The big topic of conversation this week is obviously the upcoming industrial action that is taking place next Wednesday. This is not something that anyone in our profession enjoys and we understand that it causes a headache for our parents. However, it is something that is beyond the control of the school and is a dispute between the unions and the Department for Education. The NEU is the largest education union and therefore, the action proposed by them is going to affect a huge number of schools across the country. The following excerpt is from the NEU website and details why they are calling for strike action:

Teachers are facing the worst cost-of-living crisis in a generation. Members tell us they are struggling with energy costs and childcare and many are now worried about mortgage payments and how they will cover the rent. While bills are soaring the only thing that seems to be going down is the value of our pay.

The pay offer of 5% for most teachers in September 2022 was well below the soaring level of inflation – so this was a real term pay cut of over 7% in 2022 alone to add to the already major real terms pay cuts between 2010 and 2021. To add insult to injury the pay offer is not fully funded. Teachers have lost 23% in real terms against RPI inflation since 2010 and educators are leaving the profession in their droves.

One in eight teachers leaves the profession after just a year in the classroom — one in three within five. Parents know that teacher shortages are harming education and poor pay is driving teachers away from their children's schools. Our polling shows they support teachers acting to protect education standards.

The Government has failed to provide funding to pay teachers properly for the vital work they do despite all the evidence that teachers are the bedrock upon which good education is built.

We have provided strong evidence that a fully funded above-inflation pay increase is needed but this Government has not listened. Now, we need to act together, as a profession, to make it see sense.

We have completed a risk assessment in school to determine whether it is safe for the school to remain open to all pupils during the strike. The outcome of this is that it is not which is why we are closing certain classes. Some of you have already asked some good questions regarding our decision and I hope to address these in the Q&A section below:

- Why don't you use supply teachers? We use a very reputable supply agency for cover when staff are sick or on training courses. Their staff are all highly trained, fully qualified and have had thorough checks made to ensure their suitability for working with children. In the past, we have tried staff from other agencies but they have not been the quality that our children deserve. Our agency has told us that they are not able to provide staff to cover striking teachers.
- Why don't you use your TAs cover the classes when teachers are striking? We have an excellent, professional and highly capable team of TAs at Arno Vale. Generally, they are used to support our more vulnerable children or children with special educational needs. If we used them to cover the classes, it would leave those children who really need them unsupported which could result in issues for them and the other children in their classes. Before Christmas, we had hoped to recruit another TA to strengthen the support we give the children but our



finances would not allow. This is because the annual pay award that staff received was not fully funded by the government and most of it had to come from the school budget.

- Why aren't you providing remote learning for those children who will not be able to come into school? Striking teachers are not obliged to provide any learning for the children. It would then be up to the other staff in school to do this. This would be an unfair additional task for them to do as those teachers who will be in school will have their classes to teach and the other responsibilities that go alongside this.
- I have heard that you should still provide places in school for the vulnerable children or those of parents who are key workers, are you going to be able to do that? It is something we would like to do but is not statutory and is dependent upon the risk assessment. If the risk assessment shows that it would not be safe to have those children in school, then we do not have to do it. There are still some members of teaching staff who have not decided upon the action they are taking on Wednesday. Once I know for certain, I can update the risk assessment and see if we are able to offer places to those children.
- There may be other strikes later this term. Can you make a rota so it is not the same children who will not be able to come into school? I understand that if your child's class is affected again, that this may not feel fair. However, creating a rota would not be fair either. At this point, we do not know if more industrial action will definitely take place or if the teachers will choose to strike again.

I have read that you can also use volunteers to cover classes, is this something that you could do? We have some fantastic volunteers who work in our school supporting the children. They have all been DBS checked and have completed some online safeguarding training too. However, they are not trained teachers or TAs and have not had the extensive training that they have had. They would need a comprehensive induction to ensure our emergency measures are understood, that they fully understand our entire behaviour policy. They would also need regular supervision. Because of this, we have assessed that this is not a viable option.

I hope that answers your questions and we are sorry for the disruption that the strike day may cause you. Industrial action such as this is never taken lightly and only when it is felt that this is the last option.

I know that many of the children are keen to bring in their toys to play with at playtime and lunchtime. I would like to ask that you actively discourage your children from doing this; there is a risk that their precious belongings may become broken or disappear. If it is something that your child values, our advice is to keep it at home, thank you.
