#### NOTE ON SECTION VII.

1. It has been found necessary, as a consequence of Article 15 of the Regulations for Secondary Schools, 1926 (which replaces Article 20 of the Regulations of 1924), to ask in Section VII. for fuller information than in the past with regard to pupils exempt from payment of fees.

2. Article 20 of the 1924 Regulations referred only to Free Place pupils entering from Public Elementary Schools under the conditions laid down in the Appendix to those Regulations. Article 15 (c) of the 1926 Regulations refers to the same type of Free Place pupils, but Article 15 (a) and (b) include all pupils who are admitted free of any tuition or entrance fee for the whole term of school life, whether they come from Public Elementary Schools or other schools. The limitation of the maximum percentage under Article 15 (b) applies to all such pupils, but the requirement of a minimum percentage under Article 15 (c) refers only to Free Places which comply with the conditions contained in that paragraph.

3. The particulars of Free Places at present held in the school should include all Free Places as defined by Article 15 (a). In the statement of Free Places awarded or offered at the beginning of the School Year 1927-28 the column headed "Ex-P.E.S. Pupils" should be limited to pupils who satisfy the conditions of Article 15 (c), and any new awards which satisfy Article 15 (a) but not Article 15 (c) should be included in the column headed "Other Pupils."

4. In Section VII. B. should be included particulars of any free pupils in the school whose awards do not satisfy the conditions of Article 15 (a) or (c), e.g., pupils who entered as fee-paying pupils but whose fees were subsequently remitted or pupils whose awards do not extend for the full term of school life.
