Pupil Premium

...and the impact?

- Basic Skills Report July 2016 "school has impressive and detailed systems, understood by all....which translate into improvements impacting on all pupils including the most vulnerable" "Pupil premium funding supports a range of needs including acquisition of basic skills through appropriate interventions, supported by social and emotional development."
- In Foundation Stage the gap between pupil premium (PP) and non PP children narrowed to 14% (21% in 2015), with 50% of PP children attaining "a good level of development" - working at age related expectations.
- Our results in phonics remain above national average – all children, including PP, made good progress. 53% of PP children attained the expected level (44% of PP children met expected standard at the end of EYFS).
- At the end of KS1 our Pupil Premium (PP) children had worked so well the gap disappeared altogether in reading and the cohort as a whole matched national average in maths and beat national average in writing.
- At the end of KS2 attainment improved in writing and EGPS (grammar, punctuation and spelling) and improved significantly in maths; the gap for PP children disappeared altogether in writing.
- There are more PP children accessing and enjoying extra curricular activities and trips to enrich the curriculum
- Attendance is school is improved both for all pupils and for the PP children.
