Homework is a very contentious issue. Some love it, some hate it and all schools differ in their approach.

At Arno Vale, we currently set more formal homework in Y6 as part of the process to get children secondary ready. In the other year groups, it is about ensuring that children are secure in the basics so that valuable curriculum time isn't spent on revisiting those over and over again. There are also some ad hoc tasks set with the aim of promoting creativity. Recent examples of this include the art competitions posted on Dojo by Mrs Morley, the writing competition organised by Miss Oates and the Easter egg design activity.

Many of us in school are parents and as such, are fully aware of the potential issues (some linked to wellbeing) with homework. Some children spend long hours in school, including attending breakfast club and after school club, and are very tired by the time they get home. In addition, we know many children then have various clubs, hobbies and family activities outside of school that impacts on time available for homework. Time constraints linked to parental commitments around work also need to be considered with lockdown proving how many families struggled to balance the two. The last thing we want is to be partly responsible for battles between parents and children about getting homework done, which can sometimes result in a negative view on learning.

That said, we do always like to base our approaches on any research evidence available. Like many schools, we value the work conducted by the Education Endowment Foundation: a valuable resource

### to help education professionals make the best use of research. Their research into homework highlighted:

The average impact of homework is positive across both primary and secondary school. There is, however variation behind this average with homework set in primary school having a smaller impact on average. The quality of the task set appears to be more important than the quantity of work required from the pupil. There is some evidence that the impact of homework diminishes as the amount of time pupils spend on it increases.

We would like your views on homework and have included a number of questions in the parent questionnaire. We will also be seeking the views of the children. What ever actions arise from our research into homework, one thing is sure, not everyone will agree!

We have a vacancy for guitar lessons for the rest of the summer term. This is a paid for service provided by Inspire. If you are interested, please contact the school office for more information.


