#### What's it all about?

• Sometimes defined as 'the science of society'

It is a subject which studies societies and their development

 It focuses on the relationship between people and the society they grow up in

- It seeks to explain human behaviour in terms of the interactions we have with one another
- How we are influenced by the physical and cultural environment we inhabit
- Sociologists study society in order to explain how society shapes us and how we, as individuals or broader social groups, help shape society


- Sociologists study lots of different things about society

- It is not easy, but few things truly worthwhile doing ever are!

- Three exams at the end of Year 13
- Each one is 2 hours long

- For most of you it will be a new subject full of new language and new ideas
- It involves a lot of reading and you are expected to write essays
- You need a minimum 5 in English, ideally a 6 or above
- If you enjoy it, and work at it, it is incredibly rewarding

I would say to someone thinking about taking Sociology, to go for it. If you are someone who questions the world around you, someone who wants to try understand the people you interact with and have some interest in politics and current affairs this subject is for you.

Personally, I enjoy sociology as I'm now able to construct strong arguments based on current affairs through applying what I have learnt through studying sociology such as issues of Education and social policy.

Personally, I find sociology interesting as it allows me to formulate my own view of the world. The world is constantly changing and sociology allows you to understand these changes, predict social change and push for social change. As humans we are the most complex organisms on earth, traditional science alone cannot explain our behaviours. Sociology is the science of society, big and small from 5 individuals in a school to 7 billion people spread across the world there is no definite answer to why we as social groups behave in certain ways, learning is never ending in the field of social sciences. I have also found sociology has aided my ability to write. I feel more confident in other subjects I study when approaching evaluation questions as sociology is based on a range of ideas which contradict and complement each other. The skill to evaluate is crucial for success in any academic field.

Sociology is the most relevant of subjects today. We live in a world of increased globalisation, social media has transferred our society onto a virtual platform, communications and social norms amongst our generation are changing rapidly, and the issues that this virtual world produces are becoming apparent. There is a demand for new social thinkers with an understanding of this new social epidemic. What would you say to someone thinking about studying it at A Level?

Sociology is an interesting subject which can also be enjoyable. I would recommend taking it for A Level as it helps to build your knowledge about the world we live in today and is likely to assist you with other subjects as you also learn about other countries and their history.

Why do you enjoy it?

I enjoy sociology because I find it interesting to learn about modern society as it is important to be aware of current social changes. Also, it is useful to learn about other countries and how different they are from the UK. What makes it an interesting subject to study?

Sociology is extremely interesting because you learn about many different cultures, religions etc. This is helpful as it expands your knowledge and awareness about the World which is vital. Also, you learn about how people are treated differently due to their class, gender and ethnicity this helps make people aware of current social issues which is important.

What makes it a useful and worthwhile academic discipline?

The subject helps to build your analytic skills as it makes you think about why certain social events occur. Analytical skills are extremely useful and can be applied to other subjects making sociology a worthwhile subject to study.

#### How relevant do you think it is?

I think sociology is relevant as you learn about modern society which applies to us as you learn about cultural and social changes that happen in modern day to day life. For example, a topic we study is social policy which helps develop your knowledge about the current government. It is important that we understand and know about events that occur and about the world we live in.

### Sociology/Psychology

- Sociology as an academic discipline tends to focus less on the biological or physiological causes of human behaviour
- Instead it focuses on the importance of social interaction and how nurture determines the kind of people we become
