Key Facts

- 1. In 1605, King James I was the King of England. However, some people did not like him as, King James I did not like people being Catholic in England.
- 2. Guy Fawkes was born on 13th April 1570, in York. His Catholic religion was very important to him.
- 3. The plotters decide to blow up the Houses of Parliament with the king inside on the 5th November 1605.
- 4. The plotters placed 36 barrels of gunpowder in the cellars under the Houses of Parliament.
- 5. On 26th October 1605, Lord Monteagle, who is a Catholic, receives an unsigned letter that warns him not to go to the opening of Parliament on the 5th November. He showed the letter to the King.
- 6. On the morning of 5th November, the King's guards searched the cellar and found Guy Fawkes hiding with the many barrels of gunpowder!
- 7. Guy Fawkes was tortured until he confessed to trying to blow up the Houses of Parliament, and gave the names of the other plotters.
- 8. The plotters were all either captured or killed.
- 9. We celebrate Bonfire Night every year on the 5th November to remember the plot against the King.
