Top Tops:

1) Prepare before class.

A) Academically- have you done your homework? Check your Diary.
 Check with your mates. E-mail your teacher. Make time to do it in advance.
 Remember- Practice makes perfect.

B) Mentally- Get in the game. Put the right mind-set on. 'I can do this';'Today's going to be great'; 'I'm going to learn something new'.

- C) *Physically* Bring the right equipment for every subject and WATER.
 2) Have a practical bag. Make sure you keep it tidy like you do your own space where you are living. At the end of the week. Pause. Clean it out. Tidy it up.
- 3) Practice your handwriting. If you can't read it- neither can your teacher. [see below].
- 4) Take good notes[see image below]. Follow a particular method of note taking. They're tried and tested and STICK to it. [See below].
- *5) Write* **YOUR** homework in your diary. It will be up to you. YOU are held responsible for your organisation and memory.
- 6) Go over your notes after a lesson- sharpen them up with any details you can remember and/or add questions you have.
- 7) Continue to discuss difficult concepts and topics outside of lessons.
- 8) Use effective Study Tools- Images/Symbols to trigger key concepts; colourful mind maps, etc.
- 9) Revise regularly. Make a study group. Keep a tidy study space. Find a routine and stick to it.
- 10) Take care of your mind, body and soul. Reflect on what you need. Stay hydrated. Exercise. Eat right. Take time for mindfulness-meditate and pray.

1) Prepare before class.
