



Message from Dr Coughlan, Executive Principal

As we reach the end of another busy and successful term at Bishop Challoner, we would like to take this opportunity to celebrate the many achievements, opportunities and experiences that have enriched school life over recent months. Our students continue to demonstrate ambition, resilience, faith and a commitment to serving others, and we are incredibly proud of all they have accomplished.

Before reflecting on the term's successes, we would like to acknowledge the sad loss of our colleague, Mrs Marsh. Mrs Marsh dedicated many years of service to Bishop Challoner and made an outstanding contribution to the English Department and the wider school community. Her warmth, generosity and commitment to young people touched the lives of countless students and staff. Her passing has been deeply felt across our community, and we continue to keep her family and friends in our prayers.

Catholic life remains at the heart of everything we do. Throughout the term, students from all year groups have played an active role in the spiritual life of the school through prayer, liturgy, charitable work and outreach activities. As we continue to celebrate the Year of Youth, it has been inspiring to see so many young people demonstrating compassion, empathy and a commitment to living out Gospel values in their daily lives.

Students have participated fully in the sacramental and liturgical life of the Church. Highlights have included our Vigil Mass for the Solemnity of the Ascension, the daily Rosary during the Month of Mary, and special Leavers' Masses for Years 11 and 13 as they prepare for the next stage of their journeys. Year 10 students took part in a Teaching Mass to deepen their understanding of the Eucharist, while Year 8 students showed impressive leadership by planning and leading their own Mass.

We were also delighted to celebrate a special milestone for members of our school community, as two staff members and two students were welcomed into the Catholic Church following their participation in the Journey in Faith programme. This joyful occasion reflected the strength and vitality of faith within our community.

Service to others continues to be a defining feature of life at Bishop Challoner. Students have supported a range of charitable initiatives this term, including foodbank collections, dementia support projects and preparations for summer outreach

work with local primary schools and parish partners. During Refugee Week, students reflected on themes of dignity, justice and compassion through prayer, reflection and curriculum activities. We were also proud to see students perform in the 30th anniversary production of Born for This at Symphony Hall, showcasing both their talents and their commitment to expressing faith through the arts.

We remain grateful for the support and guidance of Fr Toby and Fr John, their contributions continue to enrich the faith life of the school and strengthen the links between school, parish and community.

Some of the other highlights from this term include:

- The annual STEM Fair welcomed Year 5 pupils from seven primary schools for a day of robotics, drones and problem-solving activities led by student STEM Leaders.
- The Paired Reading programme helped students achieve an average of two years' reading progress in just seven months with support from Sixth Form mentors.
- Culture Day gave students the opportunity to celebrate global traditions and explore the diversity within the school community.
- Our comprehensive careers programme provided employer encounters, mock interviews and award-winning personal development opportunities.
- Sixth Form students collaborated with a professional artist to create a community mosaic celebrating the school's identity and diversity.
- More than 60 students successfully completed Bronze and Silver Duke of Edinburgh programmes, developing resilience, independence and leadership skills.
- The PE department expanded sporting opportunities and achieved the School Games Platinum Award while supporting success at regional and national levels.

Our Sixth Form continues to flourish. Students have benefited from new super-curricular resources designed to deepen subject knowledge, develop independent learning skills and strengthen university applications. Year 12 students have continued their excellent work through the Reader Leader programme, supporting younger students with reading, while others have contributed to community projects, including a local mosaic initiative that will be displayed at railway stations across the area.

We are also delighted by the growing popularity of our Sixth Form, with over 260 applications already received for next year, including a significant increase in applications from students outside Bishop Challoner.

We would like to congratulate our Year 11 and Year 13 students, who have now completed the majority of their public examinations. Throughout the exam season, they have demonstrated maturity, resilience and a strong work ethic. We look forward to celebrating their achievements when results are released later this summer.

Regular school attendance is one of the most important factors in helping young people achieve their full potential. Every lesson provides valuable opportunities for learning, building confidence, developing friendships and participating in the wider life of the school. When students attend school consistently and arrive on time, they are better able to keep up with their learning, make sustained progress and feel fully connected to their school community. We are grateful for the support of parents and carers in promoting excellent attendance and would encourage families to continue working with us to ensure that students attend school every day whenever possible. Together, we can help every young person make the most of the opportunities available to them. As the term comes to a close, we would like to thank several members of staff who will be retiring from Bishop Challoner. Mrs Grater and Ms Y Jones have each given many years of dedicated service to our school community, and we are deeply grateful for the positive impact they have had on the lives of students and colleagues. We wish them every happiness for the future.

This term, we say a fond farewell to Mrs Maggie Nutt as she retires after 39 years of outstanding service to Bishop Challoner Catholic College. Since joining the school in 1987, Mrs Nutt has made an exceptional contribution in a range of roles, including Head of Modern Foreign Languages, Head of Sixth Form, Religious Education teacher and Strategic Safeguarding Lead.

Throughout her career, Mrs Nutt has touched the lives of thousands of students through her dedication, compassion and unwavering commitment to their success and wellbeing. She has been a highly respected colleague, mentor and friend, whose influence has helped shape our school community for nearly four decades.

We are incredibly grateful for all that Mrs Nutt has given to Bishop Challoner and wish her every happiness and blessing in her well-deserved retirement.

REFLECTIONS ON WORK EXPERIENCE AND STARTING THE UCAS PROCESS

This week, our Year 12 students took part in a dedicated day of reflection, focusing on the valuable experiences they gained during their work placements and considering how these experiences will shape their future aspirations. It was an excellent opportunity for students to evaluate the skills they have developed, celebrate their achievements and identify the next steps on their journey beyond sixth form.

A key focus of the day was the launch of the UCAS application process. Students received guidance on beginning their applications and explored what makes a strong personal statement. Although the personal statement is an important part of university applications, the skills involved in writing about personal strengths, experiences and ambitions are equally valuable when applying for apprenticeships and employment.

We encourage all students to continue reflecting on their experiences over the summer and to begin drafting and refining their personal statements. Taking time now to produce a thoughtful and well-crafted application will place them in a strong position as they prepare for the exciting opportunities ahead.

YEAR 12 SPORTS DAY

This week, we held our first ever Year 12 Sports Day, bringing students together for an afternoon of fun, friendly competition and teamwork. Organised by Miss Shirley at The Irish Centre, the event was a fantastic opportunity for students to unwind after a busy year while strengthening friendships and celebrating the end of the academic year.

Students took part in a range of traditional sports day events, including the egg and spoon race, sack race, three-legged race, relay races and rounders. The enthusiasm, laughter and team spirit on display made for a wonderful afternoon, with students embracing every challenge and cheering one another on throughout the event.

A huge thank you goes to Miss Shirley for organising such a successful event and to all of the staff who supported the afternoon. We hope this has become a new Year 12 tradition that our future students will look forward to each year.

PREPARING FOR FUTURE CAREERS

This week, our Year 12 students also took part in a mock assessment centre delivered in partnership with Severn Trent Water. Assessment centres are increasingly used by large employers as part of their recruitment process, particularly for apprenticeships and graduate programmes, making this an invaluable opportunity for our students to experience the process first-hand.

The day was led by former staff member Conor Quigley, who now works for Severn Trent Water. It was wonderful to welcome Conor back to Sixth Form as he shared his professional experience and provided students with valuable insight into the expectations of employers. Students received practical advice on creating effective CVs, developing interview skills and presenting themselves confidently throughout the recruitment process.

Students also had the opportunity to complete a range of tasks and activities similar to those used by Severn Trent Water when assessing potential applicants. These activities helped students develop and showcase key employability skills, including teamwork, communication, problem-solving and leadership.

The day was an excellent opportunity for students to understand what future recruitment processes may look like and to build confidence in preparation for their next steps. It was particularly valuable for students considering apprenticeship pathways, where assessment centres are often a key part of the application journey.

We are extremely grateful to Conor for giving up his time to support our students and for helping them prepare for the exciting opportunities ahead.

SEXTORTION

Sextortion is a type of blackmail when someone threatens to share nude images or videos of, or sexual information about, someone online unless they are paid money or agree to do something else for them, such as send more images. Sextortion is a crime and can be committed by an individual or a group of people working together. There is an increasing risk from criminal gangs and other individuals targeting young people in this financially motivated way.

It is a very difficult and distressing thing for a young person to experience, and they may not seek help from a trusted adult as they may feel scared, embarrassed or worried about getting in trouble.

Any young person can be targeted by sextortion, but some research has shown that boys are more likely to be targeted by financial sextortion.

Peyton GK (8SEB) - 27.8m Javelin breaking the previous record held by Luke R (24m in 2013).

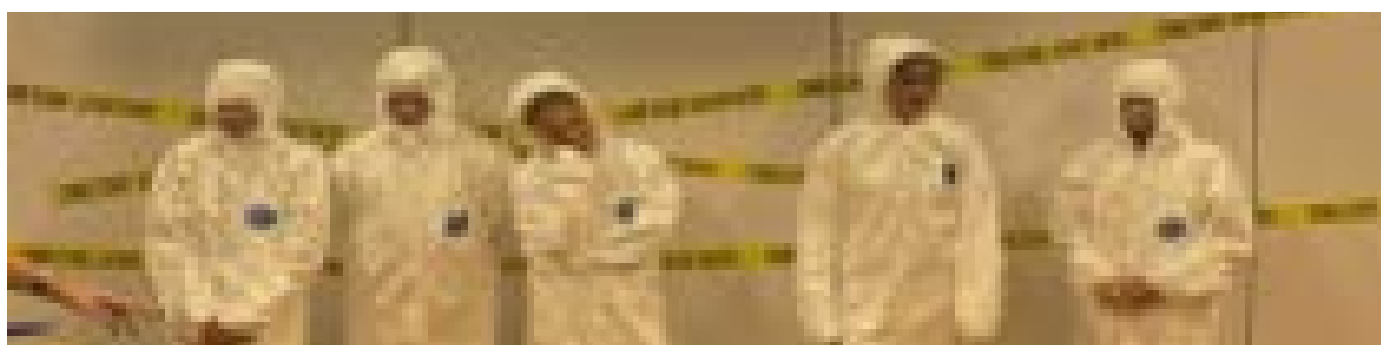
CSI SCIENCE DAY

During our Year 7 CSI Day, the Year 7 worked as forensic investigators to solve the mystery of who stole Dr Coughlan's laptop. We examined evidence, analysed clues, and used scientific techniques to identify the most likely suspect from Miss Hughes, Mr Noone, Mrs Jethwa, and Ms Lloyd.

The investigation involved studying several different types of forensic evidence:

- Blood samples – We compared the blood evidence from the crime scene with samples from each suspect to see if there was a match.
- Ransom note – We examined the note for clues, including handwriting, wording, and any evidence that could link it to one of the suspects.
- Mystery powder – We carried out tests to identify the unknown powder and considered how it might be connected to the theft.
- Fingerprints – We compared fingerprints collected from the scene with those of the suspects to find possible matches.
- Footprints – We analysed the size, pattern, and shape of footprints left at the scene and compared them with footwear linked to each suspect.

By combining the results from each piece of evidence, we developed our investigation, discussed our findings, and decided which suspect was most likely responsible for stealing Dr Coughlan's laptop. The activity showed how real forensic scientists use different types of evidence together rather than relying on just one clue. Miss Hughes was the criminal! We had PC T. Dale and University of Worcester CSI visitors in showing the students the different techniques to investigate a crime. Well done to all the Year 7 students and the science team including the technicians for running such a great day!



SAN FRANCISCO

From 7th–13th July, 55 students from Years 10 and 11 embarked on an unforgettable educational visit to San Francisco and Silicon Valley. The trip was designed to inspire our students by bringing computing, technology and STEM to life through real-world experiences.

Our journey began with a visit to the iconic Fisherman's Wharf, where students enjoyed their first taste of San Francisco and took in the sights of the waterfront. Throughout the week, they experienced some of the city's most famous landmarks, including Pier 39, Union Square, the historic Cable Cars, and the world-famous Golden Gate Bridge.

A major highlight of the trip was our visit to Silicon Valley, the global centre of innovation. Students had the opportunity to visit Stanford University and explore the Googleplex. These visits gave students a fascinating insight into the companies and people shaping the future of technology and helped them appreciate the wide range of careers available within the STEM sector.

The group also visited The Tech Interactive Museum, where students took part in hands-on activities and explored interactive exhibits covering robotics, artificial intelligence, engineering and innovation. It was fantastic to see so many students fully engaged and asking thoughtful questions throughout the visit.

Alongside the educational experiences, students enjoyed some of California's best attractions, including a day at Six Flags Discovery Kingdom, a guided tour of San Francisco, and a visit to the historic island prison of Alcatraz, where they learned about one of America's most famous landmarks.

Another memorable moment was attending a Major League Baseball game at Oracle Park, watching the San Francisco Giants take on the Colorado Rockies. For many students, this was their first experience of American sport and an opportunity to experience the incredible atmosphere of a professional sporting event.

Throughout the week, our students represented Bishop Challoner Catholic College exceptionally well. They demonstrated maturity, curiosity, excellent behaviour and respect at every venue we visited. They embraced new experiences, supported one another and were frequently praised by tour guides, venue staff and members of the public for their conduct.

Trips like this provide far more than sightseeing. They broaden students' horizons, develop independence and confidence, and allow classroom learning to be connected with the wider world. We hope the experiences and memories from this visit will continue to inspire our students as they consider their future education and career pathways.

A huge thank you goes to all the staff who gave up their time to make the trip possible, and to the parents and carers for their continued support. Most importantly, thank you to our wonderful students, who made the trip such a success. It was a fantastic week that will be remembered for many years to come.
