Our aim is to ensure that you feel happy, safe and secure in your school.

We believe:

- that every individual in our community is a unique and valuable creation made in the image of God.
- we all have a right to be considered equal, worthy of respect and esteem.
- we all have a responsibility to treat others as we would like to be treated ourselves.

Privacy Notice (How we use student information)

The DfE and government requires us to collect a lot of data by law, so that they can monitor and support schools more widely, as well as checking on individual schools' effectiveness.

The categories of student information that we collect, hold and share include:

- Personal identifiers and contacts (such as name, unique pupil number, contact details and address)
- Characteristics – e.g. ethnicity, language, nationality, country of birth and free school meal eligibility
- Safeguarding information (such as court orders and professional involvement)
- Attendance information – e.g. number of absences and absence reasons, persistent absences and reasons and any previous schools attended
- Assessment and attainment information – e.g. national curriculum assessment results
- Special educational needs (including the needs and ranking)
- Medical and administration (such as doctors information, child health, dental health, allergies, medication and dietary requirements)
- Behavioural information – e.g. exclusions and any relevant alternative provision put in place
- Post – 16 destinations, course enrolled for and any relevant results.
- Finger Pointing for cashless system
- Consent for image rights usage
- Alumni information

Why we collect and use this information

We hold and use the student data to:

- enable good quality, targeted learning and intervention for individuals,
- provide suitable care and support for students,
- assess and monitor student progress and attainment,
- monitor our effectiveness as a school,
- comply with the law regarding data sharing,
- safeguard students to support health and safety outcomes.
- to meet the statutory duties placed upon us by the Department for Education

The lawful basis on which we use this information

We make sure that information we collect and use about students is in line with the GDPR and Data Protection Act. This means that we must have a lawful reason to collect the data, and that if we share that with another organisation or individual we must have a legal basis to do so.

The lawful basis for schools to collect information comes from a variety of sources, such as the Education Act 1996, Regulation 5 of The Education (Information About Individual Students) (England) Regulations 2013, Article 6 and Article 9 of the GDPR.

The Department for Education and Local Authorities require us to collect certain information and report back to them. This is called a 'public task' and is recognised in law as it is necessary to provide the information.

We also have obligations to collect data about children who are at risk of suffering harm, and to share that with other agencies who have a responsibility to safeguard children, such as the police and social care.

We also share information about students who may need or have an Education Health and Care Plan (or Statement of Special Educational Needs). Medical teams have access to some information about students, either by agreement or because the law says we must share that information, for example school nurses may visit the school. Counselling services, careers services, occupational therapists are the type of people we will share information, so long as we have consent or are required by law to do so.

In school we also use various third party tools to make sure that students' best interests are advanced. This includes financial software to manage school budgets, which may include some student data. We use systems to take electronic payments for school meals, additional resources and trips. We use software to track progress and attainment. We must keep up to date information about parents and carers for emergency contacts.

We also use contact information to keep students, parents and carers up to date about school events.

We may be required to share information about our students with the local authority to ensure that they can conduct their statutory duties under:

- the [Schools Admission Code](#), including conducting Fair Access Panels.

Collecting student information

We collect student information via data collection sheets and Common Transfer File (CTF) or secure file transfer from previous school.

Student data is essential for the schools' operational use. Whilst the majority of student information you provide to us is mandatory, some of it requested on a voluntary basis. In order to comply with the data protection legislation, we will inform you at the point of collection, whether you are required to provide certain student information to us or if you have a choice in this and we will tell you what you need to do if you do not want to share this information with us.

Storing student data

We hold student data for a minimum of 5 academic years from arrival in school in Year 7 to the completion of Year 11.

Who we share student information with

We routinely share student information with:

- schools or colleges that the students attend after leaving us
- our local authority
- the Department for Education (DfE)
- NHS/school nurse
- Social Services
- Youth Support Services (students aged 13+)
- Census purposes
- Exam boards

Why we share student information

We do not share information about our students with anyone without consent unless the law and our policies allow us to do so.

We share students' data with the Department for Education (DfE) on a statutory basis. This data sharing underpins school funding and educational attainment policy and monitoring.

We are required to share information about our students with the (DfE) under regulation 5 of The Education (Information about Individual Students) (England) Regulations 2013.

Youth support services

Students aged 13+

Once our students reach the age of 13, we also pass student information to our local authority and/or provider of youth support services as they have responsibilities in relation to the education or training of 13-19 year olds under section 507B of the Education Act 1996.

This enables them to provide services as follows:

- youth support services
- careers' advisers

A parent or guardian can request that **only** their child's name, address and date of birth is passed to their local authority or provider of youth support services by informing us. This right is transferred to the child / student once he/she reaches the age 16.

Students aged 16+

We will also share certain information about students aged 16+ with our local authority and / or provider of youth support services as they have responsibilities in relation to the education or training of 13-19 year olds under section 507B of the Education Act 1996.

This enables them to provide services as follows:

- post-16 education and training providers
- youth support services
- careers' advisers

Requesting access to your personal data

Under data protection legislation, parents and students have the right to request access to information about them that we hold. To make a request for your personal information, or be given access to your child's educational record, contact Mr P Rawlinson, Deputy Headteacher.

Depending on the lawful basis above, you may also have the right to:

- object to processing of personal data that is likely to cause, or is causing, damage or distress
- prevent processing for the purpose of direct marketing
- object to decisions being taken by automated means
- in certain circumstances, have inaccurate personal data rectified, blocked, erased or destroyed; and
- a right to seek redress, either through the ICO, or through the courts

If you have a concern about the way we are collecting or using your personal data, we request that you raise your concern with us in the first instance. Alternatively, you can contact the Information Commissioner's Office at <https://ico.org.uk/concerns/>

How Government uses your data

The student data that we lawfully share with the DfE through data collections:

- underpins school funding, which is calculated based upon the numbers of children and their characteristics in each school.
- informs 'short term' education policy monitoring and school accountability and intervention (for example, school GCSE results or Student Progress measures).
- supports 'longer term' research and monitoring of educational policy (for example how certain subject choices go on to affect education or earnings beyond school)

The National Pupil Database (NPD)

Much of the data about pupils in England goes on to be held in the National Pupil Database (NPD). The NPD is owned and managed by the Department for Education and contains information about pupils in schools in England. It provides invaluable evidence on educational performance to inform independent research, as well as studies commissioned by the department.

It is held in electronic format for statistical purposes. This information is securely collected from a range of sources including schools, local authorities and awarding bodies.

Sharing by the Department

The law allows the Department to share students' personal data with certain third parties, including:

- schools
- local authorities
- researchers
- organisations connected with promoting the education or wellbeing of children in England
- other government departments and agencies
- organisations fighting or identifying crime

Organisations fighting or identifying crime may use their legal powers to contact DfE to request access to individual level information relevant to detecting that crime. Whilst numbers fluctuate slightly over time, DfE typically supplies data on around 600 students per year to the Home Office and roughly 1 per year to the Police.

How to find out what personal information DfE hold about you

Under the terms of the Data Protection Act 2018, you are entitled to ask the Department:

- if they are processing your personal data
- for a description of the data they hold about you
- the reasons they're holding it and any recipient it may be disclosed to
- for a copy of your personal data and any details of its source
