<p><b>Strengths</b> – having a talent for something</p> <p><b>Job</b> – a role where someone carries out a task, usually for money</p>	<p><b>Internet</b> – computers connected to each other around the world</p>	<p><b>Rules</b> – a set of instructions people must follow</p> <p><b>Community</b> – group of people in the same place (living or working)</p>
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Everyone has different strengths in and out of school (good at sports, good at reading/writing/math, good at singing, good at looking after things)</li> <li>Lots of people have jobs to help us in our community such as nurses, doctors, emergency services, cleaners, teachers, lollipop ladies, bin men</li> <li>Different strengths and interests are needed to different jobs</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>We can use phones, laptops, computers, ipads/tablets to use the internet</li> <li>We use the internet to find out information about the world, play games, listen to music and watch videos.</li> <li>The internet helps us to learn things and have fun but must be used safely.</li> <li>To stay safe online we don't communicate with people we do not know</li> <li>If anything happens that upsets us or worries us we can tell an adult</li> <li>We can show a trusted adult anything that we think isn't right</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>There are different rules at home, in school and in the community</li> <li>Rules are there to help keep people safe and make sure everyone is doing the right thing</li> <li>We can care for people, animals and living things</li> <li>We can show care by being kind, looking after one another and animals, picking up litter</li> </ul>

<p><b>Bank</b> – a business that lends and borrows money</p> <p><b>Budget</b> – a plan for managing your money</p>	<p><b>Factual</b> – information that is true</p> <p><b>Entertainment</b> – information that isn't always true such as games, videos</p>	<p><b>Rights</b> – having freedom to make a choice, be looked after and get an education</p> <p><b>Responsibilities</b> – doing the things you are supposed to do and accepting the results of actions</p> <p><b>Equality</b> – treating people the same and fairly</p> <p><b>Inclusion</b> – making sure everyone is included and feels welcome to join in</p>
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Money is used to pay for things and can be coins or notes or from a bank card.</li> <li>• Money is kept in the bank in a bank account to be looked after.</li> <li>• A need is something you must have to survive such as food, water and a home.</li> <li>• A want is something that is nice to have but you can survive without it.</li> <li>• It is important to pay for what I need first before I think about my wants.</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Internet is used in everyday life to find out information, get directions, communicate or play games</li> <li>• Some information on the internet is factual such as the news</li> <li>• Some information on the internet is used for entertainment such as games and videos</li> <li>• Not all information on the internet is always true</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• A community is a group of people who live, work or share the same area</li> <li>• We have rights in school and the community such as having a choice, having a voice and opinion on matters and being safe</li> <li>• We have responsibilities in school and the community such as caring for people, animal and the environment around us and showing respect</li> <li>• Communities can help people feel safe, learn new things and feel included</li> <li>• We are all equal and have the same rights and responsibilities even if we are from different communities</li> </ul>

<p>What jobs could we have in the future?</p> <p><b>Stereotype</b> – belief held by lots of people about a person or a group of people.</p> <p><b>Job sector</b> – a group of jobs that are linked based on what they do.</p>	<p>How can we stay safe online?</p> <p><b>Evaluating</b> - to look at the layout, date, author and information to decide whether it is true and accurate.</p> <p><b>PEGI</b> – age rating on games, films and websites.</p> <p>Reliable – can be trusted</p>	<p>What are my rights in the community?</p> <p><b>Laws</b> – rules made by the government to keep communities safe</p> <p><b>Rights</b> – having freedom to make a choice, be looked after and get an education</p> <p><b>Responsibilities</b> – doing the things you are supposed to do and accepting the results of actions</p>
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• People have jobs from different sectors such as education, business and charity.</li> <li>• People can have more than one job at once or over a lifetime.</li> <li>• Teamwork and decision-making are skills that are needed for a job.</li> <li>• Not all nurses are women. Not all soldiers are men.</li> <li>• Your interests and skills now might link to your future job</li> <li>• Achievements and qualifications you get might link to your future job</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• The internet can be used positively for leisure, school and for work</li> <li>• Images and information can be altered to make things more interesting and for entertainment.</li> <li>• We can recognise whether something online is accurate or true and make safe choices by evaluating and using key words.</li> <li>• We can look at the age limit on games and websites to check they are appropriate by looking at the PEGI.</li> <li>• We can report something that concerns us online, such as messages or images to a trusted adult or Childline</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Rules and laws are in place in society to keep safe, happy and to ensure we are treating people, animals and the environment right.</li> <li>• If rules or laws are broken there are consequences (warnings, fines, prison)</li> <li>• Everyone has human rights and they are protected by the law.</li> <li>• Human rights are important because they make sure that everyone is treated fairly and equally and protect people.</li> <li>• Rights of children include the right to life, education, to be safe.</li> <li>• For every right, there is a responsibility (right to education, responsibility to learn)</li> </ul>

<p><b>Interest</b> – money added on to what you pay back when borrowing money.</p> <p><b>Budget</b> – how much you earn and how it impacts how much you spend.</p> <p><b>Debit card</b> - a card, which can be used to pay for things and the money will leave the account immediately.</p> <p><b>Credit card</b> – a card, which can be used to pay for things but must be paid back every month or you will have to pay interest.</p>	<p><b>Digital footprint</b> – trail of information left behind every time the internet is used</p> <p><b>Influence</b>- to affect how someone behaves or thinks</p> <p><b>Advert</b>- a picture, sign or video to make a product or service known and to influence you to buy it</p>	<p><b>Volunteer</b>- spending time, for free, helping others.</p> <p><b>Benefit</b> – advantages (good things)</p>
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>You can pay for things using cash, debit card or credit card.</li> <li>We can keep track of our money by remembering or writing down when you spend or save money, so you always know how much you have.</li> <li>Everyone has different budgets, needs and wants.</li> <li>Money can have both positive and negative effects on people.</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Everything shared online has a digital footprint.</li> <li>Organisations can use personal information to encourage people to buy things</li> <li>How do organisations encourage people to buy things?</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>The benefits of living in a community are that it keeps us safe, allows us to meet new people and gives a sense of belonging.</li> <li>We can belong to multiple communities (class, school, Newton, clubs)</li> <li>Lots of different people make up a community</li> <li>Volunteers can help the local community.</li> <li>We can make a difference to those in need in our community by showing care and compassion.</li> </ul>

<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Ambition plays an important role in achieving a future career as achieving a job takes hard work, determination and patience.</li> <li>• People may be influenced on their choice of job because of pay, working conditions, interests and strengths.</li> <li>• Diversity and inclusion make sure that everyone is given equal opportunities and treated with respect in the workplace.</li> <li>• Stereotyping in the workplace can make people feel uncomfortable, singled out and unequal.</li> <li>• We can challenge stereotyping in the workplace by treating everyone equally and speaking out when we see this happening.</li> <li>• There are different routes of getting a job such as college, university, apprenticeships and training</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Different types of media has different purposes: to entertain, inform or persuade</li> <li>• Some media and online content can promote stereotypes</li> <li>• Devices and websites can store and share your information</li> <li>• Real news has facts and comes from trusted sources</li> <li>• Fake news is based on opinions and is usually shocking or unbelievable</li> <li>• Search results from trusted websites are more reliable</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Tax is collected when you get paid a wage or when you buy a service or product</li> <li>• The government decide how to spend the budget which provides services in communities</li> <li>• The amount of money spent will have an effect on the quality and impact of the service</li> <li>• It is our job to protect the environment</li> <li>• Your everyday decisions and actions affect the environment</li> <li>• How you spend money affects the environment</li> <li>• We show compassion towards animals by looking after them</li> <li>• We show compassion towards our environment by looking after it</li> </ul>

<p><b>Financial risk</b> – the possibility of losing money</p> <p><b>Gambling</b> – betting money or goods on an event</p> <p><b>Debt</b> – what is owed to someone else</p> <p><b>Fraud and scam</b> – a crime where someone tricks somebody else for their gain.</p>	<p><b>Reverse image search</b> – a search engine, which searches whether an image is real, altered or been used before</p> <p><b>Clickbait</b> – using misleading and shocking headlines to gain more clicks and viewers</p> <p>S is for safe- Never give your personal information to people that you do not know.</p> <p>M is for meet- Never arrange to meet with strangers.</p> <p>A is for Accepting- Never accept emails or messages from people that you do not know as they might contain a virus.</p> <p>R is for reliable- Not everything that you read on the internet is true.</p> <p>T is for tell- If anything upsets you on the internet always tell a trusted adult.</p>	<p><b>Stereotypes</b> – a belief held by lots of people about specific people/groups of people</p> <p><b>Prejudice</b> - forming a negative opinion about someone or a group of people before understanding them or the situation</p> <p><b>Discrimination</b> -the unfair treatment to the person or group of people based on that opinion</p>
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Money plays an important part in people's lives as it allows us to buy things we need (food, water, house, clothes)</li> <li>• Value for money is a product that is the best in cost and quality.</li> <li>• We can judge if something is value for money by researching and comparing the chosen product.</li> <li>• Companies encourage customers to buy things through advertising.</li> <li>• It is important to be a critical customer to understand if we are getting good value for money.</li> <li>• Having no money can impact a person's health and wellbeing by making them feel stressed, alone and worried.</li> <li>• The common risks associated with money are: debt, fraud, gambling, scams and these put us at financial risk.</li> <li>• We can get help if we are concerned about money by speaking to a trusted adult or Childline.</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• The benefits of safe internet use is learning, connecting and communicating</li> <li>• Images are altered online through editing apps and photoshopping</li> <li>• Images are altered, manipulated and faked to make the images and what is in them seem and look better</li> <li>• The age restrictions are age 13+ for social media sites</li> <li>• Online content can sometimes use clickbait to impact people's emotions and encourage them to read and share.</li> <li>• If we see inappropriate content or receive inappropriate contact, we can tell a trusted adult or Childline</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Acts of discrimination can be being left out because of gender/skin colour, being told you can't do something because of age/gender</li> <li>• To safely respond to and challenge discrimination we can speak up, say no, walk away, tell a trusted adult.</li> <li>• Stereotypes can influence our thinking</li> <li>• We can challenge stereotypes by being open to learning about other people</li> </ul>
