AVJS Bulletin: 3rd February 2023

Over the last few months, we have been conducting a review of reading at Arno Vale led by Mrs Blakemore who is our English subject lead. The pandemic has meant that we (and all schools across the nation) have had to consider the learning that was lost during this time. Phonics is traditionally taught in reception and year 1 with a statutory phonics check in the summer of year 1. In year 2, the children who needed extra support received this enabling them to move into key stage 2 (the junior phase) confident in early reading. One of the main changes we have had to make is the teaching of phonics in key stage 2 to address missed learning. All primary schools are required to deliver one of the DfE approved phonics schemes and we have chosen the Little Wandle Letters and Sounds Revised scheme.

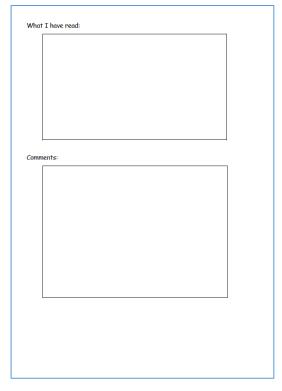
This is also the scheme that Woodthorpe Infants has selected enabling a smooth transition between the schools. Not all children will need to access phonics teaching at Arno Vale and the teaching is carried out as part of an intervention programme. Miss Carter leads on the teaching of phonics in the school. We have also considered the impact of our teaching of guided reading across the school. Classes are taught to develop their skills in reading as a whole class based on texts which are chosen to stretch the children's skills, knowledge and ability in a safe and constructive way. We also support children who may be secure with their phonics knowledge but need extra support with their other reading skills through being part of our regular reader scheme where children read to a trained adult on a regular basis and some children are supported through intervention called Switch On reading. We have been asked if all children read regularly to a teacher. This is important when children are developing their early reading skills and is done through the phonics groups, regular readers and Switch On. Some of our children are confident and competent readers. We encourage these children to develop their knowledge, skills and vocabulary through reading a range of genres and text types. Some of these children will be asked to read aloud in class, some will read to a partner and we will listed to some 'whisper read' during their guided reading session. We have also been asked by some of you why we don't have reading diaries like they do at Woodthorpe Infants. In the past, we have supplied children with them and our research has shown that they are not always used in a junior setting and that for some, there is little impact on developing reading. However, we do know that some people like them and we have been researching how we can encourage reading, allow children to record what they have read and make it enjoyable. After half term, each child will be issued with an Arno Vale Reading



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Challenge Sheet. The sheet gives the children challenges of what types of text to read, where to read them, how often to read them and allows them to record how well they have done and what they have read (there is also space for parents and carers to make comments too). Each Friday during the guided reading session, the children will have the opportunity to discuss what they have read, make recommendations to each other and consider how they may challenge themselves the following week. We will be celebrating reading successes at the end of each half term and then looking at changing and adding to the challenges. We really hope the children enjoy the challenges, vary the range of texts that read and benefit from recommendations from their peers. We want this to be enjoyable and worthwhile for the children.
