

Message from Dr Coug

Dear Parent/Carer,

The Year of Challoner is in full flow as we celebrate our Platinum Jubilee and 70 years of the school. I was thrilled to receive a communication from John Welford the son of the very first headteacher of the school, who was also called John Welford. John has very fond memories of the school and we look forward to meeting him in the New Year. Just last week we had a wonderful Mass of celebration with our Year 7 and 8 students, together with our tea party regulars and past students that attended the school in the '50s and '60s. Please look out for extracts from the very first school magazines that are being shared through our social media channels as well as pictures and images from the archives. There are a multitude of other events to celebrate 70 years of Challoner planned across the academic year and we have a very special celebration event taking place in April.

Catholic life continues to thrive in the school and we are absolutely blessed to have the support of Fr John and Fr Toby our new Chaplain. Groups of students attend Mass each Wednesday with students from St Dunstan's school. This term we have held two fantastic retreat days, one for Year 7 and one for Year 8 and both retreats ended with a "teaching" Mass celebrated by Fr Toby. In November, we celebrated Red Wednesday in solidarity with persecuted Christians across the world and in the process supported Aid to the Church in Need. Students and staff attended Mass at St Chad's Cathedral.

Our students continue to live out the mission of our school in such a variety of positive ways. Once again, we have been working with the Birmingham Irish Association to purchase toys to give out to those in need within our community. Working in partnership with a number of our feeder primary schools and several other Catholic secondary schools, we have collected a huge number of gifts to give out. Irish TV again filmed students and staff at the official handover at St Anne's, Digbeth.

We are exceptionally proud of our sixth form students and staff who raised over £1,000 for a local hospice by undertaking a Rudolph run in King Heath park in December. Many an antler and Christmas jumper were on show and we even had a guest appearance from, not one, but, two Father Christmases!

Students continue to support the local Dementia Café and host a regular tea party for local parishioners. We have continued to collect for the local foodbank and made significant contributions to St Chad's Sanctuary.

All of these wonderful acts of kindness, and the many other unseen acts of kindness, give us great pride in our young people. In November we celebrated World Kindness day and asked staff to look out and praise students who displayed a kind attitude.

This year our Remembrance event focussed on the Windrush generation. We projected images and music onto the Sports Centre and wonderful sublimation printed images have been placed at the front of the school. Our usual poppy display was showcased. It was, once again, a very moving tribute.

For the first time, we held an excellence exhibition to display some of the brilliant work produced by our young people. We recognise that there is magnificent work being produced across the school every day, as our students share their talents and we wanted to showcase some of this. Work from all subject areas was displayed as part of both our whole school and sixth form Open Evenings. The Excellence Exhibition was a huge success and no doubt will become an annual fixture.

Across the past few months students from the school have competed at the British Championship Kickboxing Tournament, had trials for Team GB in synchronised swimming, attended a goalkeeping training camp for future Lionesses and represented England Women as part of the U15 UEFA Development Tournament. Our very own Mr O'Connor was also nominated for the Birmingham Awards Contribution to Education and he won this category. He was presented with his award at an event at Villa Park.

In November, Mrs Sarcevic attended an event in London to collect her Silver Pearson National Teaching Award for best new teacher.

We are extremely proud of Mr Ebrahim, Mr O'Connor and Mrs Sarcevic and all our staff who work so hard for our school.







Assemblies

Retreats

During the autumn term Year 7 & 8 will had the opportunity to visit Kenelm Youth Trust at Alton Castle for an overnight retreat at the end of November. Year 7

Year 7 had units on 'Prophecy & Promise' and RSE – 'Who am I?', they are continuing their journey in Christianity as we delve into 'Creation & Covenant' especially exploring elements of our Catholic identity.

This segment of the spiral curriculum is to set students up for motivation success, building on prior knowledge whilst instilling core values, beliefs and teachings that will continue throughout KS3 and into KS4.

Year 10

We have concluded the first theme of our journey in Catholic Theology for our GCSE, Origins & Meanings. Our exam board is EDUQAS and we are following Route B- Judaism in conjunction with the Birmingham Diocese.

Year 10 showed exemplary resilience in their assessment which challenged them to apply their contextual knowledge to questions regarding beliefs, faiths and actions. Students showed application through description, explanation and evaluative judgement in their writing skills. In this year of Character we celebrate the many journey's our students have and continue to be on.

Students are now beginning Good and Evil, which will fulfil the second half of the first component that students study. When we return in the new year our students will begin their RSE sessions on 'Authentic Freedom' where we consider our beliefs, values and attitudes as we learn more about being fully loved and cared for by God who wants the very best for us always.

A Level

It has been a delight to teach our sixth form students and continue to share in the light of our faith as they embark on their academic studies.

Year 12

Year 12 have been studying Morality Ethics, which includes considering the implications of choices made by science, governments and different perspectives from religious and non-religious views. This has allowed for analytical thinking and discernment.





Year 8

To date students have studied: 'Creation & Covenant' and have moved into RSE 'Created & Chosen', where we learn more about how each of us is unique and cherished by God. Students will then move into 'Prophecy & Promise'. This segment of the spiralled curriculum will reflect on how prophecies developed and link directly with Christ.

Year 9

Year 9 have been exploring philosophical questions throughout their units and especially building on their application of contextualisation, analysis and evaluation throughout. Not only have they considered the constructs of Justice, they have been contemplating opinions on the Value of life. We challenge our students to consider different perspectives, review religious beliefs and teachings and evaluate opinions for society today. Students will be moving into RSE 'Search for Love' where we will focus on how each of us is loved and how love is a special part of all relationships.

Year 11

Year 11 have finished the Life and Death unit of Component two, leaving Sin & Forgiveness remaining. We will continue to foster and celebrate resilience, kindness and dedication as they reflected on their learning and apply this to the examination techniques and writing skills.

Our students have the final theme to complete from their GCSE specification – Sin & Forgiveness. Giving us time to revise and practice writing techniques.

Year 13 - Liberation Theology

Looking at injustices that jeopardise a persons' dignity and how we can respond to them using the Gospel message.

Our students have taken time to reflect on choices and their impact in their most recent assessment.

A-Level Philosophy, Ethics and Study of a Religion

It has be a joy to have such a happy, dedicated and thoughtful Year 12 cohort who have begun their studies.

We have been learning about – situation ethics and utilitarianism in Ethical Theories; alongside arguments for the existence of God and challenges to religious beliefs in Philosophy

Students have been learning how they can thoroughly outline ethical theories and philosophical arguments, as well as evaluating their effectiveness, persuasiveness and overall impact.

We continue to share in and celebrate the resilience and dedication of our Year 13 cohort as they review their course content and prepare for their mock examinations in the New Year. They are focused on refining their skills in investigating and critically analysing questions, arguments and ideas and examining their connective natures.

English

Spelling Bee

English's 'Bishop's Got Talent' Spelling Bee took place on Monday 20 November. With Mrs Hodges brilliantly leading the way, 12 students stood up in front of an impressive crowd to demonstrate their spelling skills. Well done to Exaudi Makisi our reigning champion!



KS3 Book Club

Since September, Book Club has been regularly meeting and is made up of a mixture old and new members joining us to read. Over this year, we aim to grow the club so that more students become engaged with reading books that they wouldn't normally pick from the shelf. We have hopes that we can grow the club with a greater range of students joining and immersing themselves in the fictional worlds we are reading about.

Unlike last year, we decided to vary our approach, by reading the same book with the club as staff were reading in the 'Reading Teachers, Reading Students' initiative. We wanted to be able to go back to the group and tell them what students actually thought of the book, rather than just relying on our assumptions of what we think students would say about the book.

Book club is currently reading The Blackthorn Branch by Elen Caldecott, which is a fantasy book about Welsh mythology. Immediately the book captured our club's attention with its bright and bold book cover, however it held little information about the contents of the book. As a group, we began reading the book and were immediately fascinated with the interesting beginning which immediately threw us into the action. We are currently at the halfway point of the book and are receiving positive reviews from the students in Book Club. Their predictions of what is going to happen are extremely imaginative and bold. It is lovely to see how involved they become with the books we are reading and to see their love for literature and reading grow.

Creative Writing

Since the beginning of the new school year, it has been brilliant to see an influx of new members attending Creative Writing Club, which runs for 45 minutes every Thursday. Our newest members are largely KS3 students, with a few returning KS4 students looking to improve their creative writing skills too. We now welcome around 15 consistent members, but always provide the opportunity for any students to come along as little or as often as they like. We began the year with our traditional "Spin the Wheel for a Title" randomization activity, where students each put forward a key word to be written about. This allowed the students to find out more about each other, especially new members, based on the words being put forward.

We have also had a go at rewriting Billy Joel's classic We Didn't Start the Fire song, brainstorming more recent global events and putting them together for students to form their own song lyrics. They then had the opportunity to perform their creations, and I was incredibly impressed with both their writing and their singing! Most recently, some of our members used the final few weeks of the half-term to develop short stories to submit to our first Young Writers competition of the year; their brief, in line with the month of October, was to write the spookiest ghost story in just 250 words. For the second half of the Autumn term, members will now be turning their attention to fantasy writing, using picture prompts and working on using descriptive vocabulary to create the ultimate fantasy setting.

Othello Reading Group

"What from the cape can you discern at sea?"

With the action of the play having shifted from Venice to Cyprus, the first line of Act 2 of Othello – spoken by Montano – might seem inconsequential: a scene-starting question from a secondary character. Yet, as happens so often in Shakespeare, the apparently insignificant speaks to the heart of the play. For what is Othello but an exercise – both for its characters and its students - in looking and trying to work out what you see?

This, fundamentally, is this mission of the Othello Reading Group. To look carefully at the play, perhaps from a new perspective, in the hope of seeing with fresh eyes. Every two weeks, a group of 6th form English Literature students and English Department staff meet to share the reading of a piece of critical writing on Othello as a springboard towards discussion of the play.

Our first meeting of the year considered the chapter on Othello from Greg Doran's recent book 'My Shakespeare'. Doran is one of the country's most respected theatre directors who spent a decade artistic director of the RSC. It was fascinating to the play from the perspective of a theatrical practitioner with the reading including especially interesting insights from Doran's late husband Anthony Sher on his approach



to understanding and playing the character of lago. The term's second meeting considered a character too often overlooked in thinking about the play: Bianca. The group returned to the text of the play and took a 'close reading' approach in an attempt to understand who Bianca actually is. Often described in study guides as a 'prostitute' or 'courtesan', Bianca is typically read as little more than a plot device or contrast to Desdemona's chastity. Nevertheless, like Montano peering out into the Mediterranean, the group discovered that discerning the truth can be a challenging business.

Maths

Key Stage 5

There have been opportunities for student enrichment recently with the senior maths challenge having taken place and a couple of trips approaching. Some of our Year 12 students have attended the Maths Inspiration show at the Crescent Theatre and the Maths Excellence day at Aston University.

Year 12

Our Year 12 cohort performed particularly impressively! There were also 12 bronze certificates: Daniel C, Ciaran G, Lucas H, Charlie H, Jayden J, Eric K, Caitlin L, Samuel L, Harley L, Szymon O, Nedim S, Tyler T.

There were five silver certificates: Callum B, Finn C, Broklen K, Aliabbas M and Daniel Z, and two gold certificates! Joe B scored 112 to achieve the best in school, and marginally pipped Adam A-N to the post, who scored 111. Both Joe and Adam have been invited to participate in the British Mathematical Olympiad Round 1 - something that nobody in the school has achieved before! This is an incredible feat, and they will now need to complete a 3.5 hour paper!

Catholic Games Timestable Rockstars

During the first half term of this academic year, we sent two teams from Y7 out to compete in the yearly timetable rockstars competition at St Edmund Campion. All students had a fantastic time and thoroughly enjoyed the day. One of the teams narrowly missed out on a top three finish, coming in fourth. Both teams performed commendably.



Year 13

12 bronze certificates: Lucy B, Eben D-M, Joe H, Kyan K, George L, Ben M, Shania M, James P, Jericho S, Surya T, Finnian T, and unbelievably one unnamed participant.

There were two silver certificates: Cormac O and Roman W, and then a silver and best in year to Ruby Raven! She has also entered the Mathematical Olympiad for Girls and received a merit – one of the best results we've seen from the MOG in many years.

Year 10 Maths Challenge

This half term we had 10 of our most keen mathematicians going over to Cardinal Wiseman Catholic College to compete with other local Catholic schools. We eagerly await the results of the day and the students who went out to represent the school had a marvellous day.







Primary Outreach and Tolkien Maths Cluster

This year maths have hosted two events involving year 6 students from the Tolkien cluster primary schools. 26 students have taken part in maths activities requiring them to problem solve, work as a team and stretch their mathematical knowledge. Students work in teams of a mix of students they know already, and students from other schools, helping them to practise their social and communication skills. We look forward to a further 4 events throughout the year.



ChristMaths Day

This successful annual event took place on Thursday 7th December and is was led by Mr Sarcevic, together with Year 9 Young Maths Leaders and some Year 7 students. We had 55 Y5 students from 11 primaries joining us for a day of festive activities designed and led by our Y9 Maths Leaders. The activities were designed to develop their problem solving skills, combined with encouraging their communication and teamwork skills. It has also offered them another way to express and develop their enjoyment of mathematics. All of the primary schools who attended had a fabulous day and this was all thanks to our wonderful students who designed and lead all of the activities. Finally, a huge congratulations to the overall winners, St Catherine's Catholic Primary School.





Maths Drop In

We have continued to run the Key Stage 3 homework club every Thursday. There continues to be a great uptake in the drop in and often we have a full classroom of students utilising the facilities on offer. The drop in provides students with a space to get support from teachers if they are struggling with homework or if they don't have access to the internet at home, a space for them to complete their homework.

Senior Maths Challenge

Our Year 12 and 13 A-Level mathematicians undertook the "Senior Maths Challenge" at the beginning of October. Papers were completed online rather than on paper, and it lasted 90 minutes. The maths department enter all our A-Level mathematicians each year, to ensure everyone gets the opportunity to compete, as well as ensuring that students who would not put themselves forward for such a challenge do not get a choice, thus removing the fear of not being good enough. There are often surprising results, with students doing better than anticipated.

The maths department would like to congratulate Joe B and Adam A-N for being successful in the Senior Maths Challenge, and qualifying to take part in the British Mathematical Olympiad competition. This is an impressive feat, with only the top 2000 students nationwide invited to take part. Their commitment to this exam was commendable. Well done!

Science

Curriculum

Since September, students have been working their way through the curriculum.

This term, Year 7 students have been taught the following topics:

Cells, tissues, organs and systems Mixtures and separation Energy.

Year 8 students have studied the following: Ecosystems Atoms, elements and molecules Sound

Year 9 students have been taught the following:
Breathing and respiration
Unicellular organisms
Chemical reactivity
Rocks and their uses
Energy transfers
Earth and space
Static electricity and electromagnets

Both Year 10 and 11 students have been continuing through their GCSEs, whether that is Combined Science or Triple Science.

Year 12 have made a very encouraging start to their A Level courses and Year 13 continue to work hard towards their individual goals.

Open Evening

On Wednesday 20th September we had a very successful Open Evening. Demonstrations by students and staff proved to be being very popular with all our visitors. Year 7-9 students showed visitors how to carry out flame and pH tests; acid and alkali reactions. Electric circuits and microscopes were also available for people to have a go at using. Year 10,12 and 13 students were on hand to demonstrate some of the GCSE and A Level practicals covered in their courses. On Wednesday 15th November, the Sixth Form Open Evening was also a big success and a great advertisement to the public to show the excellent A level provision at Bishop Challoner. Over the years we have attracted more and more external students to studying A Level Sciences so we hope to keep building on the popularity these subjects have for students both inside and outside of Challoner.









Science Club

This year we have a varied group of enthusiastic young scientists who have been attending science club every Wednesday. Whilst science club is primarily aimed at Year 7, it has been lovely to have a number of Year 8 students return and continue to attend, and we have had new students attending in increasing numbers since September.

Science club provides an opportunity for students to extend upon their learning from lessons, and participate in fun practical activities. From October to December, we focus on seasonal activities; before Christmas, students will make acid and alkali chemis-trees and chromatography baubles to decorate the lab! The photos below show the results of the session where students grew their own copper sulfate crystals, and of Bonfire Night science club where they made their own sparklers!








Year 13 Slapton Sands

The Year 13 Biology students visited Slapton Ley Field Centre in South Devon. The area is a National Nature Reserve and a SSSI (Site of Special Scientific Interest). The students stayed for four days and, carried out a range of field techniques and studies. The students visited East Prawle, where we carried out rock pool investigations followed by examining the zones on the beach. The students compared many different species including limpets on the rocky shoreline in an exposed and sheltered beach. All students demonstrated excellent practical and team building skills throughout the duration. The following day, we completed a succession practical to investigate how different plant species changed from the shoreline to the shingle ridge and beyond. During the evening, we investigated the local bats, where the students were able to use their bat detectors to locate the



We also had opportunity to observe the Kingsbridge Estuary on paddleboards, which was an amazing experience for all. The students carried out their own investigation into how abiotic factors changed on the Slapton Shingle Ridge. Here, the students were able to use a range of probes and metres to measure how abiotic factors changed. The students further developed their practical skills and were able to complete many of their practical assessments while in Slapton. The Year 13s were excellent in their approach and attitude throughout the trip. The students impressed the Slapton Ley staff and excelled in every activity they took part in. They were a pleasure to take on the trip and

represented the school as excellent role models. Well done Year 13 Biologists and thank you to the staff that supported the trip. These included S Jameson and D Woodbridge.









London Science Trip

On Friday 29th September, ninety-three Year 8 students visited the London Science Museum. This was an opportunity to explore various scientific concepts and engage in interactive learning experiences. One of the highlights of the visit was the IMAX theatre, where students watched a film on the International Space Station (ISS). The film provided a captivating insight into the daily lives of astronauts aboard the ISS, their experiments, and the challenges they face in space. Additionally, the students had the chance to interact with the museum's exhibits, further enhancing their understanding of scientific principles. The museum's exhibits included interactive

displays on electricity, magnetism, forces, and motion. Students had the opportunity to





generate electricity, manipulate magnetic fields, and observe the effects of different forces. These activities not only reinforced learning, but also provided a practical understanding of scientific concepts. Thank you to all the staff that supported the trip ensuring the trip ran smoothly and was an enriching experience. The staff included D. Woodbridge, J Jones, H Ghoris, A Bibi, O Khitab, and Y Jones. All the students enjoyed the trip and were an asset to the school. This trip not only complemented the curriculum, but also ignited a passion for science among our students.

Personal Development

Year 7

The academic year has exploded to life as students explore Health, Wellbeing, Personal Safety and Citizenship. Year 7 have settled into secondary school life and their lessons in PSHE have been designed to complement the transition process and welcome them to our Catholic community. Students have enjoyed delving into themes such as resilience, friendships, health and wellbeing and healthy lifestyles. With an ear to the ground, pupil feedback has been great — especially the lessons on how to live out a healthy lifestyle!

Year 8

Year 8 have started the year by looking at the Criminal Justice System and have been studying age related laws and the process of law enforcement. Highlights have certainly been our re-enactments of a restorative justice scene and a thought-provoking debate on the powers of the police in the UK. We look forward to consolidating this learning as we continue to study the Human Rights Act and the Equality Act of 2010. I must congratulate Year 8 for the mature way in which they have approached this Citizenship themed scheme of work.

Year 9

The whole of Year 9 have had the most amazing start to PSHE, exploring Health and Wellbeing through our awareness sessions on drugs, alcohol, smoking and vaping. The lessons have been designed to be informative, educational and offer students the opportunity to understand the facts, NHS guidance and the legalities around these sensitive subject areas. Using case studies as the vehicle to exploration, students have covered a broad scope of learning opportunities within a safe and controlled environment, culminating in an awareness campaign project that they are currently working on. The subject matter was further explored



when Aquarius – a Midlands based charity who help people and communities overcome the harms caused by alcohol, drugs and gambling – presented interactive and informative workshops to all of our Year 9 students back in October. These workshops secured the learning that was already taking place in the PSHE classroom, and the hands-on approach was really welcomed by our cohort. We also had Rob Pedley MBE visiting us on the same day and he delivered one of his interactive workshops which he runs in affiliation with the West Midlands Police Violence Reduction Unit. Rob reached out to educate our students about violence and county lines and how we can help to protect ourselves in today's society.





Assemblies and Form Resources

Personal Development continues to thrive through our enriching and diverse assembly and form resource programme. This is delivered weekly to all year groups, in each key stage. Assemblies this year have been delivered by Heads of Year and at all times are relevant to key national and world events and have a strong Catholic ethos. Starting with collective workshop and ending with a 'Going Forth' message, the assemblies are rooted in biblical stories and share our mission statement and our desire for students to exhibit the Bishop Challoner character virtues. Examples of topics that have been covered already this year are; World Mental Health Day, Remembrance, Respect and Anti Bullying Week.

The Form Resource programme continues to develop successfully, each academic year. Utilising our very important student voice feedback, the presentations, which vary from a cultural literacy focus to essential safety and other national days and celebrations, now incorporate an interactive activity for students to engage with. An example of this are when we looked at the Isaraeli and Palestine conflict. Students were presented with factual; age appropriate material and

the focus then turned to the message of Pope Francis and his call for prayer. Students engaged in



writing their own thoughts and prayers and these were collated and displayed in our school chapel. Cultural topics have included the Birmingham back-to-back houses, the Years of Bishop Challoner and we have also focused on Gambling and Gaming awareness and Disability Awareness Day to name but a few! Sixth form also have an additional form time curriculum which is new for 2023 and have sessions orientated around further education, careers and finance. These are further enhanced by accompanying booklets, and feedback is very positive. Their current focus is on Higher Education funding and is responsive to the current financial climate.

Black History Month

October welcomed the celebration of Black History Month and this year it was a key focus across every curriculum area of the school. Launching with a wonderful assembly for all year groups, the emphasis this year was 'Saluting our Sisters' and paid honour to the work of black female figures across the centuries. From Saint Josephine Bakhita to Alex Scott MBE, a tribute was paid to the contributions these women have made to society. This theme continued with a Black History Month trail across the school building, where students were asked key questions about 15 women and had to find the answers. During form time, students listened to the unique story of George Saunders who was a tailor from St Kitts and established his own business here during the 1970s, in our very own back to back houses on Hurst Street. In Religious Education, the lessons were centred around black saints and in mathematics, students researched black mathematicians who have had an impact on their subject. Each department contributed to our display in the foyer; a wonderful snapshot that salutes our sisters and cultural diversity.



Year 11 Personal Development Day

Year on year, the Personal Development days receive such high praise and positive feedback from our students. The day for Year 11 in October, was a roaring success and enabled our GCSE cohort to take a day away from their academic studies and touch base with issues in the world around them. Commencing with the most powerful presentation from 'Stand against Violence', we listened intently to the presenter, Michelle, as she shared with us the true story of a young man from Devon who lost his life the day before his 18th birthday due to an unprecedented attack.

The talk was hard hitting but spoke volumes about personal safety and choices in life. Michelle was very complimentary of our students and commended their attentiveness, maturity and thoughtfulness. The rest of the day was spent in classrooms exploring money matters; the impact of drugs and vaping; and wellbeing. The varied nature of the day exposed the students to so many societal issues, and feedback on the workshops was fantastic from both staff and students, alike. A wonderful conclusion to the day was the well-being session that involved ways of dealing with stress and culminated with our beautiful stone paintings that are now displayed in the chapel. We very much look forward to hosting Personal Development days for the rest of the school!











World Kindness Day

'Being kind' was the theme we used to launch Anti Bullying Week. Students engaged in a form activity in the previous week that looked at the concept of kindness and how this is part of the Bishop Challoner character virtues. They were told that teachers would be looking and listening out for acts of kindness, no matter how small.

Throughout the week, nominations came flooding in for students from every year group and it was enlightening to read how selfless and kind our Bishop Challoner students really

are. From tidying up classrooms without being asked, to helping others with classwork, all nominated students received a 'kindness slip', and two amazingly kind students were also rewarded with a kind gesture from staff. The concept of being kind will continue throughout the year! Staff members were also acknowledged for their selfless acts of kindness!







School Council

School council is an imperative part of our student voice programme and students have already had a year council meeting with their Head of Year and a whole school council meeting with Dr Coughlan. Bringing so many ideas to the fore front, students are underway with charity projects and school improvements, alike. It has been wonderful to see the inspiration from the council members and their feedback to peers. This has manifested in a real drive for our school's focus on the Year of Challoner and jubilee celebrations. Students are keen to work together, hold charity events and live out our mission statement by giving service to others. Exemplified through sponsored jogs, cake sales and ice cream sales (back when the weather was warmer), candy cane grams and chocolate hamper raffles, we have already started fundraising for St Chad's Sanctuary and some of our students have even had the privilege of being able to deliver our Sanctuary collections. We now have 5 charity ambassadors through our school council, and we are excited to see what else we can achieve this academic year!



Upcoming Projects

As we move forward, it is wonderful to announce that our Fox Hollies project will commence very soon and 13, Year 9 students will take part in the most enlightening exchange programme with our Fox Hollies friends. This project has run for many years and this year promises to be just as special as it always has been. We started this project with disability awareness at the end of November and look forward to our visits to Fox Hollies in the New Year.

We also embrace the next stage of the Mode Shift Active Travel award scheme, in search for transport and traffic solutions in our school's locality. This was a huge success last year and we can't wait to start it again with our 9 Active Travel Ambassadors. The first meeting evaluated last year's work and we can't wait to drive a new programme that promotes a healthier and more environmentally friendly approach to school travel!



Geography

Year 7

As an introduction to Geography, Year 7 began the term focusing on local Geography within Birmingham and then will broaden their learning to look at the United Kingdom. This unit of work integrates an introduction to Geographical skills such as grid references, compass direction and scale whilst also developing a sense of place for the country in which we live. The Year 7 Geographers enjoyed using maps of the local area to demonstrate the skills they have developed and engaged with in paired and group competitions. Students have explored important geographical concepts such as river systems, coastal erosion, migration and glaciation.

The unit of work enables the students to demonstrate their knowledge in a range of ways including creative writing, describing and explaining patterns and group debate. Year 7 have also had an opportunity to 'become the teacher' using a flipped learning approach with students teaching each other about waterfall formation. Subsequently, Year 7 will be moving on to investigate the global superpower and the world's fastest growing country, China. Students will be exploring China's rapidly changing human environments and also learning about China's rich physical environments. This place of study has proven to be thoroughly engaging for the students and sparks curiosity and discussion.

Year 10

Year 10 have made a positive start to the year and are currently working on the first topic 'The Living World'. Within this unit of work, they have studied the important global issues such as deforestation of the Malaysian rainforests and desertification in the Thar desert. Students have completed a mid-unit assessment and have demonstrated a range of revision skills such as summarising knowledge, practicing perfect paragraphs reviewing past exam papers. All Year 10 students have been provided with a BCCC Geography revision guide.

Year 11

Year 11 are now working hard on covering the content for the final exams and are preparing well for mock exams which are currently taking place. Revision grids, revision checklists and practice exam questions have been issued to students to ensure they have all the required resources to give them every chance of success in their final exams.

Within our current topic of study: The Changing Economic World, we have been exploring strategies to reduce the development gap such as aid. Students have been inspired by the impact aid can have on communities and chose to raise money to buy goats for lower income countries. Our Year 11s raised enough money to buy three goats which will have a long term and sustainable impact on the community.

Year 8

Year 8 will shortly have completed the first country study of Russia. Throughout the term they have studied the vast diversity in the physical landscape of the country and have used this to explain patterns in population density. They have also demonstrated their ability to evaluate topical issues such as pollution through extended writing as well as participating in class debates over Russia extracting oil in the Arctic. Subsequently, Year 8 will be moving on to explore the fascinating Newly Emerging Economy, Brazil.

From learning about the Brazil's amazing physical features like the Amazon River and rainforest, to analysing why people are moving from rural areas to major cities such as Rio de Janeiro, the Brazil topic of work is always a popular choice with our students. Students will also be shortly learning about the impacts of Brazil hosting the Olympic Games, and consider the many social, economic and environmental influences that events like these may bring to a nation.

Year 9

Year 9 students are currently learning about the world's leading superpower the United States of America. Students have been investigating a range of Geographical concepts throughout the unit of work including Physical factors such as the formation of the Rocky Mountains, the risk of volcanic activity in Yellowstone National Park and the formation of hurricanes. They have also investigated the USA's interesting and continually changing human environments, from mega cities like New York to urban regeneration in areas like Detroit. This unit has really helped develop students' Geographical understanding of a variety of key concepts and has enabled them to demonstrate their knowledge and understanding in a range of ways such a report style writing, raps and poems, letter writing and extending Point Evidence Explain Paragraphs.

Over the past few weeks, Year 9 have shown their dedication to revision and have been trialling a range of revision strategies for their KAP4 such as blurting, mind maps and flashcards. We are very proud of the hard work students have shown in their preparation for these assessments.

Key Stage 5

Year 12 have made a positive start to their A Level Geography and have been demonstrating their independent learning skills to support what they are learning in the classroom. The students are currently exploring the topic of 'Natural Hazards' for their physical component and 'Changing Places' for the human component of the course.

Year 13 continue to show their dedication to their NEA investigations. The students have used the available resources to independently complete significant sections of their NEA and have shown great resilience in meeting the deadlines. We have enjoyed reading the sections they have submitted so far.

Trips

During the autumn term Year 11 students visited Longbridge to collect data on the regeneration of the local area. The aim of the fieldwork is to investigate whether the regeneration undertaken by St. Modwen has improved the area socially, economically and environmentally. The trips were a success and students were a credit to the school in their mature conduct on all of these visits. In lessons now we are currently analysing and evaluating our primary data collection results in preparation for the unit 3 final exam.

History

Christmas celebrations of the past...

Medieval people really let rip with twelve full days of Christmas festivities, reaching a crescendo on 6 January, 'Twelfth Night', when presents were exchanged. These celebrations commemorated Christ's birth and the name Christmas (Christ's Mass) is first recorded in England in 1038.

Boisterous medieval festivities were directed by a Lord of Misrule, whose word was law. The Christmas games he ordered could be rough; among the tamest was 'Hot Cockles', where blindfolded victims had to guess who'd slapped them from behind. If the guess was right, the slapper became the victim.

Tudor Christmases were even more full-on than medieval, but were a tad less boisterous, at least at Court. On Twelfth Night (6 January) a bean was baked into a cake. The person who got it in their slice became 'King of the Bean', or if it was a woman, she chose her 'King', and everyone had to imitate him. When he drank, they drank; if he coughed, they coughed. Henry VIII and his friends liked to dress up as Robin Hood's Men or Moors, and you had to pretend not to recognise them.

The Christmas we know today took shape in Victorian times, when the rowdier celebrations of earlier periods were toned down into a quieter family-focused festival. Queen Victoria and her beloved Albert, with their nine children, played a big part in these changes. The Christmas trees Albert popularised from his native Germany in 1840 rapidly caught on, as did decking them with lights and presents, by now given on Christmas Day itself. Victorian children's presents were usually quite modest, such as sweets, nuts or oranges, although wealthier kids might hope for a gift echoing the latest technology, such as a toy train. 'Christmas Box' tips to servants and tradesmen were left until 26 December, hence called 'Boxing Day'.

Many other now-familiar elements of Christmas also originated in this period, including printed Christmas cards, Christmas crackers, and eating turkey (instead of the traditional goose) and Christmas pudding. Even 'Santa Claus' and his reindeer sleigh first came here from America in the 1870s.

Black History Month

We began October by promoting a competition for Black History Month across Key Stage Three. We received hundreds of entries with some making use of video, music and the game Minecraft to showcase their tributes to Black History Month.

The theme this year which was 'Saluting Our Sisters'.

Students produced outstanding work which were celebrated and the winners were awarded a voucher by Dr Coughlan.





The Computing Department remains dedicated to supporting computing curricula in our local primary schools by offering workshops and valuable resources. We strongly believe in fostering an early interest in the subject and sustaining it through various strategies. For instance, our students actively engage in creating computing display boards for events, showcasing their involvement and subsequently designing and assembling the boards. Additionally, they take the lead in crafting computing activities for events like Computing Day, where they not only design but also deliver these activities to younger students, aiming to inspire and engage them in the world of computing.



Open Evening

Besides workshops and display boards, we involve our students for open evening events. At the beginning of the academic year, our students conducted teaser sessions for prospective primary students. These sessions, featuring robotics demonstrations and handson drone flying experiences, significantly enhanced the visiting students' experience, making their visit more memorable and interactive.



Volleyball Club

Apart from our involvement in computing, we actively contribute to various other school activities. This year, Mr. Ebrahim leads both the school volleyball club and a separate session tailored for experienced players. The Wednesday morning volleyball club welcomes students of all ages, while the Thursday sessions cater to more seasoned players, drawing significant interest, particularly among Year 11 students.





CyberFirst

On Monday 20th November, computing took a group of Year 8 girls, accompanied by previous CyberFirst winners and finalists from the past two years, to kick off CyberFirst at Aston University. It turned out to be a success—we entered 6 teams, a significant accomplishment in itself. One team, in particular, showed incredible commitment. They even came into school on Sunday to work on the challenges.

We are thrilled to share that one of our teams scored 5787 points, the highest ever in our CyberFirst history. Collectively, the teams scored around 16,000 points—a fantastic achievement. Hopefully, events like this will inspire more girls to consider studying computing and pursuing careers in technology.



San Francisco

The Computing department is thrilled to announce the organisation of the trip to San Francisco in July 2026, tailored for current Year 8 and 9 students who will be in Years 10 and 11 respectively by then. This early planning allows for better management of trip costs over an extended period, ensuring that every student can seize this once-in-a-lifetime opportunity. 
Art and Design

Key Stage 5, A Level Fine Art, Year 13

Year 13 Art students are working on the development stages of their Component One journey. Oil paint, wax, translucent surfaces, latex and fabric are just a selection of the materials they have been exploring on diverse scales from A6 to A0. They will be completing final pieces over the coming weeks to resolve their project journeys. Approaches to concept themes are varied with students producing installation pieces made up of paper and cardboard structures combined with organic forms such as moss and tree branches, sensitive mixed media drawings as a response to 'The Holocaust' topic and large scale experimental layered mixed media boards inspired by a recent trip to Berlin which focus on cultural identity in European Cities.



















Year 12

Year 12 students have been exploring a range of media including drawing, painting and printmaking in the style of contemporary and traditional artists, building up their skills of different techniques. They have been exploring the work of artists across history, notably Vermeer, Renoir, Kollwitz and Kruger by creating artist studies in a range of materials. All A level students will be travelling to London in December for their Gallery study trip, visiting The National Gallery, Tate Modern and Saatchi Gallery. They have begun their independent coursework project exploring their own individual themes, including 'moments in time', 'fragments', 'self identity' and 'built landscape'.



KS4 GCSE Fine Art

Year 11 have also followed Year 13 with successful journey development in sketchbooks and portfolios as they prepare for their Mock exams. They have demonstrated real commitment this academic year with sketchbooks being highly developed and imaginative. It has been so rewarding to see such a mature approach to the Year 11 project with students choosing to pursue personal and creative journeys independently. There has been an increase in scale this year with students clearly being informed by the A level outcomes on display in Art rooms and in the wider school spaces. Working with a wide range of materials, including (but not limited to) oil paint, watercolour, chalk, pen, graphite and charcoal, acrylic and coloured pencil, students have each individually explored the set theme with curiosity and maturity, individually building an impressive coursework portfolio. We cannot wait to see what they create in their mock exams!



Year 10









Key Stage 3, Year 7

To kickstart our new Year 7's experience of the wonder that is art at Challoner, they have been working with new and exciting materials and techniques that they may not have used before. They have been exploring the expressive mark making of Vincent Van Gogh using stick and ink and creating some realistic seashell and pepper drawings to get the hang of drawing accurately! So far, all the students' work has been monochromatic, focusing on building their understanding of the formal elements — line, shape, proportion, tone, and texture — and there has been tremendous progress since their start at secondary school! Well done Year 7!











Year 8

Year 8 students have been exploring memory and the purpose of public installation artwork as memorial. Taking inspiration from the sculpture 'Shoes on the Danube', they completed tonal studies of shoes using a variety of materials, working on recycled surfaces. As a class, they discussed how symbolism is embedded into art, and that metaphors of shoes can evoke the feeling of empathy towards others. They have since explored other types of metaphor within Art, including feathers and birds as symbols of lost loved ones. Since this, Year 8 students have been working with watercolour paint to create mixed media bird studies, taking inspiration from contemporary illustrator Abby Diamond. It was through these studies that students experimented with harmonious and contrasting colour palettes, as well as blends, bleeds, washes and splatters.



Art Club

Art Club is as popular as ever this year! Students across Years 7, 8, 9 and 10 attend each week to work on 3D projects, learning to knit, build puppet mannequins, create prints with natural forms collected from around school and, of course, creating small sketchbooks to fill with their Inktober drawings! All students are welcome to attend Tuesdays 3:20-4:20.



Year 9

Year 9 students have started their time travel journey through Artistic Movements. Beginning with Da Vinci's anatomical studies, working with pencil, pen and print, students have looked closely at how to create realistic details using different mark making techniques. They have since explored the expressive colours and brushstrokes of Claude Monet, working with watercolour to embody his Impressionistic style.



Students have been introduced to the importance of building layers of washes in light to dark shades, building up an image from an under-painting to a detail heavy landscape. They have worked hard to focus on building confidence when 'drawing with a brush', making sure that they find the balance of speed painting — just as the artists did when working 'en plein air', and being careful to observe small details. We are fortunate to have strong artists in Year 9, and are hopeful that our subject will be popular with them when it comes to choosing GCSE options.











BC Arts Hub

This year, to commemorate Remembrance Day, The Royal British Legion are remembering and honouring significant anniversaries united by the theme of 'Service'. 2023 marks the 75th anniversary of the arrival of the Empire Windrush. BC Arts Hub continue to build on the yearly Art installations, performances and projections by exploring the connections between the Armed Forces and the Windrush Generation, and mark their service and the part they played in rebuilding post war Britain. The focus was an outdoor photography display of historic Windrush images supported by the large soldier silhouettes, poppy sculptures and wall hung poppy piece. Installations were complemented by projections of musical and dramatic performances on the façade of the Sports Centre for the community to experience. This was further enhanced by an installation of acrylic doves and a fabric wall hanging, handcrafted by Bishop Challoner students, on display in St Dunstans Church for the Remembrance Mass.


















Product Design





Year 7

Throughout this autumn term, Year 7 students in Product Design actively engaged in a hands-on and environmentally conscious project. The project revolved around repurposing discarded plastic bottle caps, into innovative and eco-friendly products.

The focus on recycling and sustainability has offered these students a unique opportunity not only to explore their creativity, but also to gain a deeper understanding of the impact that everyday disposable items can have on the environment. We have placed a collection bin in the canteen and also in a Café on Kings heath High Street in the hope that we can help to turn waste from our local community into desirable, functional products. We will approach further businesses to enlarge our collection pool as one class alone will get through up to 1000 tops. Please help us by collecting HDPE tops (polymer recycling symbol No2) and sending into school with your child who can then drop them into the D&T department.

Through lessons and discussions, the Year 7 students have gained insights into the origins of plastic and its detrimental effects on the environment, wildlife, and ecosystems. This knowledge has not only hopefully heightened their environmental consciousness but has also inspired a sense of responsibility to make sustainable choices in the future.

Year 9


During the autumn term Year 9 students embarked on an exciting and visionary project centred around the design of the new Kings Heath train station. With a focus on inclusivity and accessibility, the students delved into the principles of universal design, ensuring that their creations were not only aesthetically pleasing, but also catered to the diverse needs of all commuters.

Drawing inspiration from renowned designers and architects, they learned how innovative and thoughtful design can enhance user experience and contribute to the overall well-being of the community.

On 12th December four classes were visited by architect Daniel Cosier from the firm AFL architects who gave a very informative presentation to students about what it is like to work in the profession as well as introducing some of the amazing projects his firm have worked upon such as the World Cup Stadium in Qatar. It is fantastic to be able to provide students opportunities to meet face to face with professionals from industry; broadening their understanding of jobs within the creative sector and inspiring them consider careers within these fields for themselves.

Equipped with a newfound understanding of materials and their properties, Year 9 students made informed decisions regarding the selection of materials for their designs. This research-informed approach ensures that their creations not only meet aesthetic standards but also adhere to practical considerations, sustainability, and durability.











Year 10

Our two Y10 GCSE classes had fun turning a piece of plywood into this cute reindeer decoration in their lesson on Monday. The short focused practical task required students to work with precision and accuracy when following a template to create all three parts of the product from one piece of plywood sheet. A range of skills were practised such as cutting, filing, sanding and drilling. Practical skills are assessed as part of the NEA which students commence in June of Year 10 and submit in the spring of Y11, comprising 50% of their final GCSE grade. We think you'll agree these outcomes wouldn't look out of place on the shelf of some well known retailers! Great work Y10, keep it up!





Designers and Makers Showcase

As part of our drive in D&T this year to expose our students to industry, broaden their understanding of D&T related careers and inspire them to become the designers and makers of the future we are opening our doors on 20th February to representative from a wide variety of creative fields. We are reaching out to parents, local businesses, Birmingham based artisans and Universities amongst others to come and show our young people what they do, why thy do it and how they got there. We are planning for a hybrid event which will include a careers style Fair in addition to a carousel of workshops which will wet students appetite and leave them inspired through seeing and talking about how creativity and innovation is providing so many exciting career opportunities. This event will be focused on Y8 at a time when many students will begin the process of identifying the GCSE options which are most appropriate for their individual strengths and areas of interest.

STEM Club

At the end of the autumn term STEM club students designed Christmas figurines using the 3D modelling software TINKERCAD. These were 3D printed and students encased them in glass jars with glitter and a water/glycerin mix to create their very own snow globes!! It has been a pleasure to watch each student design and build their festive creations; each one is highly unique and demonstrates how creatively participants have approached this challenge! Well done to all involved!




On 10th November Year 8 took part in the 'Casting My Future' Virtual Reality experience and careers talk during their D&T lesson, providing an insight into the world of Cast Metals Engineering and highlighting the many career opportunities within the industry. Through the use of VR headsets and their mobile phones students were able to take a walk around a casting factory, seeing the different stages of the process from CAD design of casting moulds to the heating and casting of the raw materials on the factory floor. This helped to put students learning into context as the class have been learning about pewter casting and have designed pieces of jewellery which they will cast in school using laser cut moulds.

In D&T this year a key focus is provide students with more access to industry professionals and to help them see the relevance of their learning in the classroom to the world of work. We have worked closely with Miss Darby to foster more industry links and are delighted that we were able to provide such a positive experience for Year 8 through pursing an industry contact.





















Food

Year 7

During this first half term Year 7 students learnt about routines and procedures in the food room. They have learnt about working in a professional and hygienic environment and enjoyed learning how to cook in this way. They are improving their skills by carrying out a variety of practical lessons using a variety of ingredients. The students have learnt to use knives safely to create a fruit salad and a healthy wrap, which covers all of the Eatwell guide. They have worked in teams to research and learn





about the Eatwell guide, which will help them with many future tasks and projects in food. The Year 7 students have also carried out evaluations of their making skills and the food they have produced. They are taught the difference between preparation skills and cooking skills, which they can carry through up to GCSE.

Year 8

Year 8 students continued to work on the skills they developed throughout Year 7. They are more confident now in using small scale equipment, especially using knives. They have learnt about food safety for example cross contamination and cooking with high risk ingredients such as chicken. Year 8 have also began to learn about vitamins and minerals and the importance of the 7 different food groups. They have learnt about which food provide each vitamin and how to stay healthy. Many of the practical lessons during Year 8 focus on refining their preparation skills and working with ingredients that require good knife skills. This will help them to understand how to break down a recipe and amending to fit different requirements.







Textiles

Key Stage 3

Year 7 students are improving their basic textiles skills in a new project based on a 'Quiet book'. Each pupil will design and make a page from the alphabet which will be put together as a whole book when completed. They have learnt a range of skills including Hand embroidery, Applique and Machine stitching.



In Year 8 students have been really successful in developing their skills in Applique and hand embroidery by making different samples and focusing on layering of fabrics as well as backstitch, running stitch and blanket stitch.



Year 9 students are working on a wall hanging project linked with their identity, they have focused on communicating their design ideas through sketching and the use of 2D design to produce a stencil for screen printing.



Year 9

During this first half term, Year continued to build on the skills developed in Year 7 and Year 8. They are now able to cook with more confidence and precision. They have learnt about the dangers of not following food safety procedures and what this could lead to in a professional setting. This in tern helps them to build on their own food hygiene and understand its importance. They have also continued to evaluate their preparation and cooking skills and are able to say, with confidence, how each skill is performed and its suitability. Year have continued to develop the understanding of the food groups and are now independently able to explain each with examples, helping them to make healthier choices.





Textiles Club

Duringt the autumn Textiles club worked on producing a fully lined 'Bum bag' with a zip fastening. They used 2 coloured fabrics to make a statement lining in their bags and contrast zips. In the lead up tio Christmas they also made some Christmas themed products to sell at the show for Arts Hub.







MFL Le mois de l'histoire des Noirs – Black history month

To celebrate Black History Month in October, Year 7 and Year 8 classes looked into the Haitian and Louisiana French Créole history, culture and language. Students designed a poster. The department was overwhelmed with the great interest that this project created and we received some outstanding posters and designs from many of the students, some of which were displayed in the foyer alongside work from other departments.













European day of languages

European day of languages has gained its place on the calendar and as we do every year at Bishop Chaloner, we celebrate the languages and cultures of those in our community. This year the languages ranged from Polish, Spanish, Arabic, Cantonese and Mandarin, Lingala, Malayalam and many more! We thank the Year 7 and 8 students who came to the library to showcase their talents on Tuesday 26th September for our yearly Bishop's got Talent. All other year groups had the opportunity to do some activities in form, looking at where our Bishop Challoner communities come from in the world and guessing the language spoken.



Year 7

So far this year, our cohort of Year 7 students have learned the basics of French. They have studied, introductions, greetings, numbers and the alphabet. This readied them to start our curriculum for this year, a modified version of the NCELP scheme of work. They have focused on sounds of the language, describing themselves and describing others. They have sat their first Assessment for learning and have produced several outstanding pieces of work. As we build up to Christmas, they will be continuing to learn the new sounds of the language and culture surrounding Christmas celebrations in France.

Year 8

Use of IT in lessons

In Year 8, Homework is going through a technological revolution. The NCELP course allow students to complete homework which involves listening, reading, spelling, grammar and speaking. The use of netbooks also allows the recording of this homework to be completed through Microsoft Forms. This has two advantages: no need for paper resources and the marking is much quicker, thus allowing the students to receive much more rapid feedback for their efforts. The students are also gaining valuable IT skills which could serve them very well in future studies or careers. Following the success of this trial, we will be rolling it out to our Year 7 students who also study the NCELP course.



The Music Department has so far this year been filled with musical collaborations, instrumental tuition, songwriting and recording, and artistic exploration, setting the tone for another year of musical success.

Bishop's Got Talent

Our first Bishop's Got Talent event this year was the perfect showcase for some of our newest musicians at join Bishop Challoner. A range of instruments and genres were represented at this break time event, which drew a large and appreciative audience and generated a lot of interest in instrumental tuition. From Year 7, Markas and Akeme are already talented pianists and performed superbly at the event, and Noah G played a beautiful guitar solo. Holly rocked out on the drums and our two recorder players, Larea and Dilara performed a lovely duet. Preston played a saxophone solo to rapturous applause and they all played confidently in front of their peers, something which should be commended.











Tea Parties

The Tea Parties, which take place in the Common Room, organised by Miss Mayor, are a wonderful example of students being involved in the wider and local community, offering their time, talents and kindness with visiting elderly residents of Kings Heath. Alongside the refreshments, food and bingo, there is musical entertainment and December's event naturally had a festive theme. The BC Woodwind Ensemble and soloists played their repertoire from the Christmas BGT, and the vocal ensemble performing Silent Night. There is always a warm sense of community at these events and we are always proud of how our students take part both musically and socially.

Christmas BGT

Another annual tradition in our Music Department is the Christmas Bishop's Got Talent, where a selection of our musicians help get us all in the festive spirit with Christmas music. The library was packed out with students and staff who came to support our performers, accompanied by Mrs Choudhury and Miss Hughes on piano. The BC Woodwind Ensemble (Zac, Sophie, Christian, Nigel, Lexie, Isla and Grace) began the event with a couple of Christmassy numbers before the Woodwind Trio (Nigel, Zac and Sophie) played Carol of the Bells superbly. This was followed by some very brave solos – Zac on recorder, Nigel on clarinet, and Sophie performing a very advanced solo on the flute, Winter from Vivaldi's Four Seasons. To close the event, the Vocal Ensemble sang a beautiful rendition of Silent Night. The students performed so well and this was a lovely display of how music can bring people together – especially at Christmas!







Year 7

We have been very impressed with the strong start our Year 7s have made in music. In their first term they begin their journey as keyboard players, learning the basics of the instrument and playing melodies fluently and accurately. Through independent practice and whole-class playing the classes are making good progress, developing skills as both solo and ensemble players. They are also learning about the instruments of the orchestra and how they are played – as well as what it takes to be a musician.

Year 8

Year 8s have been looking at the social, historical and musical background of Blues and Jazz music, and have learnt to play the 12 Bar Blues, the backbone of all Blues Music, on keyboards. They are now beginning to learn about improvisation, not an easy skills, which is at the heart of Jazz so they can play authentic music in these genres.

Year 9

Year 9 lessons are the epitome of creativity this term! After doing extensive research and mature discussion, students assembled in their own small groups, decided on a topic they felt strongly about and wrote their own protest song. After writing thoughtful and impactful lyrics, each group spent time in the recording studio with our technician Jason to professionally record their songs. The results have been very inspiring, with some students truly rising to the challenge and channelling their inner pop and rap stars!

Key Stage 4

At Key Stage 4, musical analysis and appraisal reaches new heights. Our Year 10 cohort have made an extremely encouraging start to the GCSE course, and have spend the first few months of this term broadening their musical theory knowledge as well as exploring the key musical features which underpin the GCSE course. This week they start their analysis and appraisal of the eight set works that they study over the two years, and their enthusiasm and musical aptitude so far is making lessons very enjoyable.

Year 10 & 11

The Year 11 musicians are dividing lesson time between analysing the remaining set works for their listening exam in the summer, or preparing their coursework. Most students are in the process of recording their first of two compositions, which are worked on in and out of lessons, and their solo and ensemble performances. This year's cohort are presenting performances on voice, piano, classical and electric guitar, and drum kit, and their compositions range from s Classical-style ternary form piece to a musical theatre song, a club dance remix and guitar solo for an art installation. We are pleased with how well students have communicated their artistic ideas with us and have been proactive in terms of choosing their pieces and rehearsing independently to ensure confident, polished performances.

Year 11 have made a fantastic start to the year in Performing Arts and have already recorded two performances for their GCSE exam. They keenly took on the roles of Matilda, Ensemble and Mrs Trunchbull to create a performance piece based on the hit West End musical Matilda, which was full of characterisation through the three art forms which musical theatre encapsulates: drama, dance, and singing. We are extremely proud of their work so far and we are all looking forward to starting their 3rd and final unit of work in January.

Year 10 have also begun their journey of exploring the musical theatre genre and are focusing their efforts on learning choreography from the musical Hairspray.

Vocal Ensemble

Our vocal ensemble has welcomed a new cohort of Year 7 students to the group, who have been to each rehearsal consistently since the beginning of term. Their levels of enthusiasm are unparalleled and, along with our longer-serving members, have enjoyed learning and performing material ranging from Don't Stop Believing by Journey to numbers from High School Musical! The singers spent time rehearsing for our special Christmas Mass and joined Mrs Choudhury to lead singing practices in Key Stage 3 assemblies to prepare for this.

Dance Club

It has been great to see the return of Dance Club on Tuesdays after school. A small but dedicated group of Year 7s, who started with little or no experience, are working hard to develop their flexibility and are exploring choreography used in the film 'Barbie'.

We have already formed a strong music cohort in Year 7 and we are delighted to see some musical students keen on developing their ensemble skills by joining BC Band. Joined by some more experienced students in higher years, the band rehearse on Thursdays with Miss Hughes and are learning how rewarding (and tricky) it is to maintain your part when others around you are playing different notes and sounds! When it all comes together, of course, it sounds lovely, and BC Band are currently rehearsing some music to perform in next year's Spring Soiree and future BGT events.

Irish Music

Jobe Sullivan, a local Irish musician, has been working with our school for a few months now to introduce students to the joys of traditional Irish music and instruments. A core group of musicians meet weekly with Jobe in school to learn the mandolin and the banjo, and their hard work and ensemble skills have led them to perform in school events and for the wider community, such as with Dementia patients at local community centres. Their repertoire took on a distinctly festive and wintry feel as the students prepared for the Christmas Tea Party, and for their debut local performance.

Exposure to live music is such a vital part of engaging with music, so Jobe and Miss Hughes took our Irish musicians to St Dunstan's Catholic Primary School to give them the opportunity to see and hear some live music. Once the performers had finished, the primary students were able to play some of the mandolins, drums and banjos which Jobe had brought along. We look forward to some of these students continuing their Irish musical journey when they are old enough to be Bishop Challoner students.

Christmas & the New Year

Sophie performed her solo one more time this term as students entered St Dunstan's Church for Christmas Mass, and the vocal ensemble led the carols during this reverent and peaceful time for reflection at the end of term.

This year all Year 7 students are invited on a trip to Symphony Hall to experience the wonders of a live orchestra. This special concert is hosted by the City of Birmingham Symphony Orchestra each year, designed to introduce the various orchestral families to KS3 students and to demonstrate the power of live music. The trip is live on Schoolcomms and places are allocated on a first-come, first-served basis. Students in Year 7 have been learning all about the instruments of the orchestra in their music classroom and this trip gives our students the opportunity to see them being played live by expert musicians; it may inspire more budding instrumentalists!

Business

We have had a busy start to the academic year with new classes and a new teacher in the department. In addition, some of the courses specifications have changed and this has all made for an intense first term. We welcome Mr Broadbent to the Business department. Mr Broadbent is teaching one group of 'Business and Enterprise' students in year ten. The numbers opting for Business continues to be very healthy for an 'open' option subject. In year ten we have two groups of GCSE (9-1) students and three groups of Business and Enterprise students.

All classes have been/will be sitting formal assessments having completed one or more units of work since the start of the new academic year. The results of the assessments already sat look encouraging and we are optimistic that the remaining assessments will be equally pleasing. Cambodia and the International Student Committee

We will be taking a group of 14 Year 12 students to Cambodia next year for a once in a lifetime experience. Students are currently applying to be considered for the trip. Students will be forming an enrichment group called the International Student Committee, where they will be learning about the United Nations development goals and learning about the importance of global citizenship. In Cambodia students will be delivering community development initiatives mostly based around two primary schools outside of a city called Kong Battembang and will also have the opportunity to see some of the amazing sites that Cambodia has to offer and learn about its fascinating history and diverse geography.








Work Experience

They were given small group question and answer sessions, as well as talks on different entry routes their employees had taken into their careers.

They had to work together in small groups, advised by Big Cat's employees, to create an adveritising campaign idea, including print and social media, to pitch in the afternoon to the CEO. 

School Games

It has been a very busy term with over 1100 young people from Y2-11 taking part in our School Games events. So far we have held events, including competitions and festivals, in boys and girls primary and secondary football, Y2-3 girls multi skills, Y7-8 and Y9-10 netball and KS2 SEND sitting volleyball.

We have adapted our School Games events to make them more inclusive and now follow a new model which clearly explains who our target audience is for each event. This has been shared with schools so they are all aware which students the event is aimed at and this helps to ensure those attending have a positive experience.



Primary & Secondary Sports Leadership

In September and October, we trained over 330 students and 60 staff from primary schools to organise simple, fun playground games that will help get more young people active in schools.



All schools attended 1 day of training where they were shown a range of games and given instructions on how to make sure games are safe and how to make them harder/easier using the STEP (Space, Task, Equipment and People) principle. All students that attended have been awarded a new silver 'Primary Play Leader' badge and they will be awarded a gold badge in the summer term if they keep on volunteering their time.

We have also recruited, trained and deployed sports leaders from Bishop Challoner, Christ Church, Moseley and Swanshurst Girls Schools and these students have officiated at a range of events including boys and girls football and our Y2-3 multi skills event. We have also recruited and deployed students from South and City College to officiate at events, such as football festivals and a dodgeball competition.

Going Green

This year, we are continuing with our pledge to move towards a more environmentally friendly system of working and ensure we print less documents and waste less paper. Entries for all competitions/festivals and primary professional development opportunities are now accessed via our Google Drive. This results in all schools seeing who has entered which competitions and may encourage some schools to enter more.

Science Learning Partnership (SLP)

We've had a very successful first term over the road at the SLP! We've continued to work closely with CLEAPSS, our Enthuse Partner schools, and our SPN coaches to great success. We're topping the SLP league tables for income- already at 76% of our annual income goals- and we've even had a visit from the newly appointed STEM Learning CEO, Séverine Trouillet (second from right)! She was especially impressed by our subscription packages for schools, considering us an example to other schools for their success.

One of our most exciting and popular courses this term has been Robot Wars, a course for primary science teachers to get students interested in engineering through- as the name suggests- fighting robots! The course will conclude at the end of the academic year with the battles themselves, letting students from schools across the West Midlands to compete for victory. We've also run courses for supporting students with SEND, run new CLEAPSS courses for ECTs and Technicians, and numerous other courses.

Standards and Uniform

Students are required to wear the standard uniform of blazer, tie, white/blue shirt with black straight leg school trousers (not skinny or boot cut) or girls can wear a knee length black pleated school skirt. Girls are also reminded that if they choose to wear a skirt, then they should wear plain, black, opaque tights. Students are reminded that black leather school shoes should be worn and that trainers/trainer style shoes are forbidden.

Please note that school shoes must be kept completely black and boots of any kind are not allowed.

Our uniform requirements are complemented by a smart appearance and as such, hair styles that should not have a distinct contrast in length. Hair that is dyed must be of a natural hair colour and may not contain more than one colour. To avoid a health and safety risk, long hair must not impede vision or cover the face, except for a fringe which must not cover the eyes. Long hair must be tied up for practical lessons. Religious head coverings must be black and securely tied for practical lessons. Hair bands or accessories must be for functional use to secure the hair . Where hairbands are worn they must be black. Headwear that has religious or cultural purpose should be black. The final decision as to whether a particular haircut/ style is appropriate is at the discretion of senior staff.

Make up, nail varnish and jewellery are not permitted with the exception of one pair of plain stud earrings which may be worn.

Students found to be wearing an inappropriate item of uniform may be asked to change this or in some cases parents/carers will be contacted and requested to bring replacement uniform to school.

We appreciate your support in ensuring that standards of uniform and appearance are maintained.
