Furniture and gym equipment is now delivered and we hope to be officially 'open' after Christmas.








It's Good news for St Bede's Primary school in Stockton

Key Stage 2/3 Curriculum

Leading the way on Curriculum Transition!

After securing funding from the DfE so far we have developed a curriculum for history, geography, science, art and modern foreign languages which spans Key Stages 1, 2 and 3.

It is knowledge rich, supported by high quality resources and professional development for teachers. Our schemes of work are backed up by the very latest research and are geared to ensuring the transition from primary school to secondary school is as seamless as possible.


We hope you enjoy looking at some examples of history work from our Year 5 and 6 pupils and some geography from our pupils in Years 3 and 4.











Investment in new school minibuses for Stockton, Hartlepool and Bishop Auckland

The Trust has taken delivery of four new minibuses over the last few months.


Two buses have been specially adapted for wheelchair use, and are going to be used between a number of primary schools throughout the Stockton-on-Tees and Hartlepool areas. The buses will aid day-to-day student transport and assist with visits and trips. The other two buses are replacement vehicles for St John's Catholic School and Sixth Form College in Bishop Auckland.



Assessment Matters!

Within the Bishop Hogarth Catholic Education Trust, we want our pupils to keep up rather than catch up! That is why this year we have invested significantly to provide an additional assessment tool. Accurate assessment is the key to planning next steps in learning for individual pupils.

Through its investment in the assessment tool 'Testbase' for use by all our primary schools the Trust can be assured that good assessment is at the heart of teaching and learning. Making use of 'Testbase' materials will support our teachers to confidently judge whether our pupils are meeting age-related expectations. Tests are designed to keep motivation high whilst identifying learning gaps.



Staff Continued Professional Development in October

A Gold Standard for Literacy!

Working in collaboration with the St Michael's English Hub, the primary School Improvement Team was able to provide bespoke training on the Reading Curriculum for all the primary school teachers in our Trust; including some from schools yet to join us. The teaching of reading is a high priority for our Trust this year and the training, delivered by two Literacy specialists, emphasised the importance of ensuring our youngest children have a firm foundation in reading through engaging in a quality structured phonics programme. The training also stimulated discussion about the importance of reading for pleasure. Within the Bishop Hogarth Catholic Education Trust, we aim to ensure our schools are book rich environments; providing opportunities for our pupils to open windows to new worlds, explore new themes and fall in love with reading.

Our bespoke transition curriculum, currently in History, Geography and Science has been praised several times this term by Ofsted inspectors. Clive Davies, OBE, and founding director of Focus Education, attended our training day in October to provide insight to Primary colleagues on curriculum leadership. Using his vast experience in Primary Education and as a former Ofsted inspector Clive's training focused upon the very latest research by the Education Endowment Foundation (EEF) into teaching and Learning.

New cooking facilities for St Charles

A new oven and cooking facilites have been installed at St Charles, Tudhoe. The high specification oven alongside upgraded menus will improve the range of catering able to be provided, and make sure the children have a good selection of hearty meals and termly themed dishes. Investing in High Quality Resources to Support Learning in our Schools

The best available evidence indicates that great teaching is the most important lever schools have to improve pupil attainment. Ensuring every teacher is supported in delivering high-quality teaching is essential to achieving the best outcomes for all pupils... The Education Endowment Foundation.

Here at the Bishop Hogarth Catholic Education Trust, we support teachers to deliver the best learning through investing in quality professional development and by providing the very best resources for our schools. This term the Trust has invested significantly in resources linked to one of our Key Improvement Priorities, which is to enhance the teaching of reading and the promotion of a love for reading. Many of our schools now benefit from Accelerated Reader – a web-based programme that encourages children to read extensively and for pleasure. Accelerated Reader is an internet-based software programme which assesses reading age and suggests books that match pupils' needs and interests. Pupils take computerised quizzes on the books they have read and are incentivised by earning points as they make progress.





Learning to read is a complex undertaking, our youngest readers benefit from a systematic approach to the teaching of reading through our fidelity to the systematic teaching of phonics. Some of our primary schools use the Read Write Inc. approach to phonics teaching. Read Write Inc., developed by Ruth Miskin, provides a structured and systematic approach to teaching literacy. It is used by more than a quarter of the UK's primary schools and is designed to create fluent readers, confident speakers and willing writers.

Each Read Write Inc. programme meets the higher expectations of the National Curriculum and uses effective assessment to accelerate every child's progress and prepare them for the National Curriculum Tests. Our Read Write Inc. schools continue to receive extensive high-quality training from Ruth Miskin's professional development team. For those schools not affiliated to this scheme we have invested significantly this year as a Trust in the training, resources and reading books to support the Sounds-Write phonics approach. Both approaches are backed by research, and both have a positive impact upon pupil outcomes.

Establishing Sounds-Write in some of our Schools

On December 2nd and 3rd, the first cohort of primary school staff from across Trust began four days of training in Sounds-Write Phonics, a linguistic phonics programme for teaching children to read.

The Sounds-Write programme ensures that:

- Children develop key concepts about the way English is written.
- Children practise the skills essential for reading and spelling accurately.
- Children learn the sounds and the spellings of English.

In the English language, there are 44 speech sounds and around 175 different ways to spell those sounds, using a combination of the 26 alphabetic letters.

The Sounds-Write programme, focuses on four concepts for teaching whole classes of children to read and spell:

- Letters are the way we represent sounds.
- A sound can be spelled with 1, 2, 3 or 4 letters.
- In English the same sound is often written with different spellings (same sound, different spellings).
- In English, the same spelling can spell different sounds.

School Spotlight

Holy Family Catholic Primary School Awarded Primary Science Quality Mark

283 Primary Science Quality Marks have been awarded to infant, junior, primary, middle and special schools to celebrate their commitment to excellence in science teaching and learning.

Holy Family Catholic Primary School in Darlington have secured the PSQM following their excellent work in science over the past two years.



Deputy Headteacher, Mark Shield and Leanne Elgie, Science Lead at Holy Family, have led the project and promoted this subject.

They commented, "It's been a great opportunity to highlight the importance of Science in our curriculum and inspire the children. They have really enjoyed experimenting and we hope to encourage and build on this enthusiasm in the years to come."

Further to the work they have been doing on the PSQM, the school is working on a curriculum, which will ensure continuous progression from age 4 to 16 in Science and other subjects.

The PSQM programme ensures effective leadership of science, enables schools to work together to share good practice and is supported by professional development led by local experts. It encourages teacher autonomy and innovation while at the same time offering a clear framework for development in science subject leadership, teaching and learning. Schools that achieve PSQM demonstrate commitment and expertise in science leadership, teaching and learning.

Associate Professor Jane Turner, PSQM National Director said: "There was never a more important time for primary children to have a high-quality science education. Children are engaging with great science both in and outside the classroom, developing positive attitudes towards science as well as secure scientific understanding and skills. Science subject leaders, their colleagues, head teachers, children, parents and governors should be very proud."



Carmel College

School of Sanctuary Project

Carmel College were fortunate to have a visit from author and human rights advocate, Gulwali Passarlay.

He spoke to Year 8 and VI Form students about his experience as an unaccompanied refugee from Afghanistan when he was just twelve years old.

Gulwali then met with the School of Sanctuary group and shared ideas about how we can make a positive impact. Students also met with a representative from the Tees Valley Schools of Sanctuary organisation who will be using Carmel College as a case study and example of best practice for other schools in the region.

Our Lady and St Bede


