Message from Dr Coughlan Executive Principal

Dear Parent/Carer,

It has been a wonderful autumn term at Bishop Challoner Catholic College filled with hard work and incredibly enriching experiences outside the classroom. The BC14 Christmas newsletter will provide you with just a snapshot of some of the brilliant work across the school this term and I hope you enjoy reading it.

This year has been designated as a Jubilee Year under the banner of Pilgrims of Hope. Students and staff joined a livestream shared across the entire Archdiocese of Birmingham to celebrate the jubilee year drawing to a close. It was absolutely fantastic to see Bishop Challoner students leading some of the prayer and liturgy as part of this wonderful occasion and all credit to those involved.

Our students continue to bring hope to our local community. Once again, we have been working with the Birmingham Irish Association to purchase toys to give out to those in need; Irish TV were in school a few weeks ago to film students and staff. The collection this year has been quite incredible and will bring some much-needed joy to local families.

For a second year, we continue to fundraise for Fr Hudson's Caritas. There have been a variety of cake sales, discos and other charitable events taking place across the school and we hope to meet or exceed the £6,000 our school community raised last year.

We are extremely proud of our sixth form. Alongside their studies, they have supported the local Dementia Café, World Mental Health Day, hosted a fortnightly tea party for local parishioners and in December they led a Rudolph run which raised close to £2,000 for the Birmingham Hospice — an incredible effort. They really epitomise our mission of service to others.

Applications are still open for our sixth form, and it is brilliant to see record numbers applying this year. Many of our students have been completing their UCAS applications this term and a significant number have secured an interview at Oxbridge to study a wide range of subjects. In those great words of Oscar Romero, our sixth form really does remain a place to "aspire to be more".

proclaimed the message repentance- calling people to change their ways to be ready to enter the kingdom of




God. His message was clear, words are not enough, there must be actions to produce 'good fruit'.


JOURNEY IN FAITH

But for many autistic children and young people and their families the festive season can be one of the most difficult times of year. Normal routines and


daily life turn upside down as the unusual sights, sounds and traditions of Christmas take over.

On the final day of the Christmas Term, a group of our talented musicians took their show on the road and visited the Irish Centre to support local members of the community with dementia. The guests at the Irish Centre were celebrating Christmas with great food, company and music. Jobe Sullivan, a strong link between Bishop Challoner and the Birmingham Irish Association, led the Trad Irish ensemble with a long set of music and it was a fantastic example of the outreach work our students do within the wider community as well as showcasing their musical ability. We are proud of how our students worked with the guests at the Irish Centre and the genuine care and enthusiasm they showed throughout the afternoon. Their music brought smiles, sparked memories, and created a joyful atmosphere: it was a reminder of the power of music to connect generations and of the compassion and talent our students bring to every opportunity.

MUSIC IN THE AUTUMN TERM

The autumn term has passed quickly, and it is hard to believe we are counting down the days until Christmas. As ever, the year began in a lively and musical way, with plenty of performances and opportunities both inside and outside school. Highlights have included choral singing in Mass, concerts in the library, and events beyond the school gates. It has been especially exciting to see so many Year 7 students signing up for instrumental tuition and showing real enthusiasm for extracurricular activities, joining our older and more experienced students in keeping the department busy and vibrant.

The total number of students receiving weekly instrumental tuition has reached nearly 100 and, thanks to our excellent one to one and ensemble tuition from teachers at the Music Service and beyond, many students have made great progress which supports their classroom learning and develops their knowledge of music theory and ensemble experience, both of which supports learning at GCSE level. We currently offer woodwind, brass, strings, keyboard/piano, guitar, drum kit and steel pan lessons for our students.

BIRMINGHAM COMHALTAS GROUP

Some more of our musicians are involved with the Birmingham Comhaltas group, performing traditional Irish music within the local community, and would welcome new members. We are also pleased to say a number of classical instrumentalists perform regularly at venues such as Symphony Hall with their ensembles, choirs and orchestras. Sophie, one of our Year 11 flautists and a keen composer, will have one of her compositions performed next Summer as part of the Junior Proms: more about that in a future newsletter, but we are all extremely proud of her achievements.

YEAR 10

Our Year 10 BTEC Performing Arts group have also begun their journey of exploring the Musical Theatre genre. This started with an exploration of Musical Theatre as a whole, learning songs, choreography and script from a wide range of musicals, from Avenue Q to Hairspray. This was the beginning of their Musical Theatre journey, and they have now moved on to a detailed study into the musical Blood Brothers, which will continue well into the spring term, learning choreography and songs from the musical, as well as completing an extensive written exploration into the creation and production of the musical. This really brings the learning to life and we are all thoroughly enjoying the process so far!

WE SING CHOIR

Our choir, We Sing, has welcomed some new students to the group, who have been to each rehearsal consistently since the beginning of term. Their levels of enthusiasm are unparalleled and, along with our longer-serving members, have enjoyed learning and performing material ranging from Disney classics to 80's pop hits! Our choir have most recently performed at our special Christmas service, fulfilling their aim of filling St Dunstan's church with glorious singing during Advent.

DRAMA CLUB

Amongst the many extra curricular activities running before and after school, this year sees the return of Drama Club! Following our success in the past with performances in school and venues such as Highbury Hall, we have assembled an enthusiastic group of students (and we are always looking for future members) who have explored some script work, character work and physical theatre over the last half term. We look forward to seeing these students develop their confidence and communication skills even further through our work on dramatic texts and techniques.









YEAR 11

Our Year 11 BTEC Performing Arts cohort have made a positive start to the year and have already recorded two performances for the second component of the course. They keenly took on the roles of Matilda, Ensemble and Mrs Trunchbull to create a performance piece based on the hit West End musical Matilda, which was full of characterisation through the three art forms which Musical Theatre encapsulates: drama, dance, and singing. We are proud of their performance journey in the last year and are all looking forward to starting their 3rd and final component in January.

YEAR 9

On Friday 3rd October the Music Department hosted the first BGT of the year, New Kidz on the Block. This annual event features musical performances from our Year 7 students who can play a musical instrument. We were delighted that students volunteered to play, some of them beginners, some of them more experienced.

The library was filled with an enthusiastic audience, cheering on their peers and listening respectfully to the performances. First up to play was Emma, a talented guitarist, who played an acoustic rendition of Metallica's Nothing Else Matters. Following the rock theme, Kimi stepped up on guitar to play the opening to Seven Nation Army, which a lot of the students recognised.

Elijah, who had impressed teachers in lessons with his keyboard skills, played the classic Grand of Duke of York on the piano (and did very well with an unfamiliar keyboard). Davina played solo violin, one of the more challenging instruments, and performed The Two Roses - one of a few students who played entirely from memory!

To close the event we had two more pianists, Ava Mary playing Shotgun by George Ezra, and Lily with her cover of All Things Bright and Beautiful.

It was fantastic to see our young performers bravely play in the library, and hopefully this will be the first of many musical performances for them this year. It was really encouraging to have a group of students come and speak to me at the end of the BGT to sign up for instrumental lessons! Well done to our young musicians for kickstarting this year's BGT events in style.







REMEMBRANCE

During the week of Remembrance in November, Bishop Challoner Catholic College was transformed into a place of reflection and creativity. Alongside striking displays of poppies and soldier silhouettes in the school grounds, the Music and Performing Arts departments contributed their own tribute. Moving instrumental and dance performances were projected onto the walls of the building, drawing in members of the local community who came to pause and remember loved ones lost to war. Within school, the moment was marked with a respectful silence, during which students watched a recording of Morgan, a former student, performing The Last Post on the tuba.

YEAR 11

Year 11 have impressed us with the way they are taking ownership of their GCSE coursework this term. Many are choosing styles that reflect their own musical interests, experimenting with lyrics, backing tracks and notation to shape original compositions. Outside of lessons, they've been rehearsing independently for their ensemble performances, showing real commitment as they prepare to record. The variety of instruments and repertoire has been fantastic — from bass guitar to piano and violin, and from Guns N' Roses right through to Bach. In class, they are also tackling two demanding set works from the Classical and Baroque periods, and honing their exam technique to prepare for the summer.

MASS

We are building a strong choir community who regularly lead the singing in Mass and we are delighted to see students from Year 7 embrace this opportunity alongside the older students.

On 18th November, members of our school community hosted a Mass to celebrate the work of Bishop Challoner and a number of primary students in the Tolkien cluster at St Dunstan's Church. Weeks of workshops, preparation, singing and partnership culminated in a wonderful celebration of the primary schools' faith and of course we were thrilled to include as much music as possible! Our choir led the school with a number of hymns and the church was filled with primary and secondary voices ending the mass with the Song of Hope.

We are always delighted when students volunteer to lead the singing – this can be quite daunting – but as always they did so with grace and with lovely voices!

KEY STAGE 3

Key Stage 3 music has been full of creativity this term, with students getting stuck into composing, improvising, performing and exploring different styles. Year 7 have enjoyed discovering the instruments of the orchestra and beyond, and are now using musical terminology with growing confidence as they put together their first Binary Form pieces on keyboards. Year 8 have thrown themselves into the Blues, learning to play the 12 Bar Blues in time with a beat after exploring the story behind the genre and its social and historical roots.

Year 9 have really connected with the theme of Pop and Protest Music this term. They have chosen issues that matter to them, written their own lyrics, and shaped these into powerful songs. The excitement has built as they moved from ideas on paper to recording in the studio, with students stepping up to the microphone to share their message. It is always inspiring to see what topics motivate them to speak out and how confidently they use music as their voice for change.

YEAR 10

Our Year 10 musicians have settled quickly into GCSE study and are already engaging with the core concepts of the course. They have been learning about essential musical terms like harmony, texture and melody, and putting these into practice through listening tasks, examples and hands on activities. To strengthen their understanding, they are also working on the basics of music theory, which will help them as they begin to analyse the set works in more depth. The class has shown real enthusiasm and commitment, and it is exciting to see them starting to develop their performance, composition and analytical skills.

CHRISTMATHS DAY

On Thursday 11th December, Bishop Challoner Maths department proudly hosted students from the Tolkien cluster schools for the annual 'Christmaths' Day. This muchloved traditional event brought festive cheer to primary school students through a series of competitive Maths events, each with a Christmas twist. The event was led by wonderful year 9 student leaders, who worked extremely hard behind the scenes to make the day a success.



CHRISTMAS TEA PARTY

This year's Christmas Tea Party was a wonderful celebration that brought together members of our local community for an afternoon filled with festive cheer, delicious food, and joyful activities. The students decorated the common room to create a warm and welcoming atmosphere where guests could relax, enjoy seasonal treats, and share in the spirit of the holidays. Our catering team and Santa's helpers in the kitchen prepared a fantastic turkey! ASSEMBLIES

Over the past fortnight, we have continued to explore the themes of Advent and Christmas, lighting the Advent wreath and reflecting particularly on the theme of Peace. Students have come together as a community to consider what peace looks like in their own lives, while reflecting on a message from Pope Leo, who reminds us that the birth of Jesus is a source of great joy and hope. It signifies God's unending love and forgiveness, and the opportunity for reconciliation, highlighting that "the door of God's heart is always open" to those who return to Him.

Students have also enjoyed learning about a range of Christmas traditions in the UK and around the world, with a particular focus on Germany, Mexico, and Ethiopia. From the foods shared and gifts exchanged to the holy celebrations observed, students were able to identify common messages of Christmas: coming together with loved ones; sending peace and joy to all; giving glory to God for the birth of Jesus, who came to save us; giving our time, help, and gifts to show love to others; and sharing messages of hope.

FORM RESOURCES

Students have had the valuable opportunity to learn about Human Rights Day during form time and to explore what this means in practice. Not only have students considered some of our basic human rights, but they have also learned about the United Nations and the vital work it undertakes. During these sessions, students engaged in an interactive quiz that explored key human rights, as well as the important distinction between a human right and a human want.

This week, students have also received key safety messages in preparation for the Christmas break. These discussions have been closely linked to promoting health and wellbeing, including the importance of regular exercise, self-care, and maintaining healthy sleep routines. Students have been encouraged to use the holiday period to connect with others and to enjoy reading from a recommended reading list. Please note that if you have any safety concerns over the Christmas period, you should not hesitate to contact the police by calling 101 for non-emergency situations, or 999 if you or someone else is in immediate danger.

FIRST AID INFORMATION AND PROCEDURES

Medication; All medication should be handed into first aid and not carried by the students. Exception EpiPen, Asthma inhalers and insulin as well as Tranexamic acid in special circumstances.

Please make sure we have the correct medical information and emergency contact details. If you have changed your phone number or there is any change in medical conditions or concerns, please contact first aid using the enquiries email or the main school phone number.

Please send children into school with a water bottle which they can re-fill at our water stations provided. Alternatively, they can purchase a drink from the school canteen.

Students with Asthma must carry their own personal inhalers with them. This includes offsite activities and school trips to ensure they can participate safely.

Parents/Carers of students with a known allergy must provide school first aid with antihistamine; this also applies to those with anaphylaxis in addition to their EpiPen.

We do not provide liquid paracetamol such as Calpol. If your child cannot take tablets and you would prefer them to have liquid Calpol, please send this in to the school first aider with your childs name on it. This will be kept safe in first aid for your child only.

FIRST AID AND MOBILE PHONES

Students should not be contacting parents/carers when they feel unwell and requesting to be collected from school. If a student is unwell, they MUST go to the First Aider who will deal with them. If a student is not well enough to stay in school, the First Aider will contact parents/carers to arrange collection.

Students who contact their parents/carer directly and do not follow the procedures in place will be sanctioned, this may result in their mobile phone having to be handed in to the student services office each day. The use of anyone else's mobile phone risks that person being sanctioned also.

Please do not arrive at school to collect your child unless school have contacted you to do so. We do not have school staff readily available to collect children. Thank you for your support and co-operation.

UNIFORM STANDARDS

Students are required to wear the standard uniform of blazer, tie, white/blue shirt with black straight leg school trousers (not skinny or boot cut) or girls can wear a knee length black pleated school skirt. Girls are also reminded that if they choose to wear a skirt, then they should wear plain, black, opaque tights. Students are reminded that black leather school shoes should be worn and that trainers/trainer style shoes are forbidden.

Please note that school shoes must be kept completely black and boots of any kind are not allowed.

Our uniform requirements are complemented by a smart appearance and as such, hair styles that should not have a distinct contrast in length. Hair that is dyed must be of a natural hair colour and may not contain more than one colour. To avoid a health and safety risk, long hair must not impede vision or cover the face, except for a fringe which must not cover the eyes. Long hair must be tied up for practical lessons. Religious head coverings must be black and securely tied for practical lessons. Hair bands or accessories must be for functional use to secure the hair . Where hairbands are worn they must be black. Headwear that has religious or cultural purpose should be black. The final decision as to whether a particular haircut/style is appropriate is at the discretion of senior staff.

Make up, nail varnish and jewellery are not permitted, with the exception of one pair of plain stud gold or silver earrings which may be worn.

Students found to be wearing an inappropriate item of uniform may be asked to change this or, in some cases, parents/carers will be contacted and requested to bring replacement uniform to school.

We appreciate your support in ensuring that standards of uniform and appearance are maintained.

REPORTING AN ABSENCE

All students are required to attend school/college on time every day. If for any reason your child is unable to attend, please ensure that the school attendance policy is followed, and their absence is reported before the START of the school day (8.40am) and on each day of absence. Please provide a reason for their absence and the likely length of absence, if known.

If you receive a text message or phone call from school/college because you have not reported your child's absence, please contact us on the most appropriate number as detailed above as soon as you can.
