



Message from Mr O'Connor, Vice Principal

As we continue the new academic year into October at Bishop Challoner Catholic College, there is a deep sense of purpose, community, and faith guiding all we do. Our students have settled well into the term, engaging positively with their learning and beginning preparations now for upcoming mock exams and assessments, working closely with their teachers to be well prepared. For our Year 11 students, our upcoming Sixth Form Open Evening on Wednesday 8th October offers a valuable opportunity to explore future subject choices and begin thinking carefully about the next steps in their education or career journey.

Alongside academic progress, we remain committed to the formation of our young people, ensuring they grow not only in knowledge but in character, faith, and service. The experience we offer our students is of vital importance, helping them leave our care with a broad range of life experiences and a strong foundation to make a positive difference in their communities.

Our extensive extra-curricular programme is in full flow, offering opportunities through a wide range of clubs including STEM, chess, volleyball, badminton, breakfast club, reading, and science to mention a few. Our sporting fixtures are also up and running with competitive matches played in football and netball, as well as representation at the Catholic Partnership PE & Sport and STEM events. Trips are also enriching our students' learning experiences beyond the classroom: over 700 students recently enjoyed a day at Drayton Manor, and others have participated in the sixth form Calke Abbey English trip and a Cyber Girls event for Year 8.

Our Sixth Form students continue to lead by example, preparing yellow ribbons to be sold for World Mental Health Day, supporting the Dementia Centre by playing games and talking with clients through our partnership with the Birmingham Irish Association, and organising a community tea party for elderly residents in Kings Heath. On Tuesday 7th October, our school joined together in prayer as part of the Rosary for World Peace, uniting with Catholics around the world in a moment of reflection and hope.

We are also proud of our students' continued commitment to charity and service. Our CAFOD Family Fast Day raised over £180, and our Macmillan Coffee and Cake Morning brought in more than £250 for cancer support. Students are currently collecting winter coats and baby clothes for Saint Vincent de Paul and St Chad's Sanctuary, offering practical help to those in need.

As ever, we continue to place a strong emphasis on attendance and punctuality, and we thank parents and carers for their continued support. The evidence that highlights the positive impact regular attendance has on learning, examination outcomes, and future opportunities cannot be ignored. As Pope Leo XIII reminds us, "The school is the first place where minds are enriched and hearts are shaped by hope." May we continue to work together, inspired by faith and hope, to offer our students the very best foundation for life.

October is the month of the Rosary, a time when we reflect on the life of Jesus through the eyes of Mary, his mother.

ASSEMBLY AND FORM RESOURCE PROGRAMME

We had a wonderful assembly to launch this year's theme 'Standing Firm in Power and Pride', which celebrates those who have made their mark throughout history and in society today. This thought provoking assembly has been complemented by the various celebrations that are happening across the school for Black History Month, including competitions in PSHE and History. CYBER GIRLS TRIP

This week, 30 of our Year 8 girls had the exciting opportunity to visit Aston University to participate in a Cyber Girls First event.

The day included inspiring talks from influential women working in the cybersecurity industry, who shared their experiences and advice about careers in technology. Students also enjoyed a special session with the West Midlands Cyber Crime Unit, where they took part in an escape room-style activity that challenged them to work as a team, think critically, and apply problem-solving skills.

It was an inspiring day that not only opened our students' eyes to the growing field of cybersecurity but also highlighted the exciting opportunities available to them in the future.



BLETCHLEY PARK

Forty of our Year 8 students recently enjoyed an inspiring visit to Bletchley Park, the historic home of World War II codebreaking and modern computing. As part of the trip, they took part in an interactive cyber security workshop, where they learned about protecting information and the importance of online safety. Alongside this, students explored the famous huts and exhibitions, discovering how Alan Turing and his team cracked the Enigma code. The visit gave them a unique chance to connect history with modern-day computing, while also developing problem-solving and teamwork skills.



BISHOP'S GOT TALENT

On Friday 3rd October the Music Department hosted the first BGT of the year, New Kidz on the Block. This annual event features musical performances from our Year 7 students who can play a musical instrument. We were delighted that students volunteered to play, some of them beginners, some of them more experienced.

The library was filled with an enthusiastic audience, cheering on their peers and listening respectfully to the performances. First up to play was Emma, a talented guitarist, who played an acoustic rendition of Metallica's Nothing Else Matters. Following the rock theme, Kimi stepped up on guitar to play the opening to Seven Nation Army, which a lot of the students recognised.

Elijah, who had impressed teachers in lessons with his keyboard skills, played the classic Grand of Duke of York on the piano (and did very well with an unfamiliar keyboard). Davina played solo violin, one of the more challenging instruments, and performed The Two Roses - one of a few students who played entirely from memory!

To close the event we had two more pianists, Ava Rose playing Shotgun by George Ezra, and Lily with her cover of the school classic, All Things Bright and Beautiful.

It was fantastic to see our young performers bravely play in the library, and hopefully this will be the first of many musical performances for them this year. It was really encouraging to have a group of students come and speak to me at the end of the BGT to sign up for instrumental lessons! Well done to our young musicians for kickstarting this year's BGT events in style.

YEAR 12 COURT TRIP

This month, all Year 12 Law and Criminology students had the opportunity to visit Birmingham Crown Court – a trip that has now become a much-anticipated tradition for students as they begin their academic journey into the fascinating world of law and justice.

The purpose of the visit is to give students a unique insight into how the law operates in practice, moving beyond the classroom and into the courtroom itself. Students were able to witness first-hand the intricacies of legal proceedings, including advocacy, witness examinations, cross-examinations, and sentencing. They observed how barristers, judges, and court staff fulfil their roles and saw how legal theory translates into real-world practice.

The trip also provided valuable opportunities for students to engage with professionals within the justice system, gaining

advice and inspiration as they begin to consider their own future career paths. For many, this was their first direct experience of a courtroom environment – an experience that will help deepen their understanding of the subjects they are studying and reinforce their passion for pursuing a career in law, criminology, or related fields.

The visit was a resounding success, with students experiencing a wide variety of cases throughout the day. They returned with a greater appreciation of the legal system, a stronger awareness of the demands and responsibilities of legal careers, and a renewed enthusiasm for their studies.

This enriching experience is one of the many ways in which the Law and Criminology departments bring learning to life, inspiring students to think critically, engage deeply, and aspire towards ambitious futures.

FIRST AID AND MOBILE PHONES

Students should not be contacting parents/carers when they feel unwell and requesting to be collected from school. If a student is unwell, they **MUST** go to the First Aider who will deal with them. If a student is not well enough to stay in school, the First Aider will contact parents/carers to arrange collection.

Students who contact their parents/carer directly and do not follow the procedures in place will be sanctioned, this may result in their mobile phone having to be handed in to the student services office each day. The use of anyone else's mobile phone risks that person being sanctioned also.

Please do not arrive at school to collect your child unless school have contacted you to do so. We do not have school staff readily available to collect children. Thank you for your support and co-operation.

FIRST AID INFORMATION AND PROCEDURES

Medication; All medication should be handed into first aid and not carried by the students. Exception EpiPen, Asthma inhalers, insulin. Tranexamic acid in special circumstances.

Please make sure we have the correct medical information and emergency contact details, if you have changed your phone number or there is any change in medical conditions or concerns, please contact first aid using the enquiries email or the main school phone number.

Please send children into school with a water bottle they can re-fill at our water stations provided or they can purchase a drink from the school canteen.

Students with Asthma must carry with them their own personal inhalers. This includes offsite activities and school trips to ensure they can participate safely.

Parents/Carers of students with a known allergy must provide school first aid with antihistamine; this also applies to those with anaphylaxis in addition to their EpiPen.

We do not provide liquid paracetamol such as Calpol. If your child cannot take tablets and you would prefer them to have liquid Calpol please send this in to the school first aider with your child's name on it, this will be kept safe in first aid for your child only.



UNIFORM STANDARDS

Students are required to wear the standard uniform of blazer, tie, white/blue shirt with black straight leg school trousers (not skinny or boot cut) or girls can wear a knee length black pleated school skirt. Girls are also reminded that if they choose to wear a skirt, then they should wear plain, black, opaque tights. Students are reminded that black leather school shoes should be worn and that trainers/trainer style shoes are forbidden.

Please note that school shoes must be kept completely black and boots of any kind are not allowed.

Our uniform requirements are complemented by a smart appearance and as such, hair styles that should not have a distinct contrast in length. Hair that is dyed must be of a natural hair colour and may not contain more than one colour. To avoid a health and safety risk, long hair must not impede vision or cover the face, except for a fringe which must not cover the eyes. Long hair must be tied up for practical lessons. Religious head coverings must be black and securely tied for practical lessons. Hair bands or accessories must be for functional use to secure the hair. Where hairbands are worn they must be black. Headwear that has religious or cultural purpose should be black. The final decision as to whether a particular haircut/style is appropriate is at the discretion of senior staff.

Make up, nail varnish and jewellery are not permitted with the exception of one pair of plain stud earrings which may be worn.

Students found to be wearing an inappropriate item of uniform may be asked to change this or in some cases parents/carers will be contacted and requested to bring replacement uniform to school.

We appreciate your support in ensuring that standards of uniform and appearance are maintained.



REPORTING AN ABSENCE

All students are required to attend school/college on time every day. If for any reason your child is unable to attend, please ensure that the school attendance policy is followed, and their absence is reported before the START of the school day (8.40am) and on each day of absence.
