Getting Started

Thinking about what you might want to do for the rest of your life may feel a little overwhelming - but there are lots of things you can do to get started. Work your way through the tasks below and when you are happy with your results, please complete the google form at the bottom. This information will be shared with your tutor so they know a bit about you before you start and they can help you settle in and get started.

Where do I start?

Now go to: <https://beta.nationalcareers.service.gov.uk/> and complete the assessment. This will suggest some further ideas that might suit you.

Remember that some of the suggestions may seem a little random - these tools are simply designed to get you started and give you some ideas about where to begin the next part of your research.

What are the different careers areas and which careers might suit me?

Next, follow the below links to easily explore a broad range of career areas and find out which subjects/qualifications are recommended for each. You can start by looking at careers suggested by the previous tasks – but do also search more widely. The more career areas you know about, the more able you will be to make well-informed decisions about your future.

There are endless job roles that you may not even have heard of. Try researching a few roles that you haven't heard of before – you may find something a little bit different that appeals to you.

When looking at these career areas, think about whether each career would suit your personality, consider the skills you will need, and look carefully at the qualifications you will need to get a job in this area.

You may already have ideas about the type of industry you want to work in, but you may not be aware of the wide range of careers within it. Using these links will help you to find different roles within career areas that you weren't previously aware of. They will also help you to be sure that you fully understand the career area and what it takes to be successful in it.

Remember – as an adult you will spend a lot of time at work, so finding a job that you love is really important!

Will your sixth form subject choices affect your degree options?

Some (not all!) university degrees and/or careers require you to have studied particular Level 3 courses (**Level 3 means the A Levels or BTECs you will study with us at College**). Hopefully you will now have some ideas about what career you might want to pursue, and should also be a little clearer about what you want to study at university. This means that you can check that you have chosen the right courses to study at College. Follow this link to find out more:

Remember that for the vast majority of degrees your Level 3 grades are more important than your *subjects* – so if you are still undecided after doing this research, stick to Level 3 subjects that you think you will enjoy and are likely to be good at.

If you feel that you may have chosen the wrong Level 3 courses – don't worry! You will be asked about your choices again at Enrolment and will have the opportunity to discuss other options then.
