Welcome to our Easter 2021
Newsletter. It is little over a year since I first wrote to you explaining that our school would be closing due to the global pandemic. At that time, I stated that there will be some challenges ahead, but, together, we will meet them 'head on' and nothing is

insurmountable that collectively we cannot solve together; in the end we would come through this... and we are.

Since the very start, back in March 2020, we have worked together and we will continue to work together. We are solving the many issues that we face albeit one day at a time. Social distancing and lockdown are proving to be a challenge for everyone and I have every sympathy and admiration for all of you given the pressures placed upon parents and carers over the course of the last year and in particular the last few months. Hopefully, as we project forward the Prime Minister's 'Road Map', along with the gradual lifting of national restrictions, we can look forward to some semblance of normality. The staff and I are fully aware that it has been a difficult time for families and, in particular, our students - not to mention our younger children who struggle to really understand what is going on. New Look Primary Playground

The Primary playground had an amazing makeover during the Autumn half term. From early ideas to design to installation, we are so happy to see the project completed.

We wanted open-ended floor markings that enable the children to create their own games. All staff are trained on how to best use the markings and support the children using them. This type of exercise helps to build stamina, resilience and team building skills whilst supporting the children's physical development. The design is called "Wolf and Black Widow" and the children have found themselves on an adventure by exploring the web-inspired tangled structures. The play apparatus is designed to strengthen children's coordination, balance and endurance as they use it. A path acts as an entry-exit point and the children have loved playing on their new outdoor play structure.

We have thoroughly enjoyed welcoming our students back into the building and we are now excited for what the summer term will bring!




YEAR 9


In Year 7, we have been looking at using our IT skills to get creative and have now moved on to input and output devices.

It has certainly been a busy term in Year 8 English with lots of fantastic remote learning taking place, all themed around the topic of

travel and employment. Students have been developing their non-fiction reading and writing skills and we began with an adventure on the world-famous Orient Express! Students conducted research into what it would be like to journey on this luxurious train and then wrote an imaginative review of their experience.

Following on from this, pupils then received an insight into

the process of seeking employment by applying for a job as a steward/stewardess on board The Orient Express. Students considered the skills required for this particular role and were then tasked with filling in an application form, complete with a personal statement. The next step in the employment journey required students to write a formal letter of application and then, in the final part of the process, they had to imagine that they were attending a formal interview and imagined the types of 'open questions' they would be asked, and the answers they would need to give in order to be successfully appointed.

Wherever possible in English, we teach students literacy skills which will benefit them in the real world, and this topic has provided students with valuable experience which they will be able to use in the not-too-distant future when they come to apply for work or higher education.

The final part of our topic has focused on the use of rhetorical devices where students have been challenged to use language to persuade a reader to stay in a hellish hotel and analyse an advert attracting visitors to their hometown. The students have worked incredibly hard this term, in very difficult circumstances, and we are extremely proud of the resilience and commitment to learning which has been shown.



Year 9

'The Man Who Eats Road Kill!'... well if that didn't put you off your breakfast, lunch or evening meal, we're not sure what would! This was the title of the documentary that hooked our Year 9 students in this half-term as we embarked on our 'Non-Fiction Viewpoint Texts' scheme of work. Kicking off with the controversy surrounding the consuming of roadkill allowed students to really develop their own voice and opinions before exploring the importance of acknowledging counter arguments - no matter how strong their perspectives may be!

Moving through writing unit, Year 9 pupils have had the opportunity to develop their own viewpoint writing as well as acknowledging and analysing the opinions shared by others – notably those of famous faces and influential voices, such as Marcus Rashford and Barack Obama. Throughout the scheme of work, opportunities to hone in on a variety of sophisticated writing skills and techniques has seen their work flourish. If you are the parent/carer of a Year 9 student, ask your child what 'hypophora' is... Oracy and the power of speech has added another dimension to the learning this term; offering students an outlet to share and rant about current affairs and community conflict – all vital life skills and communicative strategies that students will find beneficial across other subject and curriculum areas. We strongly suggest that Year 9 students should now come with a warning: Approach with caution and armed with skills for debate... if you dare!

Spring is a time for new initiatives, and in the MFL department at Armfield we have certainly enjoyed developing our online curriculum this Spring Term. We are so impressed by how well many of our students have engaged throughout the half term, learning about the French education system in Year 7, daily routine and food in Year 8, and exploring education and future plans in Year 9. Students have been joining us for live lessons, accessing content pre-recorded by their class teachers, and, most importantly, getting competitive in our weekly slot of French bingo. 'LOTO!'



As Year 9 were hurtling towards their Options ahead of Key Stage Four, the MFL curriculum provided the opportunity to explore future careers that language learning can offer. We've been getting busy in...

Our budding scientists have continued to blow us away this term, despite the majority of the time being through remote learning. Staff have listened to feedback and adapted whilst learning new skills. We have been incredibly proud of the hard work which the vast majority of the students have inputted despite the challenging circumstances.

Over the term, our Year 7s have been learning about cells and energy. Year 8 students learnt about the body and how we can keep it healthy, including how we gain energy from our food. The Year 9 cohort has been revisiting two topics from Year 7 (atomic structure and energy) as a starting point and then building upon their knowledge to understand the

key points of chemistry and physics. The science team is very competitive and, as a result, have been seeking out multiple opportunities to enter both local and national competitions. Before Christmas Year 7 and 8 students designed scientific Christmas cards with the top 3 going forward to be judged against other schools that form



the Ogden Trust Partnership of the North West. Fingers crossed for some top placings again this year! Miss House has led on two opportunities, with our top entries being forwarded to Baylab as part of their national competitions. The first challenged students to think about healthy and balanced diets. Run in collaboration with the PE department, students were tasked to design a healthy meal.

Drawing on their knowledge of the heart and body systems, we have been wowed with menus which would not be out of


place in Michelin starred restaurants. All secondary students have been tasked with designing their own lab coat. We have been blown away with the standard of the entries and selecting the top 5 from each class became an incredibly hard task. These have all been entered and are hopeful that we will win the overall competition, the school prize being a class set of lab coats!

Over the Christmas break, we had 2am Designs come and install the artwork which our amazing technicians have been working hard on. Bespoke to our school, the science corridor now allows students to take a journey through space with information about each part of the solar system. Coinciding with the physics topic of space, we hope to inspire the next

generation of astronomers and astronauts! To follow up on this, as part of careers week, we tasked all students in the department to think outside the box and discover STEM

based careers which they might previously not have known about. We have been excited to help students discover the wide and diverse jobs which are available and help inspire them to follow dreams and aspirations.

We have been provided with excellent video resources from our local links. The Ogden Trust in partnership with Lancaster University and Future U have recorded some



exceptional video material to support the development of the physics curriculum and also a range of videos for our primary students to watch. These videos use equipment which we do not currently have in school and form part of the travelling roadshow, which we have hosted previously. We are excited to start using these in class when appropriate. One of our local colleges, Blackpool and Fylde, has

recorded videos of some exciting practical techniques where they hope to support learners who may not have had access to the school laboratories over the last few months. They have given us permission to share the link if you would like to watch and discuss with your children. Please note, some of the content may not have been covered so far in school with all year groups.

Friday 5th March saw the start of Science Week. The theme for this year is innovation for the future. This week coincided perfectly with the students returning into school and face to face teaching. As a department, we have looked at

global events and ideas to inspire whilst challenging our young minds. Students in years 7 and 8 were given a task to complete, direct from NASA! As Perseverance landed on

Mars, this has sparked them to start thinking about how we could colonise the planet, with the main concern being how food would be produced. Students were asked to carry out an investigation into the factors which affect the growth of plants, with a focus on the colour light which the plants received. Carefully watering each plant with



the same amount of water each day, students have nurtured their plants and taken precise measurements of their daily height. Across the class and indeed the department, results and findings were shared and an individual report back to NASA was produced. Year 9 students were welcomed back with a CSI task. A body had been found in



Salterstown University. Due to the amount of call outs the team had recently received, the police asked for Armfield Academy's help. Not one to turn down a

challenge, we accepted, so received multiple samples from the crime scene for analysis. Students have been judged on both their teamwork skills and the quality of their written reports and successfully managed to crack the case.
