

YEAR 10 GEOLOGY TRIP TO NORTH YORKSHIRE

ON THURSDAY JULY 2ND, THE YEAR 10 GCSE GEOLOGISTS, ALONG WITH MRS BRIERLEY, MRS FLANNERY, MRS HAGGITT

and Mrs Richardson, visited the Ingleton Waterfalls Trail in North Yorkshire. The purpose of the visit was to enable the group to immerse themselves in Geology beyond the classroom so that they could put into practice the skills and knowledge they have developed throughout the year.

Along the trail you can get up close to Yorkshire's oldest rock formations providing millions of years of geological history to piece together. The students walked alongside the River Twiss up to the stunning Thornton Force, completing field tasks along the way in order to establish a complete geological history of the valley. This was done using

sedimentary rock descriptions, dip and dip direction readings, annotated field sketches, identification of structures such as graded bedding, the North Craven fault and anticline folds, observation of glacial deposits and identification of an unconformity. The trail's money tree was an added curiosity along the way!



The weather was perfect with the rain only setting in on the journey home, though the summer temperatures combined with the close proximity to the river resulted in a less than pleasing number of midge bites!

On arrival at Microsoft, the group were met by Mr Andrew Quinn, one of the school governors, who is employed by Microsoft. After a brief introduction, students were shown videos of what Microsoft's core business is planning for the future. They also saw various ideas of what technology may look like in the future.

Students then went on a tour of the Microsoft campus and saw how people worked in relaxed open spaces. After lunch, they watched a presentation from various people who were on the Microsoft Apprenticeship programme. They were given information about both the technical and non-technical roles within the company.

Teachers then left the group for a break out session and looked at different types of software from the Education Team. While the teachers



were away, students looked at how they could develop Apps using Touch Develop. They then took part in a gaming competition and some students won prizes for their efforts.

A fantastic day was had by all, and both students and teachers came away having learned new things about technology. The day ended at 4pm and the coach set off, managing to beat the Friday traffic, arriving back to school at 8.30pm.

Nathan likes to race stock cars and was taking part in the Warton Stock Car Club Mini Stocks May Day Trophy.

It was a big step. Three years previously, Nathan had to be airlifted to hospital from the track, after a nasty crash in which he was told that he had come very close to breaking his neck and collarbone. The driver who crashed into him received a ban, and it has been a while since his Mum has felt confident enough to let him back in a car.

There were eight cars in the May Day Race with drivers from 10–16. Nathan was leading as he came to the last corner, but was overtaken in the last moment to take second place.

Nathan says he likes racing stock cars because of the competition adrenaline and the fact that you have to be focused, disciplined and have good spatial awareness. He said



that anyone wanting to take up the sport "needs to be careful and try your best." A car costs about £300 to buy, but then getting it done up to make it race ready can cost thousands more, so it is not a cheap sport. Nathan is lucky as his father carries out all the maintenance on his vehicle as he previously worked for Mini Sport.

THE ECO GROUP AND GROUND SOURCE HEATING

OVER THE PAST FEW MONTHS SENIOR MEMBERS OF BALSHAW'S ECO-TEAM HAVE BEEN CONDUCTING RESEARCH IN TO GROUND

Source Heating for our school. They were asked to look into this eco-friendly heating system, in the hope of making Balshaw's a more green school, whilst saving money on the School's existing energy bills.

Research was carried out into the science behind Ground



Source Heating, different avenues of funding and considered similar schools in the area that also have the technology. The members of the eco-team have gained valuable experience, dealing with industry professionals from Lancashire County Council regarding surveys of the land and numerous companies that install Ground Source Heating regarding costs. The eco-team presented their findings to the Governors at a recent meeting and concluded that at this time, Ground Source Heating is not a viable option for the school to pursue. They found that the cost of installation and the maintenance costs involved outweigh the benefits of the small savings on the gas bills and the eco benefits.

The eco-team are pursuing other avenues of saving energy by delivering a PSHE campaign in School and entering a competition with British Gas to win £100,000 worth of energy saving measures...fingers crossed!
