Anti-bullying

What is bullying?

Most people understand bullying as behaviour by an individual or group, repeated over time, that is intended to hurt another individual or group either physically or emotionally.

All bullying, whatever the motivation or method is unacceptable and should not be tolerated. Bullying can manifest in any of these ways:

- Verbal spreading rumours, name calling, 'putdowns', humiliation, abusive and menacing messages
- **Physical** any form of physical intimidation or assault including, pushing, kicking, hitting, extortion, or theft of property
- **Emotional** being unfriendly, excluding, tormenting (eg hiding books), making threatening gestures
- Sexual unwanted physical contact, sexually abusive or explicit comments
- **Homophobic** verbal or physical abuse focussing on the issue of a person's sexuality
- **Racist** verbal or physical abuse focussing on the issue of a person's colour, ethnic heritage, culture, nationality, or religious identity
- Cyber any form of abuse or intimidation made by means of technology (e.g., mobile phone messages, videos, apps, text messaging, social media etc.)

What is a bystander?

A bystander witnesses someone being bullied and have a decision to make about reporting it. As part of our school community we would expect students to report any bullying that they might see, in the same way as you would if you were being bullied. Being a bystander and not reporting what you see is wrong, just as bullying itself is. A trusted adult in the school will make sure that they are discrete with how the issue is dealt with. message
