When children leave our school, we want them to be avid readers who read fluently and widely, who can express preferences and opinions about texts that they have read. We want them to read for pleasure, having had access to a wide range of text types, genres and authors in order for them to make informed opinions about their favourites.

We provide the strongest foundation for our early years and key stage one pupils; teaching a rigorous programme of systematic, synthetic phonics to ensure fluent and confident readers by the end of Key stage 1. High quality stories, poems, rhymes and non-fiction are chosen carefully to develop pupil's vocabulary, language comprehension and love of reading.



My favourite book by Isla in Year 2

My favourite book is The Tunnel by Anthony Browne. I like this book because there are some beautiful pictures in it. On the page when the girl is in the forest, there are animals that are printed in wood on the tree. There is a secret door and a cottage. Book review of Boy in the Tower' by Polly Ho - Yen

Characters and setting

This year we have been working hard to put reading at the heart of the curriculum at Scissett Middle School, not only to demonstrate how important it is for all subject areas but to instil a love of reading in our pupils.

Reading is: opening yourself up to adventure, imagination and new ideas; it can take you to different countries, different times and even different worlds.

Reading has looked a little different at school this year - we have begun to use new and exciting methods for reading, including using our phones and school kindles as well as accessing class texts on the school smart boards.

We have also enjoyed several books as part of our English lessons; Year 6 enjoyed delving into the magical world of "Harry Potter and the Philosopher's Stone" by JK Rowling and spooky Whitby-based mystery "Room 13" by, Bradford born, Robert Swindells, as well as examining extracts from stories from other cultures, beliefs and walks of life in the topic "A World of Stories". Year 7 have read American adventure story "Holes" by Louis Sachar and more recently, "A Monster Calls" a poignant tale of love, learning and loss, by Patrick Ness. Year 8 began the year studying classic novel "Of Mice and Men" by John Steinbeck before rounding out the year with the intriguingly gothic "Woman in Black" by Susan Hill and Shakespearian masterpiece, "King Lear".

Many classes have also recently been following a fictional story by Leeds author Tom Palmer, which has run alongside the Euros. Pupils have had the opportunity to vote on what happens next in which has been very exciting!

We love to read at Birdsedge First School and have been working hard this school year to make sure our School is a 'Reading Rich school'. We have three strands to our Reading curriculum and feel proud of the work we are doing towards each.

Firstly, we make sure children develop the skills they need to read at a word level. We have daily phonics and spelling lessons, weekly spellings and vocabulary and individual reading books for reading one to one regularly both in school and at home.

Secondly, we support children to develop good comprehension skills to understand what they read. This year we have developed a new whole school reading cycle led by Stanley Stamina, Rex the Retriever, Walter the Word Hound and Tina the Text Detective. Four characters who represent the important skills we need to have good comprehension. These are used in daily whole class reading lessons in all ages and stages and we are so proud of the comprehension skills we are growing through this.

Finally, we make sure that the two strands above are encompassed in a growing Love of Reading. We have books of the month in each class and the school entrance to celebrate different themes, authors and genres. We have a school library led and managed by pupil librarians and encourage all children to choose a 'love of reading' book in addition to their individual reading book to share and enjoy at home.

Book: The Hobbit Author: JR Tolkien Summary The gist of the story is that the dwarf kingdom was demolished by Smog so the Prince wanted to get it back. Scissett Middle School Governance

I would like to start by introducing myself to you as the new Chair of Governors for Scissett Middle School. Originally working with primary children, I later worked within a secondary school as a consultant leading on staffing and performance management. Children need and deserve the best, and getting the right people working with them is a key priority for all leaders, governing bodies, and Trusts.

I believe that the care and education provided by schools can and must give all children their greatest chance to have the happy and successful lives that we all desire for them. I believe in a 'no excuses' culture and have high expectations of everyone. In terms of our governing body, we strive too to be the best and to challenge and support the school so that children are at the heart of every decision made. We are a new governing board in the main, but fortunately we have Lorraine as an existing member this academic year to help us learn quickly about the community we are now serving. Having so many governors new to role has presented us with challenges, however, it has also allowed us to choose the very best people to join our board ensuring that we have strong and varied skills so that we can work together yet delegate responsibility to governors with good knowledge of the area they are working with leaders around. Collectively we have experience of working in:

 - Staffing

The whole world has had to learn how to manage and live with a pandemic, whilst at the same time, our children have continued to grow and need champions on the ground to continue the education that they have a right to. The pandemic has touched many of our lives in such drastic ways and given us all so many challenges, but I am proud to say that the whole school community has risen to these challenges.

Health and Safety

Governors are indebted to the work that leaders, teachers, and all staff have committed to and driven over this academic year. From leading my own teams last year, I know how much time, energy and skill has gone into ensuring that both the school has been run safely and that remote learning is fit for purpose. Families have learnt what the term 'first educators' means in the truest sense of the word. Not only have you had to keep household, jobs and day to day life going, but had to work hard to keep learning alive for children at home. You are all heroes to me, thank you for working so closely with the school this year. It has never been so important.

As a board, we have had to find different ways to work and be effective too. We have largely worked remotely. We have had strict structures and worked hard to ensure that we continue to be strategic in challenging the leadership. We strive to continue to support the work of the school.

In overseeing the school budget this year, we have supported leaders to plan staffing to meet the needs of the children after such a challenging 18 months. We know that we need to ensure that children catch up and have their social and emotional needs met now, more than ever before. We will be monitoring this closely this next academic year and working the school leaders to evaluate the impact of their work.



We have worked together in our strategic role:

- to oversee the provision of home schooling for many pupils and in-school provision for children of key workers
- to ensure pupils still enjoy school, feel valued and part of the school community
- to ensure clarity of vision, ethos, and strategic direction
- to ensure pupil attainment is monitored and maximised
- to oversee and approve the school's budget
- to ensure the staff are supported as needed
- to approve policies and procedures
- to monitor the provision for learning

Our board is extremely lucky and proud to be a part of the Mast Multi Academy Trust. The executive team ensure that our governing body is given excellent training and development, strong advice and guidance and the structures we need to be the best we can be for our community. Having such strong support from the Trust Executives allows us to carry out our three core functions effectively. These are:

Ensuring clarity of vision, ethos, and strategic direction

Holding executive leaders to account for the educational performance of the organisation and its pupils, and the performance management of staff

Overseeing the financial performance of the organisation and making sure its money is well spent

This year children have not had their SATs tests as usual and thus there is no local and national data to compare

our school with all other schools nationally. However, our governing body have monitored the internal progress that children have made, and we know the work that the school must do next year to close learning gaps for children and drive progress back to prepandemic levels. We are thrilled to report that most children have made progress in their core learning, they will have learnt far more this year than we will ever know, it just may not be measurable in the usual ways that we are used to.

Thank you once again for all your commitment and engagement with the school this last year. I look forward to meeting you all over the coming academic year and reporting to you all the amazing progress your children have made in 2021/22.

Shelley First School Governance



For the most part it has been business as usual for the governors at Shelley First school, but the last twelve months or so have been anything but usual. A timely move to MS teams by the Mast Multi Academy Trust proved invaluable in keeping us informed and enabled us to continue with our termly meetings and training. It also provided a channel with to keep those informal which conversations going, vital for governors to keep up with the day-to-day challenges that inevitably presented themselves during such a tumultuous period.

The pandemic has given us all challenges that we have never had to face before, making life more virtual but no less complicated. Mrs Knowles and the senior leadership team have faced all the challenges head on and have strived to ensure Shelley First School remains an outstanding, happy and secure environment in which children thrive and develop spiritually, emotionally, socially and physically.

One of our fundamental roles as governors is to give our support to the school, no more so than this year. However, we challenge and question when appropriate to ensure the core values and ethos of Shelley First are continually upheld Our primary focus is the children, and we keep this in mind whilst monitoring and supporting school to:

- Ensure pupils still enjoy school, feel valued and part of the school community this is done by evaluating results from both parent/carer and pupil surveys, so a big thankyou to all that responded.
- Oversee the return to school following both lockdowns, the recovery curriculum and wellbeing initiatives for both staff and pupils.
- Ensure pupil attainment is monitored and maximised, as you may know our attendance rate is well above the national average.
- Oversee and approve the school's budget, we have just recently looked at next year's budget, ensuring that the staffing structure fits within this and whether we can improve the school building too.
- Ensure the staff are supported as needed, we have been involved in putting a wellbeing policy in place and review staff surveys.
- Approve policies and procedures, some new policies have been the phonics policy and wellbeing policies.
- Monitor the provision for learning.
- Ensure the Pupil Premium grant, Sports Premium Funding and Covid Premium are being used effectively,
- Ensure clarity of vision, ethos and strategic direction, we will delve into this more deeply in our last meeting at the end of June, where we will plan, alongside the SLT, the school's priorities for next year. We do this by looking at the current priorities, strengths and weaknesses of the school, results from pupil tests, feedback from teachers, parents, carers and pupils. We also consider the current climate and monetary situation.



New to the Trust this year has been the introduction of the Trust wide development groups. These have been extremely well received by the governors at SFS, evidenced by the enthusiasm with which the meetings have been relayed back to the wider governing body. This year the focus has been on staff and pupil wellbeing and increasing reading opportunities for pupils. A wellbeing strategy has been created, alongside a staff wellbeing policy and pupil wellbeing policy. We will hopefully approve these at our next governing body meeting. We look forward to seeing how the Trust wide collaborations evolve, enabling us to better support the school with confidence and knowledge. We have also attended various Trust training courses such as Safeguarding, Risk Management and Being Strategic amongst others and we have completed visits, remotely. We have also supported staff structure changes and recruitment by being part of interview panels.

We have recently recruited a new member to the board, Chris Hill and he is undergoing induction training and has attended one meeting. We are providing mentoring support as needed to help him fulfil the role.

It has been difficult at times to show just how appreciative we are of our staff at SFS, their resilience, creativity and professionalism this last year has really blown us away. Our usual gesture of a couple of boxes of biscuits and some chocolate in the staff room seemed insignificant, as well as a logistical impossibility what with bubbles and social distancing. This led us to arrange for a mobile barista to be at the school gates, and thus on a rather chilly March morning we joined the staff for an outdoor coffee morning as they arrived in school, and for a short time it felt like old times, with some lovely stories, lots of smiles, and hopefully a morale booster for all.

We would both like to thank you for the support you have given school over the last year, here's hoping that by September bubbles will be a thing of the past and Children at Shelley First School can take part in all of the wonderful extra curricula activities that are the Shelley norm. Hope you all have a lovely summer.

The pandemic has touched everyone's life, giving us all challenges that we've never had to face before, but I'm proud of the way the whole school community has risen to these changes and difficulties.

As a board we've conducted much of our usual business remotely. Mr Taylor and our staff have worked tirelessly to complete risk assessments and put online lessons and procedures in place to minimise the impact on learning and the risks in school. Our children and families have also been fantastic at adapting to live lessons and the changes within school.

Governors continue to support the work of the school and have worked together in our strategic role:

- To oversee the provision of home learning for many pupils and inschool provision for children of key workers
- To oversee the return to school following both lockdowns, the recovery curriculum and wellbeing initiatives for both staff and pupils
- To ensure the suitable monitoring of vulnerable pupils and safety measures within school
- To ensure clarity of vision, ethos and strategic direction
- To ensure pupil attainment is monitored and maximised, and to oversee the assessment and reporting arrangements
- To ensure the recommendations from the Ofsted report are implemented, providing feedback and information during monitoring visits
- To oversee the RSE curriculum consultation and school's careers provision
- To oversee and approve the school's budget
- To ensure the Pupil Premium grant, Sports Premium Funding and Covid Premium are used effectively
- To ensure the staff are supported as needed
- To approve policies and procedures

This year, in addition to our usual Safeguarding, Send and Pupil premium visits, our Subject visits have looked at curriculum changes due to covid and how gaps will be addressed. Our wellbeing visit focussed on the procedures in place to support remote learning for everyone as well as the processes for identifying and providing support where necessary during lockdown and on the return to school. We've overseen the RSE consultation process and the actions arising from the feedback and we've ensured the careers curriculum has been embedded across school. At Middle school the focus is not on particular options or career choices, rather on building confidence, resilience and independence as well as introducing core transferable skills within each subject and the vast variety of career opportunities available, wherever pupil interests may lie.



Trust strategies and make sure they are effectively implemented within school. This year the focus has been on staff and pupil wellbeing and increasing reading opportunities for pupils. A draft staff wellbeing charter has been created, with a pupil charter following shortly.

By carrying out our strategic monitoring role, the Board have enabled the senior leadership team to focus on the day to day running of the school.

Much of our work centres on the governors' own development plan and that of the school

In line with this, we regularly review our roles and the experience, knowledge and skills we individually bring to the Board, ensuring there are no gaps that could affect our efficient governance of the school. We continue to identify suitable training and have attended many virtual training sessions and as Chair, I have also joined other governors for training and forums.

The Trust and central clerking service have been extremely supportive providing training and advice if needed and sharing information and meetings to keep us well informed. All of us attended at least 6 raining sessions over the year.

At the start of the year, we recruited a new member to the board and have provided support and mentoring as needed to help them fulfil their role. The Vice Chair has also attended Chair meetings and some governors have paired up for meetings to ensure there is appropriate succession planning in place.

Next year we will continue to strengthen the Middle Leadership roles, to enable them to shape and drive improvements, within their departments. We will also strengthen pupil's literacy skills and cultural capital by further developing our reading initiative and enhancing curriculum delivery within the classroom.

Thank you for all your engagement and support during the last year. I wish you a lovely safe summer and look forwards to meeting you all over the coming academic year.
