CPD DAY

October 21st saw all Trust staff invited to join in a Trust-wide PD Day. The day was built around supporting those with additional needs in the everyday. All 35 schools attended one of our secondary school sites and speakers were shared between the five schools to give input during the morning, either in person or virtually. Stuart Myers' 'The World at Your Feet' gave a 'first foot' insight into how supportive and adaptive teaching allowed him to succeed in his school and career. Simon Marshall spoke passionately about vulnerable groups of children and how their experience in school should always help, not hinder them in later life. Rachel Hargreaves told of her work and successes with children with SEND across the area and gave practical advice on supporting children with SEND in the classroom.

In the afternoon, the Trust SENDCO Leads for Primary and Secondary, Alex Glover and Lucy Kreczak, facilitated sessions that would tailor the learning from the morning to individual schools. Recognising that children in our schools are individual and need careful adaptations to allow full access to the curriculum, schools were able to discuss and plan bespoke strategies of support. This work will be collated by the SENDCO Leads and shared with all SENDCOs at their next network meetings - sharing the great work and ideas with all our schools.

Feedback from the day was overwhelmingly positive. Schools were able to consider their provision for children with additional needs and how they might improve or consolidate it using the learning from the day.



After attending the day, schools that are relatively new to the Trust said that they felt very much part of a bigger family and community working together for the success of all our children.

School Spotlight



ST CUTHBERT'S (CROOK)



Royal Shakespeare Company

Tuesday 4th October was a very exciting day at St. Cuthbert's Catholic Primary School in Crook, because, as a Royal Shakespeare Company Associate School, we hosted the RSC's 'First Encounters' production of 'Twelfth Night'.

The RSC's First Encounters productions are created to give 7-13 year olds a fantastic first experience of Shakespeare, whilst also being brilliant introductions for anyone new to Shakespeare's work.

During the afternoon, the children of KS2 were delighted by the performance, with plenty of suspense, laughter and engagement seen and heard throughout. In the evening, we welcomed children's families, friends, members of the parish and members of our 'County Durham/Crook' Shakespeare cluster. People who had never seen a Shakespeare performance before were surprised at how enjoyable and accessible a play written 400 years ago can be, and how, even if the language can be difficult at times, the facial expressions and body language of the performers can tell us so much!

A highlight of hosting the production was the fact that the RSC invited ten of our Class 5 children to perform in the first scene, alongside the RSC actors, as shipwrecked sailors. They worked with an RSC director to help them understand and rehearse the scene prior to performance day. Everyone was very impressed with how well they learned their lines, the confidence with which they delivered them and their ability to embody their characters so believably. Well done! The children are looking forward to the Shakespeare projects which we have planned for later in the year in collaboration with the RSC, as part of their Associate Schools Programme, such as the '37 Plays' project (to celebrate the 400th anniversary of Shakespeare's First Folio being published) and the Regional Playmaking Festival in June.

European Day of Languages

To celebrate 'European Day of Languages', KS2 children from St. Cuthbert's Catholic Primary School in Crook entered a regional competition run by the 'Association for Language Learning – North East'. The children imagined a view out of their window, drawing it and labelling it in a language of their choice. It was so impressive to see the variety of languages that the children included in their work, including French, Spanish, German, Ukrainian, Italian and Polish! It was a wonderful day of celebrating languages together. Sofia, from Class 3, has been awarded a Commendation certificate from the judges for her entry! Sofia drew a view of space from a spaceship window, including 'le soleil' (the sun), 'la Terre' (the Earth) and 'les étoiles' (the stars), as well as some of the planets in our solar system – "Par la fenêtre de l'espace, je vois le ciel." Congratulations Sofia for your well-deserved award!

THE ENGLISH MARTYRS



Be Kind

Students lead the way to support each other with a message of 'Be Kind'.

Students from The English Martyrs Catholic School and Sixth Form College, Hartlepool, have become anti-bullying ambassadors, receiving the Diana Award for young people who work to improve the lives of others, offering peer-to-peer support to any child who may feel they have issues at school or with friends outside of school.

Head teacher Sara Crawshaw said: "Our school virtues include compassion and justice. We want all students to feel that they have someone to talk to when they have any difficulties. We have a strong PSHE programme and assemblies to share these values and to sign post help when a student may need extra support."

The school has joined the Anti-Bullying Association, to reinforce how important it is to 'Be Kind'. This partnership has seen staff and students undertake specialist training, including a recent session with former footballer Martin Gray on how to tackle racism. We are also part of the Anna Freud Programme to support Positive Mental Health.

Assistant Head Teacher Glenn McLintock has led on student well-being. He has coordinated the training of over 40 Anti-Bullying Ambassadors and programme of activities to create a culture that challenges bullying.

Mr McLintock said "It is wonderful to see so many students involved in supporting each other and working with professional organisations to gain accreditation for their great work. These young people are fantastic role models, and we are very proud of them."

Share Your Story

On Friday 18th November, the BBC Education team visited EMS and held sessions with Year 7-9 students linking to their 100 years anniversary and their 'Share Your Story' campaign where BBC Storytellers which include relatable and inspiring BBC staff and well-known BBC stars from TV, Radio, Sport and News share stories of their personal journeys, setbacks and successes. Students were fantastic throughout and really engaged with the presenters.

A Level Geography Field Work

In November, A Level geography students visited both physical and urban environments this week to carry out their field work research. We had a really successful week collecting quality data. Students then analyse their data to write their individual NEA projects, which are worth 20% of their A Level.

ST JOHN'S

Prison Me No Way

Earlier this term, our Year 9 and 10 students each had a day's experience with the charity 'Prison Me No Way', focused on making positive choices, staying safe and avoiding crime. Students got to step inside a prison cell and hear from a current prisoner about the stark realities of life in prison, as well as learning about ways to be safe in today's society. It was a fantastic experience and one we're sure our students will remember.

Rugby World Cup Fan Village

Some of our students were lucky enough to travel to the Rugby World Cup Fan Village in Newcastle ahead of England's opening game back in October. Students met current players from the wheelchair squad, former legends of the men and women teams and were even provided with some coaching tips from former World Cup winner Jason Robinson. Students were even featured and interviewed on national news! As a school, we recently received a grant for new strips and equipment as part of a Rugby World Cup project putting funding into grassroots Rugby, as modelled here by our Year 11 team.

He Knows She Knows

Back in October we welcomed the performance duo 'He Knows She Knows' into school to perform and discuss issues around mental health and body image. Our students were encouraged to get involved in the performance to increase their endorphins and then listened to a talk on ways to manage our mental health, build resilience and the importance of being kind to ourselves.

Thankful Thursday

This term we launched a new initiative within school, Thankful Thursday, to encourage us all to take the time to be grateful for those around us. A Thankful Box was placed in the Chapel for students and staff to post thank you notes into to show their appreciation to another student or member of staff. Note cards were then delivered to staff and students each Thursday morning. The initiative was a huge success and really helped to brighten people's day.

Aushwitz Project

At the beginning of November, four of our Year 12 students travelled to Poland to visit the Auschwitz-Birkenau Memorial and Museum and the town of Oswiecim as part of the Lessons from Aushwitz project. It was an emotional and eye-opening day that ended with a candlelit reflection. Students then followed the visit by speaking to a Holocaust survivor. We look forward to the students sharing their experiences with the school in their Next Steps project.

The pilot event, which was organised by Tees Active, Stockton Councils Transformation Team and the care homes, were fortunate to have the invaluable assistance from the Year 11 pupils from St Michaels Catholic Academy in Billingham and the Funky4Life warm up was led by Leanne Oxley from Stockton's Active Lives Team.

Gallery Opening

During this autumn term, we have welcomed parents, carers and parishioners back into school in numbers we have not seen since the end of 2019, before the pandemic began. Parents of our youngest children in Daycare have been able to visit the rooms and areas where their children play during the day. We had up to fifty attending Friday's Liturgical prayer led by children. And, once more, parents have attended in-person parent consultations to talk about their child's learning with teachers. It is beginning to feel normal again to see parents and other visitors around school.

Some things have changed though: some parents prefer to use online meetings with teachers as it fits better with their work and family life; parents have not returned to the playground to collect children, as our children have told us they feel safer when the playground is 'their' space; and, the electronic bells are no longer needed to keep lessons (and breaks) on time.

Pupils at St. Joseph's Catholic Academy, Norton awarded a coveted Eco-Schools Green Flag St Joseph's pupil eco group the 'Stewards of Creation' have earned an international accreditation, recognising their amazing work in making their school more environmentally friendly and raising eco-awareness in fellow pupils. Eco-Schools is an international education programme that prompts young people to explore sustainability and climate change and take action.



Pupils at St. Joseph's conducted an environmental review, assessing how eco-friendly their school is. They reviewed everything from the school's recycling practices, to energy usage, to how environmental themes are covered in classrooms. Building on their findings, the pupils planned a year of activities that would up their green-credentials.

The group connected their work to 3 Eco-Schools topics: Biodiversity, Marine & School Grounds. First, each member of the Stewards of Creation took responsibility for a section of our school environmental review. They spoke to their classes to see which areas we scored well in, and which needed improvement. From this we identified three areas which we thought we could work on over the course of the academic year and created an action plan.

Activities included: For Biodiversity we planted 80 trees in Allison Trainer Park, we built bird and bat boxes which were then placed in trees on the school grounds. We also build bug hotels and hedgehog houses. For Marine, we placed a ban on glitter and taught any lessons about marine environments or marine life in science and geography. For the School Grounds, we have planted an Oak Tree as part of the Queen's Jubilee Celebrations, installed a clothing recycling bank, sewed wildflower seeds and installed bird feeders as well as the bug, bird and bat houses.

Our school Eco-coordinator, explained: "I am so proud of how hard the children have worked to achieve our targets for this academic year. They have been super ambassadors for our school when they have been working in the community and with Stockton Borough Council. Adults from other organisations have commented on their exceptional behaviour and commitment to developing sustainability in our school and local environment. They are a credit to us all."

Myanna, a Year 4 steward said: "I have enjoyed being a Steward of Creation. Planting trees in Allison Trainer Park, was my favourite task. I think that this will really make a difference to our local area, and I learned lots too. Building the bird boxes was fun and I found out that 'Northwest is the best' so that the wildlife have just the right amount of sun and warmth."

Eco-Schools England Manager, Adam Flint, said: "Earning an Eco-Schools Green Flag Award takes passion, commitment and a desire to make a difference. Pupils should be proud of their great work. They're an inspiration and it makes us feel heartened and positive about the future of our planet."







Our Green Flag is due to be displayed on our new flagpole, in the school grounds, so that our community can see that St. Joseph's are most certainly flying the flag for a greener future.
