#### Catch Up Premium Strategy 2019 – 20 Review

NB - The Catch-Up Premium funding will be discontinued in June 2020 and therefore unavailable for the academic year 2020-21 onwards.

#### **Context:**

The literacy and numeracy catch-up premium gave state-funded schools, including special schools and alternative provision settings, additional funding to support year 7 pupils who did not achieve the expected standard in reading or maths at the end of key stage 2 (KS2). At the end of key stage 2 (KS2) pupils take national curriculum tests in mathematics, English reading and English grammar, punctuation and spelling. Scaled scores were used to report the outcomes of these tests and pupils scoring at least 100 will have met the expected standard on the test. A score of 99 or lower means that they have not met the expected standard. Students are awarded with either NS (expected standard NOT achieved) or AS (expected standard achieved).

#### **2018 – 19 Funding:**

In 2018 - 19 221 pupils benefitted from the Catch-up Premium of £7,342 paid under Section 14 of the Education Act 2002.

#### **2019 – 20 Funding:**

In 2019 - 20 236 pupils benefitted from the Catch-up Premium of £7,342. This funding has been allocated on the basis that the school received the same overall amount of year 7 Catch-up funding that it received in 2018-19, adjusted to reflect the percentage change in the size of the year 7 cohort for 2018 - 19 and the year 7 cohort for 2019 - 20.

The numbers of pupils who benefitted from the Catch-up Premium per year group are as follows:

44 in Year 7

37 in Year 8

56 in Year 9

82 in Year 10

19 in Year 11
