Messages/reminders from the Year 3 team:

A reminder that 3C will be making pizzas on Thursday 27th February and 3A will be making pizzas on Friday 28th February.

School will be able to provide the ingredients for making the pizza base and the tomato sauce, but we ask that parents/carers provide the children with the additional toppings they have chosen.

The children will make a small pizza (7" max) so will only require a small amount of ingredients. We also ask that, if possible, the toppings can be pre-cut at home, so that the children can focus on assembling their design. The ingredients will be stored in a fridge until they are needed in the afternoon, so it would really help if they are labelled with your child's name.

As we will not be able to cook the pizzas in school, the children will bring them home in a small pizza box (provided by school), and the pizza will just need cooking in your ovens at home for around 10 minutes.

The children will not need money as there is no opportunity for them to buy anything. All children will be provided with a school packed lunch as this cost was factored into the trip price. They will also have an ice cream that has been made at the farm.

We will be leaving school at 9:15am and return to school by 3:35pm, traffic permitting.
