Pupil Premium

This is additional money given to schools to support certain groups of children:

- ❖ Looked After Children
- ❖ Children who have been eligible for Free School Meals at any point in the last 6 years.

Baines' received **£197,600** Pupil Premium in 2014-15, so how have we spent it?



Holiday club and extra curricular activities (taekwondo and instrument tuition) for targeted families. **almost £4,500**



Increased behaviour support for pupils across the school. **almost £3,000**



Reducing the price of netbooks so as many families as possible can continue the e-learning project. **almost £2,500**



Access to trips across school and PGL subsidised for all eligible children who wanted to go. **£6,500**



Support in buying uniforms and equipment. **almost £500**



Additional teacher support for Year 3 and Year 4 in Literacy and Numeracy. **over £49,000**



Additional support for pupil attendance. **over £4,000**



Additional SENCo (Special Needs Co-ordinator) and Inclusion Support time. **about £19,000**

...and the impact?

- OFSTED inspection Oct 2014 "Disadvantaged pupils supported through the pupil premium, disabled pupils and those with special educational needs are well supported and make good progress."
- In Foundation Stage the gap between pupil premium (PP) and non PP children narrowed to 21%, with 45% of PP children attaining "a good level of development" i.e. working at age related expectations in all key areas.
- Our results in phonics were well above national average – all children, including PP, made very good progress. 77% of our PP children attained the required level compared with 71% of PP children across Blackpool.
- At the end of KS1 our Pupil Premium (PP) children had worked so well the gap narrowed to 16% in writing, 9% in reading and disappeared altogether in maths.
- At the end of KS2 our Pupil Premium children made great progress narrowing the gap to less than 4% in all areas; more of our PP children attained either Level 4 or Level 5 in all subjects than the Blackpool average.
- There are more PP children accessing and enjoying extra curricular activities and trips to enrich the curriculum
