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## FARADAY STEM CHALLENGE

On Thursday 8<sup>th</sup> November six Year 8 Ashton students took part in the Faraday Challenge at Penwortham Girls High School. The students were tasked with solving a problem. They had to create a prototype, which had to include an electrical circuit that would help during times of humanitarian crises. The group had to narrow down their initial ideas to one that could be built in ninety minutes. They decided to go for a pop up shelter. The shelter had a pressure sensor with a buzzer and a light so that when it was dropped out of a plane a buzzing sound would go off to alert people to its presence. The simple structure could then be used as a temporary shelter before being flat packed ready for its next use.



Unfortunately we didn't come first but the team made up of Martha, Jenny, Chelsea, Adam, Albie, and Daniel did a fantastic job representing our school. They had a great day working together as a team and coming up with one possible solution to this engineering challenge!

## EMPLOYABILITY SKILLS THROUGH STEM



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This week the MTa Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) kit was launched for year 8 aimed at exciting young people about STEM careers and developing team and interpersonal skills. The first task was named 'Tightly Packed'. Each task was aimed at engaging students and focusing their attention on specific STEM qualities.

During our recent visit to Manchester University we met our PHD student. We also got the chance to look around the university. This was our favourite part of the day as we got to experience student life and the kind of place we hope to study at in the future.

We also took part in a lecture about choosing universities and subjects to study. This was an eye opening experience as we had not previously known how many options there are at further education.





Finally, we had our first tutorial with our PHD mentor. Our mentor's topic is "How maths and science can be used to study LGBT health". The other group are studying amino acids.

We now have 6 upcoming tutorials in school before we have to write a 2000 word essay that we will be assessed upon.

## UCLAN LAW TRIP



Our Year 10 students took part in a visit to the Law faculty at UCLAN on Monday 4<sup>th</sup> November. Staff and students re-enacted the trial of Derek Bentley from 1952. Students were selected for the roles of barrister, clerk of the court, witness and defendant. The remainder of the group played the part of the jury.

We learned about the different types of law that are practised in the UK and discussed how society has changed since 1952. We realised that this has affected how law is practised now and how this case played an important part in the abolition of capital punishment. It made us think about how further changes in society may cause a change in how law is practised in the future.

We also visited the Lancashire Business and Enterprise faculty where we had the opportunity to take part in a spaghetti and marshmallow challenge. It gave us a real insight into how we need to be able to showcase our employability skills in assessment centre tasks as part of an interview process.
