We saw Ofsted visit. They confirmed that Balshaw's "pupils benefit from the opportunities that leaders provide for their wider development." This is because there is "a strong sense of school community" which "helps pupils to develop their confidence and character."

Many parents have been incredibly generous in their support for the school library by purchasing books on our Library wish list. Our aim is to have the best library in Lancashire for young adult fiction. Our commitment to developing confident and enthusiastic readers was noted in our Ofsted report in which the Library "is a hub of activity" and "a range of programmes helps pupils to develop fluency and a love of reading." 

Through sales during the interval of Matilda we also raised over £1000 for Blue Skies which supports Blackpool Teaching Hospital Charitable Fund.



#### Return to school.

Students return to school on: Tuesday 5th September:

- 8.30am Year 7 arrive and assemble in the Hall
- 11.30am Years 8, 9, 10 & 11 arrive at the gates and will assemble on the West Wing area.

As always, please remember that if any piercings are done over the summer, that they are done at the start as any jewellery will have to be removed. All make-up, fake tan, acrylic nails will need to have been removed before returning to school. For boys, ensure that they are wearing correct school shoes (not the black trainer-style footwear that is marketed as school shoes).

Regarding groupings for next year, our teachers, Curriculum Leaders, Heads of House and SLT have been discussing our KS3 groupings in school and the need for a refresh of all groups at the end of each academic year. This process has been under discussion over recent months and the determination of these groups has now taken place in readiness for September. These groupings will still maintain and support our whole school policy of mixed prior attainment grouping across our curriculum. Any pastoral concerns or elements have been taken into consideration when allocating groups. These groupings will be in place on student timetables upon our return in September.

- Mr Greaves Mr Greaves has been teaching Resistant



# Could you study A-Levels at Eton College?

This is not such an outlandish idea. Former Balshavians have gone on to study at elite post-16 providers such as Gordonstoun College. The Head Master of Eton College is offering fully-funded scholarships:

Are there talented boys in your current Year 10 who might benefit from a fully funded Sixth Form boarding place at Eton?

If so, we would love to make them aware of the Orwell Award. This is a Sixth Form programme targeted at boys with academic potential, for whom an opportunity to go to a boarding school, free of charge, might be transformative. While students with this profile have been coming to Eton since 1440, and are absolutely integral to our vision of the education that we offer, this award seeks to reassure and encourage boys, especially those with some particular reason to board, that a place at Eton is within their grasp.

Up to 12 free Sixth Form places a year will be offered as Orwell Awards to Year 11 boys studying in UK non-selective state schools.

The Orwell Award will recognise that academic achievement may have been held back by personal circumstance, and so will not be offered to only those with the highest grades. Instead, applicants will be assessed on academic potential and against specific criteria such as if a boy has refugee status or is a Looked After Child, if a boy is in the first generation of his family to go to university, or if they are in receipt of the Pupil Premium.

The Award is named after author and Eton alumnus George Orwell, himself the recipient of financial aid, and aims to give recipients access to a transformative experience. Funding will cover a Sixth Form place, including boarding, and includes additional financial allowances to enable boys to fully participate in the life of the school.




We are always delighted to hear news of the successes of our students outside of school. We have students who keenly pursue a range of talents and interests to a high level. Two of our students have gained international standings in their sports.

Finley Hough is now ranked as the European number 5 after competing in the European BMX Championships in Besancon France. He will go on to compete in the World Championships this August to see if he can maintain or improve his world ranking.

Another talented student is Nadia Breska who gained a 1st place medal in the IAIGC World Championships bronze level in Florida. Despite the early mornings and intensity of the competition, Nadia and her sister, Blanka, were back in school on the Monday morning after flying back!





Another activity which has returned to schools since lockdown has been the opportunity for Year 10 to undertake work experience. It is a huge task to organise work experience for 185 students, but when they get so much from it and the employers provide such wonderful feedback, it is all worth it.
