What is GCSE English Language all about?

English is everywhere: it's the television we watch in the evening; it's the leaflets that come through our letter box; it's the adverts we see on the side of buses. It's even more than that: it's how we communicate and understand each other and this is why it is seen as such an important qualification.

Through the study of English Language, students will follow a varied curriculum where they will hone their analytical and interpretative skills. They will be exposed to a range of texts and also practise their ability to communicate verbally in a variety of contexts. However, at the basis of the course are the key literacy skills that underpin our ability to understand and communicate accurately.

Paper 1 – Explorations in Creative Reading and Writing Section A: Reading (based on one unseen literary text) Section B: Writing (descriptive or narrative writing)

Paper 2 – Writers' Viewpoints and Perspectives

Section A: Reading (one unseen non-fiction text and one unseen literary non-fiction text)

Section B: Writing (writing to present a viewpoint)

In addition, students will have their speaking and listening skills assessed as a separate endorsement (this will not contribute to their overall grade).
