is working alongside Preston City Council, the Rugby Football League and the University of Central Lancashire to develop participation and interest in rugby league ahead of the Rugby League World Cup.

PUPILS IN YEARS 7 AND 8 LEARN ABOUT MAGNETS AND ELECTROMAGNETS IN A FUN BAE SYSTEMS ROADSHOW



We were delighted to welcome the team from the BAE Systems Roadshow into school today. The team delivered a fantastic, informative roadshow on the theme of Magnetism and Electromagnets to all of our pupils in years 7 and 8.

It began with a short video explaining how magnets are used in science and technology, before the presenters whizzed in on electric scooters to talk about attraction and repulsion. Next, Mr Magnet, the magician, conducted his disappearing coin trick, before the team explained why coins are magnetic.

Did you know that 268 magnets and electromagnets can be found in a Mini car? Twice as many can be found in an electric Mini! The team explained that magnets and

electromagnets are used in planes and ships and that is why the Royal Navy and Royal Air Force, BAE Systems' education partners, are keen for young people to know why and where magnets are used. The team showed pupils where magnets are used in appliances and how they work, this was followed by a fun rapid fire quiz.

It was fascinating to learn how magnets are used in pilots' headsets, as well as finding out where they can be found in the F35 fast jet. The fun roadshow included more magic tricks, with Mr Magnet showing us some more trickery with magnets in The Great Weight-lifting Challenge, with pupils finding out which sort of magnets can be used in switches and how they can make a simple electric motor at home.

Pupils also learned about the importance of using magnets to enable vehicles to use electricity, rather than fossil fuels, which in turn helps the environment. In 3 years time, the RAF tutor planes will all be electric and at the moment, BAE Systems is developing electric aircraft.

Finally, pupils saw the power of magnets when Mr Magnet was hoisted up in the air, held simply by a powerful magnet. This fun and engaging roadshow clearly inspired many of our pupils to think about careers in science and engineering, as well as considering other roles at BAE Systems, the Royal Air Force and Royal Navy.

YEAR 10 GEOGRAPHERS ENJOY A TRIP TO ICELAND

Year 10 Geographers had a fantastic time in Iceland on their Geography field trip. Pupils enjoyed hiking to the Fagradalsfjall lava fields and Solheimjokull glacier, walking behind the famous Seljalandsfoss and Skogarfoss waterfall, exploring the coastal formations and Black Beach near Vik, and investigating the cultural scene in Reykjavik. Pupils especially loved the geothermal swimming pools at the Secret Lagoon and Laugardalslaug, where they made friends with the locals!



This book was runner-up for the Guardian Children's Fiction Award.


The Agathas

The Unmorrow Curse


Two friends awaken a world of myth and magic in this epic middle grade fantasy perfect for fans of Rick Riordan.
