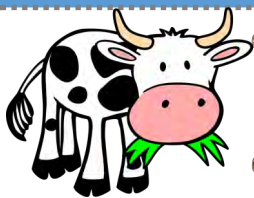
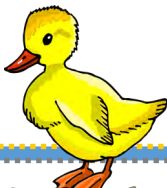
# Little ADVENTURES

Sadly, the little ducks had to go back a couple of weeks ago, but it was a great learning opportunity that the students will remember for quite some time.

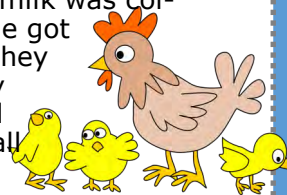

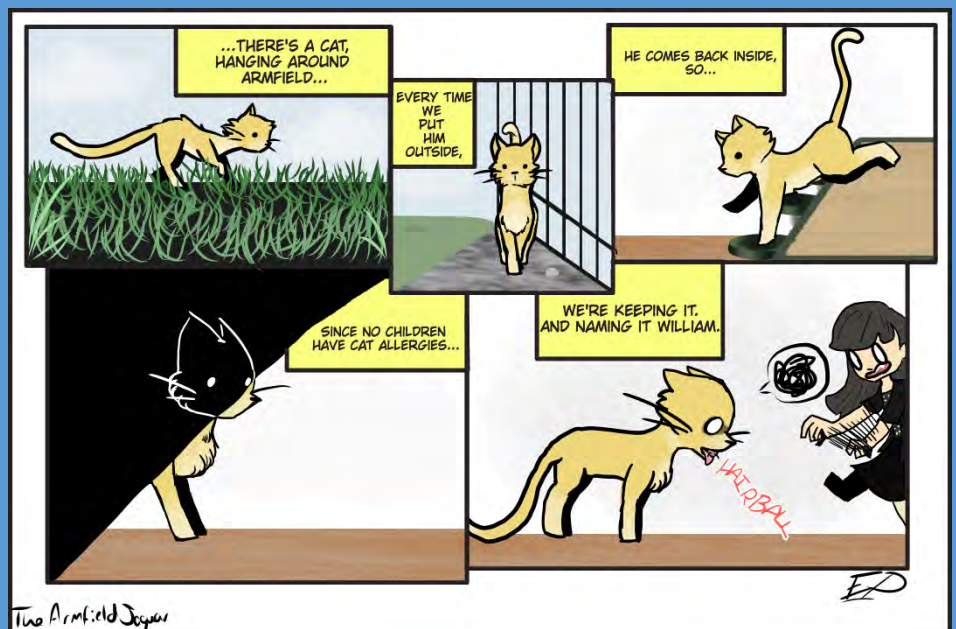
