
Good News for Families

Enjoy reading this Sunday's Gospel

A man came who was sent by God. His name was John, John the Baptist. He came as a witness – as a witness to Jesus Christ. Priests were sent from Jerusalem to ask John, "Who are you?" John replied, "I am not the Christ." "Are you the prophet Elijah then – or the Prophet?" they asked. He answered, "No." "So, who are you?" they asked. "What have you to say about yourself?" John replied, "I am the voice of the one who cries in the wilderness: 'Make the Lord's way straight." Finally they asked him, "Why are you baptising if you are not the Christ, nor Elijah, nor the Prophet?" John said, "I baptise with water. But someone is coming soon who is more powerful than I am." This happened at Bethany, on the far side of the River Jordan, where John was baptising.

Who did John the Baptist come to tell the people about? This weekend we celebrate the third Sunday of Advent which is known as 'Gaudete Sunday', and we light the pink candle on our advent wreath. The word 'Gaudete' in Latin means 'Rejoice!'. We joyfully celebrate that Christmas is near - we rejoice that Christ is coming. Ask your child what the word 'joy' means to them. Each of you say who or what makes you feel joyful. When do you feel joyful? When was the last time you brought joy to others and what did you do? God wants us to be filled with joy - Jesus came to make our joy complete. Happiness comes and goes, but the joy that comes from close friendship with Jesus stays forever.

Joy is something we all desire. We don't have to search around for joy: it comes from within.
When we follow Jesus by loving God and others, we are filled with joy! A joyful heart is a sign
of God's Spirit within us. What can you do to help bring joy to others in this coming week?
Perhaps you can: give lots of smiles; give someone a gift; remind someone that they are loved
by God; cheerfully do what our parents or teachers ask us to do. In these ways we prepare
our hearts to be filled with a joy that lasts long after the Christmas festivities have passed.

What did Mary say just before the Angel Gabriel left? Each year on the last Sunday of Advent, we look to Mary, our heavenly mother. In this Sunday's Gospel, the Angel Gabriel announced God's will, and Mary accepted it and put her trust in God. Ask your child if they know the 'Hail Mary', the prayer based on the Angel Gabriel's greeting in this Sunday's Gospel. Ask your child what else they know about Mary. It may help your child to tell them something you know about Mary, or the Rosary.

Mary is a perfect example for all people - someone full of love and kindness. How can you show love and kindness in this final week of Advent? What other ways can you think of? When Jesus was a baby, his parents, Mary and Joseph, took him up to the Temple to present him to God and make an offering of two young pigeons. Now in the Temple there was a good and holy man named Simeon. The Holy Spirit had promised Simeon that he would not die until he had seen Jesus, the Light of the World. Prompted by the Spirit, Simeon came to the Temple; and when the parents brought in the child Jesus, to make their offering, Simeon took Jesus into his arms and blessed God; and he said: "Now, I can die in peace because you have kept your promise. This child, Jesus, will be a light for all nations." Jesus' parents took him back to Nazareth where Jesus grew to maturity, and he was filled with wisdom; and God's favour was with him.

Who took Jesus to the Temple? This Sunday we celebrate the feast of the Holy Family of Nazareth (Jesus, Mary and Joseph). In the Gospel we read about the Holy Family's openness and obedience to God. Ask your child what the word 'family' means to them. Ask them what they like best about their family. It may help your child to tell them something that you like best about the family.

In the beginning was the Word: the Word was with God and the Word was God. Through him all things came to be, not one thing had its being but through him. All that came to be had life in him and that life was the light of all people, a light that shines in the dark, a light that darkness could not overpower. The Word was the true light that enlightens all people; and he was coming into the world. He was in the world and the world did not know him and his own people did not accept him. But to all who did accept him he gave power to become children of God, to all who believe in the name of him who was born of God himself. The Word was made flesh, he lived among us, and we saw his glory, the glory that is his as the only Son of the Father, full of grace and truth.



From the Gospel of Sunday 3rd January 2021 John 1: 1-5. 9-14 (the 2nd Sunday after the Nativity)

Which words stood out for you in this Gospel, and why? What does the picture make you think about? Enjoy exploring this Wednesday's word, which is **CHRIST**.



"Christ comes among us at Christmas: it is the perfect time for a personal encounter with the Lord. With Christ our life becomes full - everything makes sense." Pope Francis

The real point of Christmas is the birth of Jesus Christ. The Church reminds us that Christ is the Word who became flesh (he is both man and God) and he came to live among us. This is known as 'the incarnation'. Ask your child what they think the word 'Christ' means (parent help: the word 'Christ' means 'the anointed one', the one who is sent to save the world). Christ came to save us from doing wrong - to show us and to teach us how to live good lives. It may help your child if you share something that you know about Christ.



"If you are looking for the way by which you should go, take Christ, because he himself is the way." St. Thomas Aquinas

Jesus Christ is God's greatest gift to the world. His wonderful birth (and indeed his whole life, his death and his resurrection) gives witness to the fact that he is the Son of God. Christ, the 'Light of the World', came to enlighten us - to show us the way to God and to confirm our hope of heaven. He came to draw everyone into his love - to teach us how to live good lives so that we may joyfully share in God's own life. As a family, talk about ways that you can live and love more like Christ in 2021.

Enjoy reading the Gospel

When John the Baptist was preaching he said, "Someone is following me, someone who is more powerful than I am, and I am not fit to kneel down and undo the straps of his sandals. I have baptised you with water, but he will baptise you with the Holy Spirit." It was at this time that Jesus came from Nazareth in Galilee and was baptised by John in the River Jordan. No sooner had Jesus come up out of the water than he saw the heavens torn apart and the Spirit, like a dove, descending on him. Then a voice from heaven said, "You are my son, the Beloved; my favour rests on you."

Which words stood out for you in this Gospel, and why? What does the picture make you think about? Enjoy exploring this Wednesday's word, which is BAPTISM.



"Baptism is God's most beautiful and magnificent gift." St Gregory of Nazianzus

What happened when Jesus came up from the water? In this Sunday's Gospel, Jesus is baptised. He begins his mission to the world when the Holy Spirit comes down upon him - the same Spirit we receive through Baptism and Confirmation. Ask your child what they know about Baptism. If your child has been baptised, ask them if they know who chose their name, and why that name was chosen for them. Ask them if they know what any of the symbols of baptism represent (e.g. candle, water, oil, white garment, the sign of the cross).



Jesus came for everyone: to draw us all into his family so that we can become more like him and joyfully share in God's own life.

Baptism is one of the seven Sacraments which bring us closer to God. It is the start of a life-long call to reveal God's Spirit to our family and community. When we are baptised we become a new creation; we receive the Holy Spirit, to help us to live like Jesus. How can we live more like Jesus as we begin this new year? Perhaps we can: be fair and generous; always try to offer help before we are asked; be peacemakers; be ready to go out of our way to help others; regularly make an effort to let other family members know how much we love them.
