The 'Balshavian' Guide to Balshaw's.

The 'Balshavian' welcomes yo to Balshaw's. On joining us, you are bound to find some things new to you, and in order to help, we have listed some points which we hope you will find interesting and/or helpful. We are not, of course, trying to take the place of your Form Mistress, who is your real guide to the School and its life.

The Balshavian'. This is our School Magazine, which we publish once a term. You will hear more about it soon, but meanwhile, this is one of the services it provides for boys and girls in the School. The weekly Newsletter is another.

The School Day. The School Day begins at 8.50 a.m. when the first bell is rung and you are free to enter the School. If the weather is bad you are free to enter the School before 8.50 a.m., but you do not go to your Form Room until the first bell is rung. When the second bell is rung, by which time you should have put your hat and coat in the cloak room, you should go to the School Hall for morning assembly.

Morning Assembly. In the Hall, boys sit on the left, girls on the right, but there is no need to sit in form groups. The Head Master will enter after the third bell is rung, and you should stand as he enters. The hymn and the Lord's Prayer are sung by everyone, and the reading from the Bible is given by a Prefect. Pupils sing 'Amen' after each prayer.

When morning assembly is over, pupils file out a row

at a time and go to form meetings.

Form Meetings. Be prepared to answer your name as the Roll is called, and get your books ready for the lessons ahead.

Be ready to change rooms for some Between Lessons. Be ready to change rooms for some lessons - the plan overleaf might be helpful here. Wait outside Science Laboratories: go into other rooms and sit down. Keep to the left in corridors, DO NOT RUN, and take EXTRA care on the stairs.

This lasts from 10.45 a.m. until 11.0 a.m. Break. Milk is available in the Dining Room (see the Plan). In fine weather you should then go out to the playground. In wet weather, you may stay in School.

Lunch time begins at 12.30 p.m. The times of starting First and Second dinners are indicated by the ringing of bells, the first meal starting at 12.35 p.m. In fine weather, you should go outside after your meal. Provision is made on the first floor (upstairs) for you to eat a cold lunch, should you prefer to bring one with you. After lunch in wet weather, boys should go to upstairs form rooms, girls to downstairs form rooms. The first bell for afternoon school rings at 1.45 p.m.

Many School activities take place in the Lunch hour. Watch the notice boards for news of them.

The School day ends at 4.0 p.m. If you are not taking part in an out-of-School activity, leave the buildings as soon as lessons end. It is a good idea to put homework books in your satchel at the time when the homework is set. This saves time if you have to catch a School bus.




