Password security

Given the number of accounts that many of us have in our daily lives the appropriate use and management of passwords is becoming ever more important. It was recently reported that 1.2TB worth of login details and customer information had been found. This data was the result of a large-scale attack on some of the world's biggest companies and organisations.

It is imperative that we are all taking steps to protect our data and the best form of primary defence is a strong password. Please communicate with your child the need for strong passwords on both their school and personal accounts.

Here are some tips to make a password secure:

- · Never use the same password twice.
- Passwords should not be relatable to you this makes it easier for someone with information about you to guess e.g. children's names or favourite sports teams.
- · Passwords should not be common e.g. password12345, letmein etc.
- · Passwords should be a combination of characters, upper and lowercase letters, and numbers.
- · Passwords should be of a good length, a minimum of 10 characters is recommended.
- · Make use of a password manager to store these unique login details."

On 26th September each year, we celebrate European Day of Languages. This year we celebrate 20 years of linguistic and cultural diversity.

Throughout Europe, 800 million Europeans are represented in the Council of Europe's 47 member states and all are encouraged to discover more languages at any age, as part of or alongside their studies. This stems from the Council of Europe's conviction that linguistic diversity is a tool for achieving greater intercultural understanding and a key element in the rich cultural heritage of our continent. Therefore, the Council of Europe, in Strasbourg, promotes plurilingualism in the whole of Europe.

In our Bishop Challoner community, 18% of our students can speak at least 2 languages! This make them bilingual or even multilingual.

Amongst those, some of the European languages spoken by our students are Polish, Spanish, Portuguese, French, Bosnian, Italian, Greek and many others.

Some of our students can also speak Tigrinya, Malayalam, Tagalog, Farsi, Mandarin, Lingala, Swahili, Turkish, Panjabi, Arabic, Urdu, etc.
