Assemblies

Year 8 continue to attend a weekly assembly in the sports hall. Each week they start the assembly in worship, before receiving important messages such as information about World Religion Day, World Cancer Day, and the importance of attendance at school. We have been very impressed with the confidence and eloquence of those pupils who have volunteered to stand up in assembly to do this – well done.

Form Time

Assessments

Year 8 assessments at the midpoint of key stage 3 have been ongoing since 22nd January. Year 8 have shown a focus and dedication towards their revision that has been very impressive. We would like to commend them on their hard work and effort. The results of the assessment may result in some group changes to ensure that pupils are best placed to continue the key stage 3 curriculum. Class teachers and the pastoral team will be available to discuss the results in more detail at the parents' consultation day in March.

Maths Challenge

On the 1st of February 2024, Bishop Challoner hosted the annual Year 8 Maths Challenge day. We entered two teams from Year 8 and both performed admirably. They had a fantastic day competing across 4 maths-based activities against 8 other Catholic schools from around the West Midlands. We had one team who finished in 4th place and the other finished in 7th place.

Alton Castle

On Sunday 26th November the year 7 and 8 students who were attending Alton Castle residential attended St. Dunstan's Church on National Youth Sunday to celebrate a youth mass in preparation for their upcoming residential.

The following day forty-three students set off for Alton castle from Monday to Wednesday, where they experienced fun, faith and friendship in action.

Students took part in biking, trekking, crate stacking, a low ropes course. Students also had a disco with lots of dancing and a conga line. We also had some budding actors in the group as we explored our retreat theme of 'the nativity'. Amongst the time of fun there was also opportunities to be more reflective with morning and night prayers, Grace before and after meals and the Holy Mass celebrated together as a community.

Throughout our retreat we were looking for students to display the commit to character virtues we follow in school. Well done to Teddy, Petro, Elsie, Mary, Mohammed, Ava, Joseph and Luke who displayed virtues of resilience, compassion and faith filled. The students had a brilliant time at Alton Castle and we're already looking forward to our next visit for year 7 and 8 in November 2024.



Cyber Club for Girls

In November, we took a group of year 8 girls, accompanied by previous CyberFirst winners and finalists from year 9 and 10, to kick off CyberFirst at Aston University. It turned out to be a success, and six teams of girls in year 8 signed up to enter the national cyber security competition lead by GCHQ. One team, in particular, showed incredible commitment – even attending school on Sunday to complete more challenges with the support of their computing teachers. Collectively the school scored around 16,000 points! We hope that the girls who participated might consider pursuing future careers in technology.

Ball Crew

As a school, Bishop Challoner have been selected to supply a Ball crew for the ITF 50k Womens World Tennis Tour when the competition reaches Birmingham in February. Thirty pupils have been selected for this magnificent opportunity with integral participants coming from Year 8. Testament to all involved for their hard work and dedication over the training period.



Indoor Athletics - 2nd Place

Year 8 Participated in an Indoor Athletics event at Billesley Tennis Centre. The pupils from Bishop Challoner competed against different schools in a variety of events (Sprinting, Standing long jump, Relay, High jump). The winner of the event transcends to the final at the University of Birmingham, unfortunately the boys involved in Year 8 marginally missed out but valiantly securing 2nd place.



Basketball - Jr NBA

A fantastic display from Year 8, who faced off against Lighthall in R5 of the Jr NBA. Challoner dominated the game scoring 38 points with each starting player scoring multiple baskets in the game. Challoner are now 2nd in the league with 2 games in hand and are in a great position to challenge for first place.





Girls Football

The year 8 girls competed in a tournament at Birmingham city against rival schools to compete for a place to represent BCFC at the EFL regional finals. The girls dominated the opposition and won 9 games out of 9, scoring 50+ goals and conceding 0.



Although disappointed, the year 8 girls from Bishop Challoner representing BCFC were a credit to the school and to themselves at the EFL Girls regional finals. Unfortunately, the girls were knocked out in the semifinals after an extremely close game.

Implement Targeted Programmes And Intervention

Approaches To Behaviour Management

Allergy Management

Bishop Challoner Catholic College aims to minimise the risk to students and staff with allergies, including those who are allergic to nuts.

It is vital that staff and parents/carers and students adhere to the Allergy Management policy, as we have both students and staff in school who suffer from allergies, including nut allergies.

Persons with allergies, including a nut allergy can suffer life-threatening consequences if they come into contact with allergens, including nuts, either through ingestion or through touch. Parents/carers, students and staff must not bring or send, any food into school either for packed lunches or for snacks/treats with nuts in (including sesame seeds). For example, the following items should not be brought into school:

- Packs of nuts
- Peanut butter sandwiches
- Fruit and cereal bars that contain nuts
- Chocolate bars or sweets that contain nuts
- Cakes or biscuits made with nuts
- Nutella
- Muesli bars

Care should be taken when exchanging gifts, in particular at Easter, Christmas and birthdays. We appreciate your support with this important matter.

Reporting Student Absence

All students are required to attend school/college on time every day. Mobile Phones

With most students in school now owning mobile phones for use to and from school, it is important that they are also not a distraction to study. Students found with mobile phones during lessons and around the school will have them confiscated and they will be returned at the discretion of senior staff/Heads of Year. In more persistent cases, phones may only be returned to parents/carers.

Uniform Standards

Students are required to wear the standard uniform of blazer, tie, white/blue shirt with black straight leg school trousers (not skinny or boot cut) or girls can wear a knee length black pleated school skirt. Girls are also reminded that if they choose to wear a skirt, then they should wear plain, black, opaque tights. Students are reminded that black leather school shoes should be worn and that trainers/ trainer style shoes are forbidden.

Please note that school shoes must be kept completely black and boots of any kind are not allowed.

Our uniform requirements are complemented by a smart appearance and as such, hair styles that should not have a distinct contrast in length. Hair that is dyed must be of a natural hair colour and may not contain more than one colour. To avoid a health and safety risk, long hair must not impede vision or cover the face, except for a fringe which must not cover the eyes. Long hair must be tied up for practical lessons. Religious head coverings must be black and securely tied for practical lessons. Hair bands or accessories must be for functional use to secure the hair . Where hairbands are worn they must be black. Headwear that has religious or cultural purpose should be black. The final decision as to whether a particular haircut/ style is appropriate is at the discretion of senior staff.

Make up, nail varnish and jewellery are not permitted with the exception of one pair of plain stud earrings which may be worn.

Students found to be wearing an inappropriate item of uniform may be asked to change this or in some cases parents/carers will be contacted and requested to bring replacement uniform to school.

We appreciate your support in ensuring that standards of uniform and appearance are maintained.

Students are expected to be in full uniform travelling to and from school.

Asthma, Anaphylaxis, Diabetes

Students diagnosed with Anaphylaxis must carry an Auto injector pen at all times on their person and a spare provided to first aid, this is in keeping with MHRA (Medicines and Healthcare products Regulatory Agency) Government agency recommendation that students should carry two Auto injector pens.

In order for your child to participate safely in trips and offsite activities, we will send with them the spare provided to first aid, in addition to the one they carry on them, so they have two with them following our school's policy for trips and off-site activities.

Other medications must be handed in to first aid or the trip lead on the day.
