

BRINGING CHRISTMAS LECTURES TO ASHTON

The Christmas Lectures have continued annually since the 1825 series, stopping only for four years during World War II. Many world-famous scientists have given the Lectures including Nobel Prize winners William and Lawrence Bragg, Sir David Attenborough, Carl Sagan and Dame Nancy Rothwell.

The 2019 Lectures with Hannah Fry were recorded on 12th, 14th and 17th December at the Royal Institute and broadcast on BBC Four between Christmas and the New Year.

The I'm a Scientist team are allowing school groups to take part in live online chats in January 2020. Their questions about the science and mathematics behind the lectures are answered online by the lecturer and a team of scientists, academics and industry professionals working in related fields.



This week a group of year 8, 9 and 10 students spent a lesson watching the Christmas Lectures broadcast. Students logged in to read the experts' profiles and made a list of questions they would like to ask the experts. The following lesson students chatted in real time with some of the experts, in a 30 minute text based live CHAT session to ask their questions.

REVISION STRATEGIES – TRIGGER WORDS AND CONDENSING INFORMATION

There is no point in worrying about how much you need to revise because you always know more than you realise. It is much easier to remember lots of little things, such as facts and specific details, than whole chunks of text. Be selective with what you learn and refresh your knowledge regularly. There is no point trying to revise and remember whole paragraphs. This is when the highlighter

can be your enemy.

A common revision mistake that you might be making is to highlight all or most of your notes or sit and copy out large chunks of

information. dust + gas cloud gets hotter nuclear fusion: hydrogen -- helium protostar main seq. star outward pressure - gravity heavier star - shorter main seq. hydrogen runs out gravity compresses dense + hot -> expands surface cools -> red red supergiant red giant smallish stars -> unstable ejects outer layer hot, dense solid core left behind neutron star

big stars - more fusion



Students sometimes use highlighters without thinking why they have selected that information to highlight. Highlighting does show that you have read your notes and that is clearly helpful.

However, it defeats the idea of highlighting if all or most of the text is highlighted! A good way to tackle this is to highlight singular important words (trigger words). You need to really think about which words are useful to select. The words you select are words which trigger a number of other memories in your head.

This works particularly well with subjects that require you to revise large chunks of information and case studies.

Look at the example above for Science, taken from CGP's guide to 'How to Revise for GCSE'. This is how you would take the life cycle of stars and condense it into trigger words.


MEET OUR HEAD BOY DAVID RUSHTON






