The Opal College bingo is going well. Thank you to everyone who has donated something. I know the items may seem a little unusual, but we will be using things creatively.



**OPAL Programme:** A Message from the Chair of Governors



I wanted to write to you regarding the Outdoor Play and Learning (OPAL) programme that has been launched this week. As Mrs Oldfield mentioned in her letter last week, playtimes are a huge part of primary school, and it is important that this time is beneficial for the children.

As parents I think most of us look back fondly on our primary school playtimes, how we used the skipping ropes not only for skipping but to create outlines of houses or make shapes in the playground for dobby off ground – I think the modern-day name for this is 'floor is lava'! - hula hoops weren't just for hula hooping but for creating hopscotch and the freshly cut grass was perfect for bug houses or pretend campfires. Times have changed and technology has become so enticing and addictive that imaginative play has dwindled.

As Chair of Governors part of my role is to look at the strategic vision of the school and ensure that it benefits all of the children at Arnold Mill. The main aims of OPAL are to improve wellbeing, improve

behaviour and develop skills, all of these changes align with the school's strategic vision. Over the past couple of months, the school has been working hard behind the scenes to bring OPAL to life. I know at the moment it might seem a little unusual when your children come home saying things like "we need to take in old pots and pans!" but the saying 'One person's trash is another person's treasure' feels very fitting when setting out on an OPAL adventure! This week I went into school to watch the OPAL launch assembly. It was lovely to see all of the children engaged and excited about their new playtimes. 

We would like to invite you to attend a meeting about the Year 6 SATS on Thursday 18th April at 3.45pm in class 2F. We will be covering:



**Opal Launch** 



As you may have heard we are teaming up with OPAL College to improve your children's playtimes (<u>link to letter which explains more</u>). In order to do this, we need to gather some 'bits and pieces' to get our site mapped out for fun playtime experiences.

We thought it would be fun if we did this by playing a huge, whole-school Bingo game. Each class will have a bingo board (see below). The aim is for every class to collect all the items as a team.

The first class to collect an item from all four corners will get 10 mins extra play. The first class to get a full row of items will get 15 mins extra play. Then the first class to get a full board will be able to play outside for the whole of a Friday assembly.

We hope you can help us! Second-hand goods are very welcome!

#### **Feedback from Parents' Questionnaires**



Every year we like to gather feedback from all of our stakeholders. We use this to help us make improvements to the day-to-day running of the school and to help children get the best deal from their education setting.

#### This year's findings were as follows:

- 96% of responses stated you are at least 'Satisfied' with the welcome you receive when you come to school. (62% were very satisfied)
  - 97% of responses stated you are at least 'Satisfied' with the communication you receive about school life. (57% were very satisfied)
- 95% of responses stated you are at least 'Satisfied' that your child is making the best possible progress from their starting points. (55% were very satisfied)
  - 94% of responses felt that the school achieves high standards of behaviour.
    - 98% of responses felt your children are happy coming to school.

We had some lovely positive comments about the best features of our school, including:

Good communication, welcome, and atmosphere.

- Great teachers, extra-curricular clubs, and engagement with parents
  - A close-knit feel where children feel safe
    - Inclusive, tidy, approachable
  - Staff really want the best for the children
    - Three people all said 'Everything!'

#### We also had some valuable points raised in aspects we could improve, including:

- More parental involvement
- Better playground facilities
- Changes to the reading scheme to encourage reading for pleasure
  - More choice over school dinners

#### *In light of these points, we are planning to do the following:*

- We will offer more activities for parents to attend. On top of our termly book looks, class assemblies and curriculum activities, we are also planning a sponsored sports day for parents to come along to, and even join in if you want to. We will continue to communicate these events via email, on our webpage and Facebook page, alongside our newsletter, so that you can easily find out more about what is happening in school.
  - We are linking with OPAL College to offer better playtimes.
- We are investing in more books to add to our reading scheme. We understand that children like to read books of their choosing, but we also know they need to have books they can read and understand independently- this is where the real learning happens. We are working on improving the quality of books in each book band, so that children will find more pleasure, reading the books they can learn from.

The kitchen have agreed to trial two options at lunchtime. This way children should have more choice over the meals they eat. We will send out more information once a menu is finalised. As a school we are always looking for ways we can improve and so if you are unhappy about something, please drop me an email. Likewise, we love to hear when we have done something well, so please email when you are happy too.

Thank you to the 53 parents who took the time to complete the questionnaire.

Some prescription medication now available directly through a pharmacist without the need for a doctor's appointment



We all know how difficult it can be to get a doctor's appointment. However, it has recently been announced that pharmacists can now prescribe medication for the following conditions as well as give you advice on a range of conditions and suggest medicines you can buy that can help.

- sore throat
  - earache
- sinusitis
- impetigo
- shingles
- infected insect bites

Patients can access the new service by walking straight into a chemist. They can also be referred by NHS 111, urgent treatment centres, emergency departments or their GP. Those who are not registered with a GP can still access the service.

If one of the seven conditions is diagnosed, pharmacists can give medicines to patients rather than sending them back to their GP. Patients who need more specialist or follow-up care will be referred onwards.

Year 5 & 6 visit to The National Justice Museum: Thursday 21st March 2024



In support of our topic for the summer term on 'Crime & Punishment', we have arranged a visit to the **National Justice Museum in Nottingham**. This visit is always a favourite and provides the children

with the opportunity to visit a Victorian gaol (jail), courtroom and more modern police station and cells. This year, the children will have the opportunity to be Victorian CSI agents as well as learning about the history of the gaol and of Nottingham itself!

The cost of the visit is £12.74 per child (payable via your child's ParentPay account by 14th March please) and this includes return coach transport and entry to the museum, including three one-hour, guided activities. The visit will take place within our normal school day leaving at 9.15am and returning before 3.30pm. The children will need to wear school uniform.

The children will need to be provided with a drink (not fizzy or glass bottles please) and a packed lunch for the trip (please confirm whether you will send a home prepared or ordering one from school) one can be ordered from school – please select the relevant option on the Trip Permission Form). Please complete the Trip Permission Form, which was sent home this week, and return it to the school office by 7th March 2024.
