However, if your previous school has a subscription or your drama teacher can arrange a free, temporary pass for a month or so during this period, you can watch various productions directed by Steven Berkoff (I would recommend The Trial), Complicite's A Disappearing Number, and Frantic Assembly's Things I know to Be True.
- Note that the BBCiPlayer are airing Emma Rice's production of *Wise Children*. Rice was artistic director of Kneehigh for some time and you can see Kneehigh's playful approach to theatre throughout the production!

Create a mask of your own (a paper plate would do!) and practice to the camera on your phone or in front of the mirror.
